Dear Sir:

We have your letter of August 12th wherein you refer to an opinion delivered to you by this office on June 7, 1941, and also an opinion delivered to you on April 5th. You state that there is an apparent conflict between the two opinions.

In order that you may hereafter be not in doubt concerning who is charged with the purchasing of supplies for the various institutions, and in order to clarify the opinions rendered you on the above dates, you are advised that the purchasing agent, under rules and regulations prescribed by the Governor shall purchase all supplies for the following State institutions:

The State Fair;
The Hospital for the Insane;
The Industrial School and School for Girl Offenders;
The Home for Aged and Infirm Arizona Pioneers;
The State Prison Farm and Prison;
The Capitol Building and Grounds;
The State Welfare Sanatorium at Tempe;
The School for Under-privileged and Feeble Minded Children,
(Children's colony);
Maricopa Shady Lawn Rest Home and
Convalescent Home for Children.

To further clarify the matter you are advised that the State School for the Deaf and Blind does not come under the provisions of Chapter 65, Laws of 1941, for the reason that the management of the school is otherwise provided for by law. (Section 54-1515, Arizona Code Annotated, 1939.)
