Gentlemen: Attention Geo. S. Montgomery, Sec'y.

You request our opinion on the following question:

"We have an applicant whose practical ability is high class, but whose educational qualifications are very limited, in fact so limited, that he writes very little or no long hand. If he could master our text book sufficiently to answer the questions orally, could we under the law, permit our stenographer to write his answers on his examination papers?"

Section 67-111 Arizona Code Annotated 1939 provides in part:

"\* \* \* Such examinations, except as to applicants for certificates to practice as registered finger wavers, shall include both a practical demonstration and a written and oral test, and shall embrace the subjects usually taught in schools of barbering approved by the board."

We are of the opinion that you may permit your stenographer to write his answers on his examination papers.
