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
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

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EDUCATION OF INDIAN CHILDREN IN 1966

Indian children attend public, Federal, private, and mission schools. In fiscal year 1966 there were 141,694 Indian students, ages 6 to 18 years inclusive, enrolled in these schools in the United States. Compared to 134,064 students last year, enrollment increased 5.7 percent.

During the year 1961 the Bureau dropped from its school census of Indian school children those residing in the States of California, Idaho, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, Oregon (except the Warm Springs Agency), Texas, Washington, and Wisconsin, where responsibility for the education of their Indian children had previously been accepted by the States.

In 1966 more than half (57.1 percent) of all Indian children of school age attended public schools. Of those enrolled in school, 61.3 percent attended public schools, 32.6 percent attended Federal schools, and 6.1 percent attended mission and other schools. Comparable percentages in 1965 were 61.4, 32.2 and 6.4.

For more than three centuries Indian education in the United States was largely under the direction of missionaries. As early as 1568 the Jesuit Fathers organized a school at Havana, Cuba, for Indian children from Florida. This was the first school attended by Indian children who lived within the United States.

Many of the treaties between the United States and Indian tribes provided for the establishment of schools for Indian children. Congress has also provided schools for Indian children where other educational facilities were not available. In 1842, there were 37 Indian schools in operation and by 1881 the number had increased to 106. In 1966 the Bureau of Indian Affairs operated 254 schools with an enrollment of 49,834 Indian children, and 18 dormitories for 3,972 children attending public schools.

The primary objective of Federal schools operated for Indian children living on Indian-owned or restricted trust lands is to prepare them for successful living. In Federal schools children develop

basic academic skills, acquire an understanding of the social and economic world which surrounds them, learn improved standards of living, follow practices which assure optimum health, acquire the necessary vocational training to qualify for gainful employment, and obtain sufficient education to enter special schools and institutions of higher learning. The system of schools provided by the Federal Government for Indian children meets program standards required by the States in which they operate, and all secondary schools are accredited so that graduates may enter college on the same basis as public high school graduates. A full 4-year high school course is offered at 25 schools. One or more but less than 4 years of high school training is available at 9 other schools.

Indian children are entitled to the same opportunities for public school education as are provided for other citizens living within a State. It is encouraging to note that the States have assumed responsibility for the education of 86,827 (57.1 percent) of school-age Indian children in the States where the Bureau of Indian Affairs has direct educational responsibility. Over one-third are educated at no cost to the Bureau of Indian Affairs. In some States, however, tax-exempt, Indian-owned lands and large numbers of Indian children within a school district may create financial burdens for which local funds are inadequate. As early as 1890, contracts providing for financial assistance to schools attended by Indian children were negotiated with individual districts. It was recognized then, as today, that Indian children become better adjusted to living with all people in a community when they associate with other children in public schools. The Johnson-O'Malley Act, which became law in 1934, authorized the Secretary of the Interior to enter into contracts with States for the education of Indians and to permit the use of Federal school buildings and equipment by local school authorities. Consequently, some States with large Indian populations now have no Federal schools within their boundaries.

Under the terms of Public Law 874, 81st Cong. (64 Stat. 1100), as amended August 13, 1958, admin-

istered by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, a new Federal aid resource was made available to eligible school districts educating Indian children. This aid is available to meet partial costs of normal school operation. Additional supplemental aid for the education of Indian children under the Johnson-O'Malley program is limited to districts that do not qualify under the Public Law 874 program and to districts meeting educational problems under extraordinary circumstances, including special services and special programs designed to facilitate the education of Indian children.

In fiscal year 1966, the Bureau of Indian Affairs entered into contracts with 14 States and with school districts in 3 other States, in accordance with approved plans which specify conditions under which financial aid is extended. In addition to these, aid was provided through contracts for the education in public schools of 2,284 out-of-district Indian children living in dormitories operated by the Bureau of Indian Affairs in 7 towns adjacent to the Navajo Reservation, and in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

In summary, then, the Bureau of Indian Affairs had direct responsibility for the 53,806 children enrolled in Federal schools and housed in Federal dormitories, and partial financial responsibility for approximately two-thirds of those enrolled in public schools.

Statistics concerning Indian education are published annually by the Bureau of Indian Affairs and are available in September following the close of the school term which they cover.

Congressional appropriations to the Bureau of Indian Affairs are limited to the education of children of one-fourth or more degree of Indian blood and native children in Alaska, except for the Cherokee Agency where children of less than one-quarter degree of Indian blood enrolled in the tribe may attend Federal schools. Native children in Alaska are Indian.

Eskimo, and Aleut. The 13 tables below relate to Indian and native children, as defined above, and to their schools.

In addition to the operation of Federal schools, the Bureau of Indian Affairs conducts a limited program for adult reservation Indians. This program was initiated in fiscal year 1956 on five reservations. The initial projects were well received and the program was expanded in fiscal year 1958 and in each year from 1960 through 1966. Table 13 indicates the number of Indian communities participating in the program in 1966 by area and agency or location. Courses were planned to meet specific needs of the individual and the community group, and ranged from the most elementary reading and writing to practical and business skills and citizenship training.

Table 1 shows the enumeration of all Indian children from 6 to 18 years, inclusive, and those over 18 who are enrolled in school by area, agency, and school status.

For Indian children who are enrolled in public schools and are no longer a Federal education responsibility, the Bureau must rely on the public school systems to provide census information. Indian mobility also accounts for the children, 6 to 18 years inclusive, who are shown under the caption "Information Not Available."

It should be noted that children over 18 are not included in the enumeration of school-age population. Tables 1 and 2 are based on the annual school census of Indian children 6 to 18 years old, while all other tables are derived from annual attendance reports of individual schools operated by the Bureau of Indian Affairs and cover all students enrolled regardless of their ages.

Table 2 indicates the percentage of children (6 to 18) enumerated who are in school, not in school, and for whom definite information is not available. The right-hand side of the table shows the percentage of children in school according to the type of school they attend. Servicewide, 93.1 percent of

the Indian children enumerated are in school; 5.1 percent are known to be out of school; and definite information is not available for 1.8 percent. Reports indicate that at least 25.8 percent of those known to be out of school have valid reasons for nonenrollment, e.g., mental and physical disability, early marriage, and beyond State compulsory school age.

Table 3 indicates enrollment and average daily attendance in Federal schools by type of school and area. Average daily attendance for all schools, exclusive of hospital schools, was 88.7 percent in 1966 as compared to 89.4 percent in 1965.

Table 4 shows the number of Federal schools by type of school and area. The Bureau operated 254 schools in 1966, as compared to 258 last year. Table 4 does not include the dormitories which are shown in Table 8.

The following changes account for a net decrease of four in the number of facilities operated in fiscal year 1966. One day school closed in the Aberdeen Area. One day school closed and children transferred to public school operation at the Cherokee Agency. Five day schools and two boarding schools closed and three boarding schools opened in the Navajo Area. Three day schools opened and one closed in the Juneau Area.

The Concho Demonstration School in the Anadarko Area is operated as a special school for the rehabilitation of students with educational problems. The school staff conducts a remedial program designed to reorient the student to the school he left or to a school more in keeping with his needs and objectives. The school has a capacity of 44 pupils. During 1966 a total of 85 pupils were served for varying periods of time. Average daily attendance at the school was 23.3. By the close of the school year 45 pupils had been transferred to other Federal schools and their enrollment is included in the enrollment of the other schools.

Trailer schools were operated as temporary educational facilities at 8 locations for Navajo children living in isolated parts of the reservation. Of

367 students, 95.6 percent were enrolled in the primary and first two grades in 1966. The operation of these units, often supplemented with quonset huts, has been successful as a temporary measure, but these trailer schools are being replaced by adequate school buildings wherever the population and regular daily attendance warrant permanent facilities.

Tables 5, 6, 7, and 8 list individual schools, instructional units in hospitals, and dormitories operated by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Mailing address, enrollment, average daily attendance, and grades taught are shown for each facility. The Albuquerque Dormitory is operated in conjunction with the Albuquerque Indian School but is shown with peripheral dormitories because these dormitory students attend public schools under conditions identical to other peripheral dormitories.

Table 9 indicates grade level. In 1966 enrollment in the primary and first 4 grades increased by 416 pupils to 23,433 as compared to the previous year's 23,017. This group represents 47.1 percent of the entire student body. Special students decreased by 889 and account for 5.2 percent of total enrollment.

Table 10 shows enrollment in elementary, high school, and special classes under the title "Grade Level." Special Navajo Program participants are no longer designated because of the changing needs of the students and the fact that students from other tribes are also enrolled in the special classes. The original program has been expanded to include nine grades of academic studies and two years of specialized vocational study. Students who formerly were listed as "Special Navajo" are now under the "Special" designation used also for postgraduate, vocational, and other special classes. Certificates of Completion were issued 576 graduates from special programs. The number of high school graduates in fiscal 1966 was 1,591, an increase of 5.3 percent.

In line with the Bureau's policy of encouraging public school enrollment of Indian children, many students transfer to public schools when they reach


the sixth grade and have acquired some facility in the use of the English language. This is a factor in the seemingly low number of graduates of Federal high schools.

Table 11 indicates students according to their degree of Indian blood. Full bloods comprise 81.4 percent of the total and only 3.1 percent are less than one-half Indian.

Table 12 shows tribal designation of students in Federal schools. Ninety-nine specific tribes or tribal groups and Aleuts, Eskimos, and the various tribes of Indians in Alaska were represented in 1966. Sixty-two tribes had fewer than 40 members each and these are grouped together as "All Other Tribes." Aleuts, Eskimos, Navajos, Sioux, and Pueblos (including Hopi, shown separately) are the most numerous and together comprise 71 percent of the total enrollment.

Table 13 lists the 49 agencies and locations conducting adult education programs in 303 Indian communities.
