



Recent information emanating from Washington D. C. indicates that federal expenditures are going to be reduced for FY82. Because of prior preferential treatment, the Student Financial Assistance (SFA) programs at GCC for 1981-82 are in "very good shape".



We are striving for a top quality center here at Glendale Community College and would appreciate your "aluminum throw-aways".




ART SHOW

MINORITY SERVICES EDUCATIONAL OUTREACH PLAN

Purpose: To provide motivational educational outreach services to interest and assist minorities.

Services include: Educational resources/materials, educational information, financial aid information, admissions, follow-up, orientation, registration and student services referral.

The implementation for this program has many facets including:

- providing awareness in the community
- identifying schools/agencies, community organizations
- developing potential student lists by ethnicity
- awareness, materials
- personal contact
- localized (in community) orientation

Many factors need to be considered. Each school's atmosphere is different, and a separate action plan and strategy must be implemented for each one.

Student financial aid is intricate and also on a first-first-serve basis. Therefore, it is imperative to have informed and prepared prospective students to sign up in early January and early Spring to give the student the advantage of an early application.


NEW GUINEA EXPLORED IN AUDUBON WILDLIFE FILM

Naturalists Greg and Linda McMillan will present their film, "Papua New Guinea: Twilight of Eden", a study of the world's second largest island, at Glendale Community College Performing Arts Theatre, 59th Ave. north of Olive, Monday March 29, 8:00 p.m.

The screening is part of the Audubon Wildlife Film Series, sponsored by the Continuing Education Associated Students through the Evening Student Government, the CEAS Executive Board. This event is free to the public.

New Guinea lies less than nine degrees south of the Equator. Its tropical location governs the island's natural history and its people. An inhospitable place for outsiders, road building is difficult and development scarce. Natives till small farms on steep jungle hillsides. Many still hunt with bows and arrows. A study of New Guinea's insect life offers remarkable insight into physical adaptation--moths have ferocious-looking "faces" on their wings, and rhinoceros beetles grow to a length of three inches. Lizards, anteaters, and exotic spiders abound. Greg and Linda McMillan examine scores of animals common to a tropical environment, as well as human customs that are so entwined with native flora and fauna.





SEA OTTER ANTICS IN AUDUBON FILM

Naturalist Burdette White will present his film, "Southern Sea Otter Country," a look at the habitat of these delightful creatures, at Glendale Community College Performing Arts Auditorium, 59th Ave. north of Olive Ave., Thursday, April 8, at 8:00 am.

The screening is part of the Audubon Wildlife Film Series, sponsored by the Continuing Education Associated Students through the Evening Student Government, the CEAS Executive Board. This event is free to the public.

Hunted to near extinction, the sea otter had vanished from the California coast at the beginning of this century until a few animals were spotted lolling in kelp beds near Big Sur in 1940. Today the population has grown to some 2,000 individuals living along a 160 mile stretch of water from Santa Cruz to Morro Bay. Burdette White emphasizes the otters' beneficial impact upon their intertidal environment as they mate, forage, and rear their young.

Formerly a southern California school superintendent, White has served as director of Defenders of Wildlife and the Desert Protective Council. He has produced films for the Audubon Wildlife Series since 1970.






