

EXECUTIVE ORDER

66-3

ESTABLISHING THE ARIZONA STATE MANPOWER
ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The development of a complex industrial society has created a critical need for more and better trained personnel in many vital occupational categories.

Even in periods of high unemployment, many employment opportunities remain unfilled because of the shortages of qualified personnel.

In addition, the skills of many persons have been rendered obsolete by dislocations in the economy arising from automation or other technological developments.

It is in the high interest of both the state and the nation that current and prospective manpower shortages be identified and that persons who can be qualified for these positions through education and training be sought out and trained.

In the Manpower Development And Training Act of 1962, the Congress of The United States has recognized this problem and established a means by which the necessary training and retraining may be carried out.

In an amendment of the act, the Congress has authorized in each of the states, a citizen committee to be established for the purpose of advising the Governor and making advice and assistance available to persons formulating and carrying on programs under this act.

NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Arizona it is ordered as follows:

Part 1 Establishment of the Arizona State Manpower Committee.

Section I There is hereby established the Arizona State Manpower Advisory Committee.

Section II The Committee shall be composed of not more than fifteen (15) members appointed by the Governor from among persons with a competency in the general area of employment and training, and representative of management, labor, agriculture, education and the general public.

Section III Members of the Committee shall serve for one year or until replaced by appointment of the Governor.

Section IV The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman.

Part II Duties of the Committee.

Section I The Committee shall act as the Governor's principal advisor on Manpower Development and Training affairs; maintain liaison with the National Advisory Committee to Departments of Labor for Manpower Development and Training; and maintain liaison with Manpower Development and Training Advisory Committees where they are established in the counties of the State.

Section II The Committee shall aid manpower agencies to develop long-range programs which assure continued economic growth and the existence of a trained work force available to meet the needs of new and expanding industries and services.

Section III The Committee shall stimulate research on:

- (a) Manpower requirements and resources.
- (b) Effects of automation and improved technology.
- (c) Practices which impede the mobility of workers.
- (d) Special problems of young workers, undereducated workers, and the chronically unemployed.

Section IV The Committee shall interpret the need for training to the community and generally promote understanding of the Manpower Development and Training program by enlisting the help of newspapers, radio, television and other media of communication and supplying appropriate information.

Section V The Committee shall recommend establishment of specific occupational training programs.


Section VI The Committee shall advise and assist in the employment placement of persons who have completed training or retraining under this program, by use of personal contacts, publicity and other appropriate means.

Section VII All executive departments and agencies of the Government of the State of Arizona are requested to cooperate with the Committee in the performance of its duties and studies.

Section VIII The Committee shall, upon a date to be fixed by the chairman, make an annual report to the Governor on the progress of Manpower Development and Training within the state.

Section IX Additional activities of the Committee shall be determined at the discretion of the Governor and the Committee.

Section X The Committee shall exist until the Governor deems it to have completed its work.
