
OPINION POLL: How do you stand on the issue concerning mid-term grades? Before you decide, consider the arguments for and against the current policy. For: Mid term grades are a valuable feedback of the student's progress, reinforcing good work, encouraging better work; shock loafing students; are used to determine eligibility for student offices and athletics; are used in the student's fourth semester to determine freshmen and sophomores with the highest cumulative grades, who are then recognized at the annual honors assembly in May; are used to determine when students register for the next semester (students with higher grade averages getting first choice, thus receiving some recognition for their good work); are a double-check for the Office of Admissions to see if district data processing has correct class rosters. Against the current practice of receiving all grades at mid-term, instead, perhaps, to receive notice only of those subjects in which one is doing 4 or 5 work: Often the grade is not accurate because only one test is used as a basis for the grade; some instructors seem to give all three's at mid-term, certainly an unfair feedback to the student; if the student received no mid-term grade slip, he could find out from the teacher at any time how he stands in class, thus possibly encouraging better teacher-student rapport; the occasional student-teacher conference will individualize the learning process; by receiving deficiency reports only, the student should be urged to work harder, being thus "singled out"; by reporting 4's and 5's only, G.C.C. would be comparable to other Arizona schools. ASU, NAU and U of A all report 4's and 5's only-Arizona Western also reports 4's and 5's.

Think through the issue intelligently; make up your own mind; then vote in the opinion poll being held on Wednesday and Thursday, February 26 and 27. ID cards required. -J. Boerner-
