
The consultants discussed the philosophy and scope of the Pupil Personnel Services approach: positive approaches to student unrest situations, positive approaches to working effectively with behav-

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the staff, students and members of the team. The need for a new high school building, gymnasium, special education aids and the development of leadership in student council members were discussed.



Two post grad boys, Eldon Eschief and Phillip Polingumptewa, gave a short skit on how boys picked up their dates in the early days when Chilocco was very young.



Four Chilocco wrestlers placed in the finals of the Douglas Wrestling Tournament which was held on Saturday, December 6, at Douglas, Kansas. DEPUTY SINKS 29 IN HOME OPENER

St. John's of Winfield, Kansas, spoiled the Chilocco Indians' basketball home-opener by winning narrowly over the Indians, 60-55 in a game played Tuesday night, December 2, at the Chilocco gym.

The game was exciting from start to finish as Kenneth Deputy, the lone returning starter, kept the Indians in the game with his sharp-shooting before fouling out late in the final quarter, kept the Indians in the game high total of 29 points. Also scoring in double-figures for the Indians was Ponca Warrior with 12 points.

This was the second loss for the Indians as they lost to No. 1 ranked Pawhuska of Class AA by a lop-sided score of 78-35 on November 28. Ken Deputy led the Indians in scoring with 28 points. Chilocco's "B" Team won their game over St. John's by the score of 48-38. Larry Yazzie was high scorer with 17 points followed by Mike Blackstar with 12 points.

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
