Bruce and unanimously carried. Dear Sir:-

I beg to advise the commission that it has no power to pay the expenses of any person to go to Washington, D.C., for the purpose of securing favorable legislation extending the provisions of the Arizona "FUNDING ACT". The authority of the commission to expend money is limited to the cost of transmitting funds and interest and the cost of engraving bonds, advertising the sale of the same and the incidental expenses necessary thereto.
