



WHO ARE WHAT IS ASSOCIATED STUDENTS???

SEVENTEEN REASONS WHY YOU SHOULD NOT GO TO H & R BLOCK.....

Are you getting a bad case of the "boogy-woogie-blues" because you have to tell your "200 year old Uncle" what you made last year??? Don't rush out and fork over all sorts of bread to H&R Block to have them do what you can do all by yourself.

Two important points that may help you to obtain a little confidence in yourself when attempting your Federal return are:

(1) The difference between tax avoidance and tax evasion is whether or not a liability has occurred. In other words, taking all possible deductions is not going to get you a one-way ticket to Florence, Arizona. However, if you deduct \$2, 142,438.59 as miscellaneous deductions and you only made \$6,000 last year -- rots of ruck in Florence!

(2) Taxable income is all income received- in the form of money, property and services- that is not, by law, expressly exempt from tax. Under certain conditions gifts, bequests, or inheritances; life insurance proceeds; military allowances; payments to dependents of military personnel; relocation payments; scholarships and fellowship grants; social security payments; unemployment compensation; veterans' benefits; and workmen's compensation are not included in gross income. Many of these depend upon your particular circumstances. The IRS publishes innumerable pamphlets that fully explain all circumstances. Go down and get one!

EDUCATIONAL EXPENSES

In many instances, educational expenses can be deducted from your return. This is true particularly if you are employed. However, you shouldn't start figuring out your expenses until you know for sure that you qualify.

Ask yourself these questions:

(1) Has your employer just told you that you need some more education in order to meet the minimum requirements of your job, salary and/or status?

(2) Are you attempting to maintain or improve upon your present skills required in performing the duties of your present employment, trade or business?

OR.....

(3) Are you trying to meet the minimum educational requirements in order to get a job?

(4) Will your education qualify you for a new trade or business? (Whether or not you were attempting to qualify for one)

If the answer is yes to #1 and #2 and no to #3 and #4, you qualify. If you are doubtful as to the validity of your status, contact the IRS before you start deducting your expenses.

EMPLOYED STUDENTS Educational expenses paid by your employer generally must be included in your gross income. However, you may be able to deduct your expenses which will lower your taxable income figure.

VETERANS You do not have to reduce your educational expenses by the amount of (tax-exempt) benefits you receive under the G.I. bill.

TEACHERS If you must take additional courses to improve your present position within the teaching profession, then your educational expenses are deductible.

All teaching and related duties are considered to be of the same general type of work. For instance, if you take additional courses that will help you to obtain the position of guidance counselor or principal, then your expenses are deductible.

Remember -this information depends upon your particular set of circumstances. The IRS publishes free information explaining all circumstances. Go down to taxpayers' services on First Avenue and get some of their pamphlets. You can also call them (phx. 257-1233) although it is difficult to get through. If worse comes to worse, haul your records and receipts down to their offices and ask for help. This is done free of charge and will be of tremendous benefit to you.

If you deduct your educational expenses because of this brief outline, I will bring you cookies and milk while you are at Florence!!!

WIDESPREAD APATHY AT G.C.C.

The articles in a recent issue of El Tiempo Pasandos concerning widespread apathy at G.C.C. caught my eye. Although I agree with the problem, I don't feel that the authors were entirely fair to the A.S. government.

A.S. government can only initiate changes where there is a student demand for change. So far, there has been no such demand. Four people came to our last executive board meeting. Two represented new clubs and wished to be recognized as such; the other two represented existing clubs and requested funds.

The meetings are open to all students but we've never had to initiate crowd control outside of the Student Council Chambers. No one ever asks what happens to the activity fees and very few even realize what clubs are in existence. (A.S. government is now in the process of finding out.)

The clubs are not started by A.S. government. It takes fifteen students with a constitution to petition for recognition as a club. The type of club is left pretty much to the students' discretion and very few have ever been rejected.

Regardless of what A.S. government may or may not be doing, the problem still exists: widespread apathy at G.C.C. As students, we can change the activities, initiate new clubs, revive a few old ones and see that A.S. government is informed of our opinions. Fifteen people cannot be expected to fully represent a silent student body.

Times have changed and with it so has the student body. If the college has remained virtually the same, then whose fault is it? The college has ample facilities, the instructors (in most instances) are willing to help if they can and the administration doesn't bite. They're waiting for us to do something.

We can leave things the way they are, or we can change them, but it isn't really fair to stick the blame on one organization or on one person. One way or the other, it's a group effort.



INTRODUCING INVOLVEMENT

Probably one of the least understood courses at G.C.C. is the Projects in Community Service. Founded about five years ago by Mrs. Jane Werneker (Reading), it services 50 agencies in the greater Phoenix area. Through this service, students find that the education and skills they have acquired can be applied to benefit the community and, in many instances, themselves.

Interested students can register for Projects in Community Service during regular registration as an elective under any one of ten departments (whichever corresponds to their interests) and receive up to three credits (transferable). The field work corresponds to the department that was registered for with the hours per week determining the credits that will be received; ten hours per week in the field receives three credits. Once a week a seminar is held for an hour in which problems may be discussed, guest speakers are presented and students may discuss their work with other students.

Based on the concept that the college is the center of the community, Mrs. Werneker encourages students to become involved with the problems that confront the community. She believes that Projects in Community Service enables the students to better understand the problems and operations of the community and to prepare to become its leaders. The community looks for and needs enthusiastic young people who are willing to donate their time and energy toward its betterment.
