The House of Representatives assembled in its Chamber at 12:00 Noon.

Mrs. E. C. "Polly" Rosenbaum of District 4, the oldest member-elect in point of age, presided as Chairman pro tempore.

The Chairman pro tempore appointed Mr. W. A. "Tony" West of District 19 as the temporary Sergeant at Arms and Mr. Art Hamilton of District 22 as the temporary Assistant Sergeant at Arms.

Prayer was offered by Dr. Fred Barnhill of the Church of the Beatitudes, Phoenix, Arizona.

**JOINT SESSION OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF
REPRESENTATIVES OF THE THIRTY-SECOND
LEGISLATURE, FIRST REGULAR SESSION
OF THE STATE OF ARIZONA**

The Joint Session of the First Regular Session of the Thirty-second Legislature was called to order at 1:00 P.M., by Bob Stump of District 6, President of the Senate.

A quorum of both Houses was present.

At 1:01 P.M., the Joint Organization Committee consisting of Senators Sawyer, Hubbard, Dye, Turley, Roeder, Representatives Peck, Getzwiller, Cajero, Lindeman and Harelson returned escorting His Excellency, Raul H. Castro, the Governor of Arizona.

Governor Castro, who was introduced by President Stump, delivered the following message:

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Thirty-second Arizona Legislature, I come before you today to give you the first of what in four years' time will surely be many messages. Because this is my first appearance, it is very special. It is a time when you and I are beginning to get acquainted. Some of you, of course, I know well. Others I meet today for the first time.

It is time now to get down to the serious business of government, and before I am done, I will make you a number of specific suggestions. Let me begin, however, with a statement of principles which will guide my relations with you of the Legislature. I believe in these things:

First, it is the duty of all of us to work together for the good of the State. This is not meant as a cliché, for as you and I know very well that there is politics in government and partisanship in politics. When two Houses of a state legislature are controlled by different parties, there is an abundant opportunity for the state to suffer as one interest or another jockeys for future position.

There will be instances in which one group or another sees some political advantage. I pledge to you my best efforts to keep those instances minor and ask you to do the same. With the troubles now facing the State of Arizona, there is little or no place for partisanship.

Second, I believe that a Governor should be available to the people and to all their representatives. Again, I do not mean to be merely amiable nor to repeat the worn cliché of the open door. We must protect your time and mine so that it can be put to work for the common good. But I have confidence in your judgment and in your sense of proportion. When the Governor's office can be of service to you, please know that you are welcome in that office.

Third, I join you in believing in absolute honesty in the administration of public affairs. The times require a special integrity. At your last session, you adopted new laws to insure honesty in government. We shall work together to make those laws function effectively.

Let us turn now to the concrete matters before us. Arizona's most immediate problem is economic--a deepening recession bringing grim unemployment, sagging business, and ruinous inflation. The New Endeavor must begin with attacking this problem by doing everything possible to stimulate our economy and cut costs of government, without crippling essential services, especially the human services which are most needed in these times.

In this complex national economy, the State of Arizona, no matter what it does, cannot turn the recession around. Nevertheless, I will suggest a few methods that will help our state.

A greater emphasis on tourism, both in attracting outside visitors to our state and in encouraging Arizonans to explore the wonders of their own state.

A state housing authority with the ability to sell tax-exempt bonds, to provide construction jobs and the means for Arizonans of low and moderate income to have decent housing.

The investment of state retirement system funds in Arizona's financial structure in ways that directly stimulate the sagging portions of our economy without loss of security.

Promotion of western regional trade including joining the Federation of Rocky Mountain States and trade with Mexico by greater emphasis on the work of the Arizona-Mexico Commission. We can also improve our relations with Mexico and Latin America commercially, culturally and industrially.

Expansion of unemployment compensation benefits to assist those who may be in this distressing condition in the future. Last year's small increases in benefits are not adequate for today's needs, especially when matched against the additional restrictions placed on eligibility. This is not a year for political trade-offs with human needs, it is a time to meet genuine needs using the funds already provided for this specific purpose. Our trust fund is sufficient to do this without any increase in taxation.

Support for the Central Arizona Project which, when in full swing of construction, will also provide immediate jobs and long-term stimulus to the economy of our state.

In short, this administration will emphasize creation of employment rather than subsidization which erodes human dignity.

When considering the economy on an overall basis, the supply or rationing of energy can upset every other plan we adopt. If we are to assure our energy resources, we must improve our methods of energy-use inventory in Arizona and renew our efforts for energy conservation.

We should also support energy research projects, including the location of the federal solar energy research project in Arizona, and development of geothermal energy supplies.

We must review our existing energy allocation plans, to avoid, if at all possible, the chaos of last winter.

These steps will help, but they are only a start, not a complete solution. I am sure that as we work together we will generate other worthwhile proposals.

As I said in my inaugural speech, we must assure that our own house is in order as we face declining state revenues. This means that we must seek out and eliminate any duplication, inefficiency or waste in government services.

As one of the first acts of this administration, I have met with my budget staff and I will this week begin meeting with heads of major departments, boards and commissions, to work out the goals for reduced spending and ways of achieving and monitoring these goals.

A recommendation will be made that a goal of up to five per cent decrease in expenditures be sought.

A plan for reductions in cost of state government for the remainder of this fiscal year ending June 30, 1975 and a balanced budget for the next fiscal year will be presented. At the same time, this plan and budget should not try to hide expenses we know will occur, but should maintain a level of service consistent with our needs.

This budget will probably provide considerably smaller amounts for capital outlay than in prior years; I may on further study even have to request a review of funds appropriated but not yet committed.

I invite you to assist in this process by putting our state house in order by appropriate examinations of all state department operations, and a thorough scrutiny of their proposed budgets. There are many of you who have the expertise and experience required to join in this task.

A continuing resolution is recommended for the Program Information Project, to continue funding for this valuable method of monitoring state spending. I intend to expand this effort toward program budgeting to all state agencies, as it is one of the best methods of reviewing the cost benefits of programs as they are carried out.

Despite the pressure on state revenues, I do not believe this is a year to raise taxes because of the recessionary effects of such actions on the taxpayer and the state economy. Rather, I am

urging you to begin a long-term review of state tax policies to close loopholes and eliminate inequities and closely examine such tax related measures as homeowner's relief to ensure help to those who need it most. If it later proves necessary to raise taxes, I want to be able to tell the people of Arizona that we first took every available alternative.

There are other projects we can undertake, in the realm of reforming government operations, that will provide for greater control of governmental operations and costs at the appropriate level without significant budgetary impact.

One would be county home rule, to allow county residents to enact certain local laws, while also guaranteeing local elected offices.

Another is the adoption of a statewide land-use plan, on an incremental basis which must assure local autonomy supported by state assistance where required.

Having reviewed the economic challenges and suggested some possible solutions, we must now consider pressing social problems. Some of these may require modest additional spending, others may require changes in laws or policies, while others could be met simply by applying a new emphasis to existing programs.

Crime is increasing and remains a major problem. We must ensure that the average citizen and businessman feels and is safe in his home, on the streets, and at his job. This is a basic duty of any government, and I will give it very high priority.

This rising tide of narcotics continues as a serious threat to our children and our social fabric. We must step up efforts to eradicate narcotics from our society.

We can strengthen our consumer fraud laws, and our consumer protection measures, to protect both consumer and businessman and to restore confidence in the free marketplace.

The experience of other states has proven that laws to provide compensation for victims of crime can be put in force with relatively modest state spending and we should do so.

Organized crime is an increasing threat to every legitimate business and every citizen. Recent land fraud abuses point up the need for better law enforcement and reform of the Real Estate Commission and the Real Estate Department.

We have a progressive corrections system in our state which operates with the philosophy that it is possible to protect society and to rehabilitate those who wish it. There are several steps we can take to improve this system such as providing accreditation for the education programs within our correctional institutions.

The Legislature must decide on a site for the new medium security institution so that construction can begin. This decision has been avoided for far too long with resulting increases in cost and severe pressure on other institutions.

We need to continue modernizing the facilities and programs in our correctional institutions.

The main reason for these efforts is quite simply that this is the best and in the long run the most economical way to protect the public.

In order to improve the quality of life, including the health and environment in which we live, we need to look at a variety of programs.

We need new laws which will allow local municipalities to establish mass transit to meet their needs, but with suitable coordination at the state level.

We also need to reexamine and perhaps simplify our auto licensing system.

We must review the effects of our present environment on health, including air and noise pollution problems.

My departments of Health Security and Economic Security are now preparing a revised forecast of the costs of the new Medicaid program. You may be required to make changes in the existing law to make certain it meets our needs within our ability to pay.

We need to maintain medical services for the mentally retarded, crippled children, the aged and the mentally ill.

Civil rights of all our people must be assured through the law, and in the policies of our government.

Our state affirmative action program while strong on paper, has been criticized as weak in practice. I pledge that my administration will not tolerate hypocrisy in this area.

We must also renew our efforts to guarantee the elimination of any form of discrimination from our laws and our policies, whether it be based on sex, race, creed or color. And this year we must make special efforts towards achieving equality for women and for our Indian citizens.

Last year this Legislature went into the vanguard of the national civil rights movement by unanimously passing an excellent statute enabling the state to work effectively in the field of equal employment opportunity. The administrative agency is in the Attorney General's office. I want that agency adequately financed and adequately staffed so that it may effectively utilize the opportunity which the Legislature has given it.

Finally, the largest expenditure and the greatest responsibilities of state government are education of our children. The main responsibility is with the Superintendent of Public Instruction and you legislators; but as Governor, I feel obligated to point out areas that should receive your attention, depending on the limitations of our budget.

Our goal in education is to assure that every child has the opportunity to acquire the basic educational skills.

We need to expand the bilingual education programs. There are around 20,000 children now in these programs, but it must be recognized that over 100,000 children could benefit from these programs.

We need to expand career education and vocational-technical programs, including manpower retraining for people who are out of work because of the changes in our society.

Teachers and administrators must have the means to assure discipline and order in the classrooms without violating due process.

We can assure greater use of our expensive school buildings by allowing the use of school facilities for community education programs.

We should review and strengthen existing laws to clarify the powers, duties and accounting methods of various administrative levels of our educational system.

In closing, I should say that I certainly do not expect all of these problems to be solved nor all of my proposals to be enacted into law during this session.

However, I do expect that, by working together, we can make a good start on our new endeavor.

I will be Governor for four years, you will serve for two years. We will be judged on our accomplishments during that time. We must always keep in mind that people of vision can see beyond the horizon of a single day, a single session, and even a single term of office.

There have been many terms used to describe the different Legislatures and their accomplishments. I hope that when your Second Regular Session ends next year, and people reflect upon your accomplishments, that you'll be regarded as the "Legislature of Vision".

The proposed rules to govern the House of Representatives for the Thirty-second Legislature were read as follows:

HOUSE RULES

RULE 1

Officer and Employees

The House shall elect as an officer of the House a Speaker, and shall elect a Chief Clerk and such other employees, subject to limitation set by law, as it may desire.

There shall be an Administrative Officer and a Speaker's secretary, who shall be chosen by the Speaker.

Nominations for employees shall be submitted to the Administrative Officer.

The compensation of each employee shall be determined by the Speaker.

No person shall be employed as a House employee who is an agent for the prosecution of any claim against the state or who is interested in such claim otherwise than as an original claimant; and it shall be the duty of the Administrative Officer to inquire into and report to the House any violation in this rule.

All House employees shall be under the immediate direction of the Speaker of the House, who shall have the power to designate the person who shall be in immediate supervision of the different departments. Such employees shall perform the duties designated by the Administrative Officer, who also may discharge any employee by and with the consent and approval of the Speaker.

All employees of the House are prohibited to do lobbying of any nature whatsoever during the hours of their employment or at any other time, in or about the House Chambers or the lobbies connected therewith, or at any other place, during the term of their employment, and a violation of this rule will be sufficient cause for the summary discharge of the offending employees.

RULE 2

The Speaker

The Speaker shall take the Chair at the hour to which the House shall have adjourned, immediately call the members to order, cause the roll to be called, and, if a quorum be present, cause the Journal of the proceedings of the last day's sitting to be read, if requested by a majority of the members elected to the House.

He shall preserve order and decorum; decide all points of order subject to an appeal to the House, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, except by permission of the House; may speak to points of order in preference to other members; and may vote in all cases except to determine his own rulings.

He shall sign all acts, joint resolutions, addresses, writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by order of the House.

At each session the Speaker shall announce the order of business in conformity with Rule 16.

He shall declare all votes, but if any member doubts the vote, a rising vote shall be ordered, and the result declared.

All motions may be determined by a viva voce vote, teller, or on request of two members by a roll call, and, declaration of the result by the Speaker; provided that this rule shall not apply to Third Reading and Final Passage of a bill or joint resolution, nor to a motion to suspend the rules on Third Reading and Final Passage of a bill or joint resolution, nor to a proposal to amend the rules.

The Speaker may appoint a member to perform the duties of the Chair for a period of not to exceed 10 days; and in his omission to make such appointment, the House shall proceed to elect a Speaker Pro Tempore to act during his absence.

He shall have the general control of the halls of the House of Representatives, its corridors, passages and committee rooms.

All debts incurred by the House of Representatives, either during session or between sessions of the Legislature, shall be paid by claims drawn on the Department of Finance, and all claims so issued shall be signed by the Speaker.

The Speaker is authorized to call meetings of standing and select committees of the House during periods when the House is not in session, and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance thereon, as provided by law.

The Speaker shall be responsible for keeping the accounts for the pay, mileage and subsistence of members and employees, and pay them as provided by law.

RULE 3

The Chief Clerk

The Chief Clerk shall prepare copies of the Calendar of the Committee of the Whole House, and deliver the same to the members, and prepare such other memoranda as the House or Speaker may direct.

The Chief Clerk shall transmit to the Senate every bill or other measure, immediately after its passage, to which concurrence is necessary.

The Chief Clerk shall carry all messages from the House to the Senate and Governor, unless the House shall otherwise direct; and shall perform such additional duties as may be assigned by the House or Speaker.

RULE 4

Suspension of the Rules

No rule of the House shall be suspended except by a vote of two-thirds of those voting, a quorum being present.

If demanded, a motion to suspend the rules shall be approved by a majority of the entire membership before being submitted to the House for a two-thirds vote as provided in paragraph 1 of this rule.

A motion for suspension of the rules shall be decided without debate.

RULE 5

Members

Every member shall be present within the Hall of the House during its sitting, unless excused by the Speaker prior to roll call or necessarily prevented.

Any member having obtained leave of absence, and having in his possession papers relative to business before the House shall leave same with the Chief Clerk.

Any member shall have the right to protest and have the reasons of his protest entered in the Journal (Const. Art. IV, Part 2, Sec. 16) subject to provisions of Rule 19. Any member rising to speak on protest shall be allowed to speak for a period not to exceed 10 minutes.

The House may punish its members for disorderly behavior, and may, with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to the House, expel any member. (Const. Art. IV, Part 2, Sec. 11). A violation of any of these rules shall be deemed disorderly behavior.

When any member shall be guilty of a breach of any of the rules and orders of the House, and the House has determined that he has so transgressed, he shall not be permitted to vote or speak, except by way of excuse for the same, until he has made satisfaction.

It is the sense of this Body that each member-elect of the Legislature, before or at the time of taking the oath of office, be required to file with the Chief Clerk of the House an affidavit, sworn to before an official qualified to administer oaths, and executed within the thirty-day period immediately preceding his induction, that he is not and has never been a member of the Communist Party or affiliated with such Party, and that he does not believe in, is not a member of, and does not support any organization that believes in or teaches the overthrow of the United States Government by force or by any illegal or unconstitutional methods.

RULE 5.1

Financial Disclosure

A. In this rule, unless the context otherwise requires:

1. "Compensation" means money, thing of value, financial benefit, or economic advantage, but shall not include political campaign contributions.
2. "Immediate family" means the member's spouse and any minor child of whom the member has legal custody.
3. "Member" means any member.
4. "Person" includes a corporation, company, partnership, firm, association or society as well as a natural person.

B. In addition to other statements and reports required by law, every member, as a matter of public record, shall file with the Secretary of State a verified statement disclosing:

1. The name of the member and each member of his immediate family and all names under which they do business.

2. Identification of any employer and of every other source of compensation amounting to more than five hundred dollars annually received by the member and his immediate family in their own names, or by any other person for the use or benefit of the member or his immediate family and a brief description of the nature of the services for which the compensation was received, except that this paragraph shall not be construed to require the disclosure of information that may be privileged by law nor the disclosure of individual items of compensation that constitute a portion of the gross income of the business or profession from which the member or his immediate family derives compensation.

3. The name of every corporation, trust, business trust, partnership, or association in which the member and his immediate family, or any other person for the use or benefit of the member or his immediate family, have an investment or holdings of over one thousand dollars at fair market value as of the date of this statement, or in which the member or his immediate family holds any office or has a fiduciary relationship, together with description of the investment, office or relationship, except that this paragraph shall not be construed to require the disclosure of investments in mutual funds, bonds or stocks traded on a major stock or bond exchange or persons acting as statutory agents for service of process.

4. All real property interests by legal description and location to which either the member or his immediate family holds legal title to, or a beneficial interest in, excluding the residence and property used primarily for personal recreation by the member or his immediate family.

5. The names of all persons to whom the member and his immediate family, in their own names or in the name of any other person, owe more than one thousand dollars, except that

this paragraph shall not be construed to require the disclosure of debts owed by the member or his immediate family resulting from the ordinary conduct of a business or profession, nor debts on the residence of the member or his immediate family, nor debts on any real property used primarily for personal recreation by the member or his immediate family, nor debts arising out of secured transactions for the purchases of consumer goods, nor debts secured by cash values on life insurance, nor debts owed to relatives.

6. The identification of all accounts receivable exceeding one thousand dollars held by the member and his immediate family in their own names, or by any other person for the use or benefit of the member or his immediate family. This paragraph shall not be construed to require the disclosure of information that may be privileged by law, nor the disclosure of debts owed to the member or his immediate family resulting from the ordinary conduct of a business or profession.

7. The source of each gift of more than five hundred dollars received by the member and his immediate family in their own names, or by any other person for the use or benefit of the member or his immediate family except gifts received by will or by virtue of intestate succession, or received by way of distribution from any inter vivos or testamentary trust established by a spouse or by an ancestor, or gifts received from relatives. Political campaign contributions shall not be construed as gifts.

8. A description of all professional and occupational licenses in which either a member or his immediate family has an interest, issued by any state department, agency, commission, institution, or instrumentality, including the name in which the license is issued, the type of business or profession, and its location.

C. The statement required to be filed pursuant to this rule shall be filed by each member within fifteen days following the adoption of this rule and the distribution of forms for this purpose and thereafter on or before the 31st day of January of each year except that in the case of a member appointed to fill a vacancy, within fifteen days following the seating of such member.

D. Every member shall file an amended statement with the Secretary of State within thirty days following any change in the information required by subsection B of this rule.

E. Failure of any member to comply with any of the provisions of this rule shall constitute grounds for disciplinary action as provided by law or these rules.

RULE 5.2

Standards of Conduct

A. Except as otherwise prescribed by rule or law, no member shall:

1. Use or attempt to use his official position to secure anything of value or benefit for himself or his immediate family that would not ordinarily accrue to him in the performance of his official duties, which thing of value or benefit is of such character as to manifest a substantial and improper influence upon him with respect to his duties.

2. Receive or agree to receive directly or indirectly any compensation as defined in Rule 5.1 from any source except the State of Arizona for any service, advice, assistance or other matter related to the legislative process except fees for speeches or published works on legislative subjects, and except in connection therewith reimbursement for expenses for actual expenditures for travel and reasonable subsistence for which no payment or reimbursement is made by the State of Arizona.

3. Wilfully and knowingly disclose for compensation as defined in Rule 5.1 to any other person or entity confidential information acquired by him in the course of and by reason of his official duties, or use such information for the purpose of such compensation.

4. Participate by voting, or in any other action on the floor or in committee or elsewhere, in the enactment or defeat of legislation in which he has a personal interest unless he complies with subparagraph (b) of this paragraph. This paragraph shall not be

construed to prohibit any legislative officer from discharging his official duties as such officer. A member shall be deemed to have a personal interest in any legislation within the meaning of this paragraph where his personal or private right, distinct from his public interest, is immediately concerned, and in each instance where he has a direct personal pecuniary interest in the question.

(a) If a member believes that because of a personal interest he should abstain from participating in any vote on third reading or final passage of any legislation, he shall, prior to the commencement of the vote, file a written statement with the Chief Clerk, which shall be noted on the Journal and placed on file in the office of the Chief Clerk, setting forth the details of his personal interest as it relates to the pending legislation and, after so advising the presiding officer, he shall be excused from voting.

(b) If the member has reason to believe that he may have a personal interest, he may participate in voting on legislation without violating any provision of this rule if, prior to the commencement of the vote, he files a written statement with the Chief Clerk, which shall be noted on the Journal and placed on file in the office of the Chief Clerk, setting forth the details of his personal interest as it relates to the pending legislation, and including the statement that notwithstanding such personal interest he is able to cast a fair and objective vote on such legislation.

5. Appear on behalf of another person, firm, corporation, or entity before any state department, agency, board, commission, institution, or instrumentality in any manner for which he is being compensated. The provision of this paragraph shall not:

(a) Apply to any hearing or proceeding which is adversary in character, or on which a record of such hearing or proceeding is made by the agency involved, or such appearance is a matter of public record.

(b) Preclude a member from acting on behalf of a constituent to determine the status of a matter before a state department, agency, board, commission, institution, or instrumentality without accepting compensation therefor.

RULE 6

Questions of Privilege

“Questions of Privilege” are those questions which relate to the rights and privileges of the Body or of its members in their official capacity, and should be distinguished from “privileged questions” which are a class of motions having the highest precedence.

“Questions of Privilege” shall be:

(1) “Privilege of the House” which affects the rights of the House, collectively, its safety, dignity, and integrity of its proceedings and has the highest precedence.

(2) “Personal Privilege” which relates to the rights, reputation and conduct of members individually, in their respective capacity only; and shall have precedence of all other questions, except motion to adjourn.

Any member rising to a point of personal privilege upon being recognized shall first state the point and shall be allowed to speak for a period not to exceed 10 minutes.

RULE 7

Committees

Standing Committees of the House shall consist of the following:

Agriculture to consist of fifteen (15) members.

Appropriations to consist of thirteen (13) members.

Banking & Insurance to consist of fifteen (15) members.

Commerce to consist of fifteen (15) members.

Counties & Municipalities to consist of eleven (11) members.

Education to consist of fifteen (15) members.

Government Operations to consist of fifteen (15) members.

Health to consist of fifteen (15) members.

Human Resources to consist of fifteen (15) members.

Judiciary to consist of fifteen (15) members.

Natural Resources to consist of thirteen (13) members.

Ways & Means to consist of fifteen (15) members.

Each standing committee shall adopt and file with the Chief Clerk rules of procedure consistent with the rules of the House and shall include the following:

A. With the exception of executive sessions ordered by a majority of the committee constituting a quorum, all committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as the proper decorum is maintained.

B. All committees will meet at regularly scheduled times and places. In the absence of the chairman, the vice chairman shall preside. In the absence of both the chairman and vice chairman, some other committee member designated by the Speaker shall preside. Special meetings may be called at the option of the chairman. However, such meetings shall be announced on the floor of the House in open session. Regularly scheduled meetings can be cancelled only with the concurrence of the Speaker.

C. The committee chairman (presiding officer) shall prepare an agenda and distribute a copy of the same to committee members and the Chief Clerk's office by 4:00 p.m. each Thursday.

D. A bill not on the chairman's agenda shall be scheduled for discussion at the next subsequent committee meeting by presentation of a petition containing the signatures of two-thirds or more of the committee members.

E. Committee chairmen shall announce public hearings no less than 24 hours prior thereto.

F. Committee minutes shall be filed with the Chief Clerk's office within 72 hours from time of completion of meetings. Attendance records of all committee meetings shall be filed with the Chief Clerk's office within 24 hours from time of completion of meetings.

Reports of Standing Committees shall be considered in the order fixed by the House upon reports from the Committee on Rules; provided, however, that reports from the following committees concerning matters herein named shall have precedence, and may be received at any time:

The Committee on Rules, joint rules and order of business; rules relating to the order of consideration of bills;

The Committee on Judiciary on the right of a member to his seat;

The Committee on Ways & Means on bills for raising revenue;

The Committee on Appropriations on all matters referred to it;

A Conference Committee concerning the subjects given precedence by the rule.

When a report of a committee is ordered to be printed, this shall include printing the views of the minority.

All committees, except such as the House shall select, shall be appointed by the Speaker.

To discharge a committee, other than the Committee on Rules, from further consideration of any bill or resolution which may have been referred to such committee more than 10 days prior, a motion containing the signatures of two-thirds of the elected members of the House must be filed with the Chief Clerk. Such motion shall be entered in the Journal and shall be recognized in the order in which the motions were filed.

Upon the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of the House, the Committee on Rules may be instructed to report for consideration by the Committee of the Whole House any bill which has been received from the Standing Committee to which it was referred.

No committee other than the Committee on Rules shall sit during the sitting of the House without special leave of the Speaker.

RULE 7.1

Ethics Committee

A. There shall be an Ethics Committee, a select committee composed of five members and two alternates appointed by the Speaker. The Majority and Minority shall have at least two members of the Majority and Minority on the Ethics Committee. Vacancies occurring in the membership of the committee shall be filled in the same manner.

B. The committee shall make rules governing its own proceedings and may act jointly with the Senate Ethics Committee.

C. Prior to the issuance of a subpoena by the committee with respect to any matter before the committee, it shall, by a resolution adopted by a majority of its members, define the nature and scope of its investigation in the matter before it.

D. Funds for the support of the committee shall be provided from the contingent funds of the body in the same manner that such funds are made available to other committees of the body.

E. The committee shall have power, pursuant to the provisions of this rule, to investigate and make findings and recommendations concerning alleged violations by members of the body of the provisions of these rules.

F. Any person may: (1) file with the Ethics Committee a verified complaint in writing which shall state the name of the member alleged to have committed the violation complained of, and which shall set forth in detail the particulars thereof, or (2) file a complaint concerning the alleged violation by a member with the county attorney of the appropriate county. If a person files a complaint with respect to any alleged violation by a member with the committee, and thereafter a complaint to institute a criminal prosecution for such violation is filed with the appropriate county attorney, the committee may suspend its investigation and hearings until final adjudication of the criminal

matter. The committee shall accept the filing of complaints concerning members only as long as the member remains in the Legislature.

G. If the committee determines that the verified complaint does not allege facts, directly or upon information and belief, sufficient to constitute a violation of any of the provisions of these rules, it shall dismiss the complaint and notify the complainant and respondent thereof. If the committee determines that such verified complaint does allege facts, directly or upon information and belief, sufficient to constitute a violation of any of the provisions of these rules, the committee shall promptly investigate the alleged violation and, if after such preliminary investigation, the committee finds that probable cause exists for believing the allegations of the complaint, it shall fix a time for a hearing in the matter, which shall be not more than thirty days after such finding. If, after the preliminary investigation, the committee finds that probable cause does not exist for believing the allegations of the complaint, the committee shall dismiss the complaint. In either event the committee shall notify the complainant and respondent of its determination.

H. After the complaint has been filed, the respondent shall be entitled to examine and make copies of all evidence in the possession of the committee relating to the complaint.

I. If a hearing is to be held pursuant to subdivision G the committee, before the hearing has commenced, shall issue subpoenas and subpoenas duces tecum at the request of any party in accordance with the provisions of law.

J. At any hearing held by the committee:

1. Oral evidence shall be taken only on oath or affirmation.
2. Each party shall have the right to be represented by legal counsel; to call and examine witnesses; to introduce exhibits; and to cross-examine opposing witnesses.
3. The hearing shall be open to the public unless the respondent requests the hearing to be closed to the public and the committee accedes to such request.

K. Any official or other person whose name is mentioned at any investigation or hearing of the committee and who believes that testimony has been given which adversely affects him, shall have the right to testify or, at the discretion of the committee, to file a written statement of facts under oath relating solely to the material relevant to the testimony of which he complains.

L. After the hearing, the committee shall state its findings of fact. If the committee finds that the member has not violated any of the provisions of these rules, it shall order the action dismissed, notify the respondent and complainant thereof, and transmit a copy of the complaint and the fact of dismissal to the Attorney General and to the county attorney of the appropriate county. If the committee finds that the respondent has violated any of the provisions of these rules, it shall state its findings of fact and submit a report thereon to the body, send a copy of such findings and report to the complainant and respondent and to the Attorney General and county attorney of the appropriate county.

M. Nothing in this rule shall preclude any person from instituting a prosecution for violation of any law.

N. The filing of a complaint with the committee pursuant to this rule suspends the running of the statute of limitations applicable to any violation of the provisions of these rules while such complaint is pending.

O. The committee shall maintain a record of its investigations, inquiries, and proceedings. All records, complaints, documents, reports and transcripts of any investigations, inquiries or hearings of the committee under this rule shall be deemed confidential and shall not be open to inspection by any person other than a member of the committee, an employee of the committee, or a state employee designated to assist the committee, except as otherwise specifically provided in this rule. The committee may, by adoption of a resolution, authorize the release to the Attorney General or to the county attorney of the appropriate county of the information, records, complaints, documents, reports, and transcripts in its possession material to any matter pending before the Attorney General or the county attorney. All matters presented at a public hearing of the committee and all reports of the committee stating a final finding of fact pursuant to subdivision L shall be public records and open to public inspection.

P. All actions of the committee shall require the concurrence of three members of the committee.

Q. The committee shall, upon the request of any member, or whenever in its judgment the public interest requires, render advisory opinions with regard to questions concerning these rules or legislative ethics. The committee may secure an opinion from the Attorney General for this purpose or issue its own opinion.

R. The committee shall provide a continuing program of education and information for members with regard to the provisions of these rules and provisions of law relating to conduct and ethics and shall recommend legislation relating to legislative ethics as it deems necessary.

S. The Ethics Committee shall periodically review all members' written statements filed pursuant to ARS 38-541 through 38-543 and, if necessary, render advisory opinions to the members filing such statements.

T. A member of the Ethics Committee shall disqualify himself from participation in any particular matter in which he is the subject of inquiry. Upon such disqualification by any committee member, one of the alternate members, representing the same Majority or Minority interests as the disqualified member, shall be selected by the committee to serve as a temporary replacement member to enable the committee to complete its action on that matter in which the regular committee member was disqualified.

RULE 8

Calendars; Consent Calendar

CALENDARS. There shall be calendars to which all business reported from committees shall be referred, viz:

A House Calendar on which shall be entered all bills and other measures in the order reported from the committees, and such business as the House may directly place upon the calendar for consideration.

The Active Calendar of the Committee of the Whole House on which shall be entered in the order reported by the Committee on

Rules and ordered by the House, all bills and other measures referred to the Committee of the Whole; provided, however, that reports given precedence in Rule 7, shall have precedence on this calendar.

CONSENT CALENDAR. The Consent Calendar shall be set by the Committee on Rules and shall consist of select unamended bills reported out of all committees to which they were referred. It shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk and posted on the bulletin board three working days prior to being accepted. Any member who wishes to protest any bill by-passing the Committee of the Whole may submit his protest in writing to the Chief Clerk's office with a copy for the Speaker's office during the three-day posting and this protest will automatically remove the bill from the Consent Calendar and return it to the Committee on Rules. The bills remaining on the Consent Calendar will then be read by number and title (Second Reading), automatically be sent for engrossing and then placed on the Third Reading Calendar.

RULE 9

Decorum and Debate

When a member desires to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the House, or make, or second a motion, he shall rise and address himself to "Mr. Speaker," and on being recognized may address the House; he shall confine himself to the question under debate and avoid personalities. No member shall impeach or impugn motives of any other member's argument or vote.

When a measure is presented for consideration to the House or in Committee of the Whole, the introducer of such measure shall be entitled to recognition to open the debate; in his absence, this right of recognition shall pass to the senior member of the Committee reporting the measure who signed a favorable report thereon.

When two or more members rise, the Speaker shall name the member who is to speak, but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first.

No member shall interrupt another while speaking, except to call to order or to correct a mistake.

No member shall speak more than 10 minutes on any question except as further provided in this rule.

No member shall speak more than 5 minutes on any amendment to the question, except as further provided in this rule.

No member shall speak more than once on any question, provided, however, that the sponsor of a bill or question shall have 10 minutes to open and 10 minutes to close debate. Any member desiring to speak more than once, or more than 10 minutes on any question, or more than once or more than 5 minutes on any amendment to the question, shall be accorded the privilege without objection or upon a motion supported by two-thirds of the members elected to the House.

No member shall be permitted to stand up to the interruption of another while any member is speaking, or pass unnecessarily between the Speaker and the person speaking, or other persons be permitted to stand in the aisles during the session of the House.

No member shall be permitted to indulge in personalities; use language personally offensive; arraign motives of members; charge deliberate misrepresentation; or use language tending to hold a member of the House or Senate up to contempt.

If any member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the member calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Chief Clerk's desk and read aloud to the House, but he shall not be held to answer or be subject to the censure of the House therefor if further debate or other business has intervened.

If any member in speaking, or otherwise, transgresses the rules of the House, the Speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case he shall immediately sit down unless permitted to explain, and the House shall if appealed to, decide the case without debate; if the decision is in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed, but not otherwise; and, if the case requires it, he shall be liable to censure or such punishment as the House may deem proper.

There shall be no debate at the Third Reading or Final Passage of a bill except by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to the House.

A second shall be required on every motion except in the Committee of the Whole.

RULE 10

Roll Call; Quorum; Call of the House

ROLL CALL. Upon every roll call the names of the members shall be called alphabetically by surnames; when members have the same or similar surnames, the designation of the district shall be added.

QUORUM. The majority of the members elected to the House shall constitute a quorum to do business, but a smaller number may meet, adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as the House may prescribe. The House shall not adjourn for more than three (3) days, between the day of adjournment and the day of reconvening, exclusive of Sundays and holidays, nor to any place other than that in which it may be sitting, without the consent of the Senate. (Const. Art. IV, Part 2, Sec. 9.)

CALL OF THE HOUSE. The purpose of the Call of the House is to compel the attendance of absent members.

A motion or demand for a Call of the House is not debatable or amendable and may not be laid on the table, postponed, referred to committee or have other subsidiary motions applied to it.

(1) **NO QUORUM PRESENT.** When no quorum is present a Call of the House takes precedence over all other motions. Any member may raise the question of no quorum, and if a quorum is not present, the House must either order a Call of the House, recess or adjourn. The motion for a Call of the House is agreed to by a majority of those voting, but may not be ordered by less than 10 members including the Speaker.

(2) **QUORUM PRESENT.** When a quorum is present, a Call of the House ranks as a "question of privilege". A Call of the House may

be ordered by a majority of the members voting, provided the minimum number authorized to order a Call of the House is present.

When a Call of the House has been ordered the doors are closed, the Chief Clerk calls the roll of members and notes the absentees. The Sergeant at Arms shall forthwith proceed to bring in absent members until two-thirds of the members elected to the House are present, and present them at the bar of the House, whereupon, the members shall be noted as present, discharged from custody, be given an opportunity to vote, and their vote shall be recorded.

RULE 11

**Privileged Questions, Motions,
Their Precedence, Etc.**

“Privileged Questions” are a class of motions which have the highest precedence.

When a motion has been made the Speaker shall state it or if it be in writing cause it to be read aloud by the Chief Clerk before being debated; it shall then be in possession of the House, but may be withdrawn at any time before debate begins or amendment is offered. No motion shall be recognized without the member rising and addressing the Chair.

All motions shall be reduced to writing, if requested by the presiding officer or by a member, and shall be entered on the Journal with the name of the member making it, and shall be read before the same shall be debated.

When the question is under debate no motion shall be received but:

These several motions shall have precedence in the foregoing order, and no motion to postpone to a time certain, to refer, or to postpone indefinitely, being the same day at the same stage of the question decided, shall again be allowed on the motion.

On demand of a member, before the question is put, a question shall be divided if it includes propositions so distinct in substance that one being taken away a substantive proposition shall remain.

No dilatory motion shall be entertained by the Speaker.

RULE 12

Lay on Table; Previous Question; Postponement

LAY ON THE TABLE. The motion to lay on the table is used for final adverse disposition of a matter without debate and is in order before the member entitled to prior recognition for debate

has begun his remarks. The motion is applicable to (1) a motion to reconsider, (2) postpone to a day certain, (3) question of privilege, and (4) appeal from decision of the Chair, but may not be made after the previous question is ordered.

A motion to table a bill carries pending motions connected therewith; and when a proposed amendment is laid on the table the pending bill goes there also. A motion to table a motion to reconsider the vote by which an amendment has been agreed to would not carry the bill to the table.

The motion to lay on the table cannot be applied to the motions for (1) the previous question, (2) to suspend the rules, (3) to commit after the previous question is ordered, or (4) to any motion relating to the order of business, except the motion to discharge a committee.

The motion to lay on the table is not subject to amendment or debate and requires a majority of the membership. To take a bill from the table requires a majority of the membership.

PREVIOUS QUESTION. The previous question shall be put in the following form: "Those in favor of ordering the previous question will vote aye, those opposed will vote nay."

The motion for the previous question, when agreed to, has the effect of cutting off all debate and bringing the House to a direct vote upon pending amendments, if any, in their order, and then upon the main question. Except that after the previous question has been ordered, each side shall be allowed five (5) minutes, the affirmative closing the debate.

When the member entitled to speak under this rule is absent, the member standing first in order upon the committee reporting the measure, who is present and joined in the report, shall have the right to occupy such time.

After the previous question has been ordered on the passage of a measure one motion to recommit shall be in order. The previous question is not debatable or amendable and requires a majority of those voting.

POSTPONEMENT. The motions to postpone are two in number and distinct (1) to a day certain, and (2) indefinitely.

TO A DAY CERTAIN. The motion is in order immediately after the approval of the Journal unless displaced by more highly privileged business. The motion is subject to amendment, debatable within narrow limits only (the merits of the bill to which it is applied not being within those limits) and requires a majority of those voting.

INDEFINITELY. The motion opens to debate all merits of the proposition to which it is applied. It is not applied to motions to refer, suspend the rules, or resolve into a Committee of the Whole. The motion cannot be amended and requires a majority of those voting.

The postponement motions are not in order in the Committee of the Whole until after the measure has been thoroughly discussed and are not made in direct form.

RULE 13

Reconsideration

When a motion has been made and carried or lost, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side, on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter, to move for the reconsideration thereof at a time certain not to exceed seven days, and such motion shall not be amended and shall be immediately disposed of. Such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn or the consideration of a conference report.

The motion to reconsider is adopted by an affirmative vote of a majority of those voting, even when the vote reconsidered is on a matter that requires two-thirds or more of those voting for affirmative action. On motion to reconsider, the ayes and nays having been acted on, another motion to reconsider is not in order.

No bill, petition, memorial or resolution, referred to a committee shall be brought back into the House on a motion to reconsider.

When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order or measure, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the House, and has been committed to the Senate, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the Senate to return the same, which last motion shall be acted upon immediately, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider.

RULE 14

**Bills, Resolutions, Memorials, Engrossed
Copies and Amendments**

Every bill, resolution and memorial shall be read by sections on three different days, unless in case of emergency, two-thirds of the House deem it expedient to dispense with this rule. The vote on Third Reading and Final Passage of any bill, resolution or memorial shall be taken by ayes and nays on roll call. Final Passage shall be the final disposition of a bill by the House (refer to Const., Art. IV, Part 2, Sec. 12).

(1) Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced by a member or a committee by presenting 30 copies of such bill, resolution or memorial to the office of the Chief Clerk. The Chief Clerk shall have 24 hours to process such bill, resolution or memorial preceding the day of actual introduction. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the first page. Introductions "by request" shall be so designated. A bill introduced in the House may be co-sponsored by Senate members in which case the blue copy shall have the signatures of the House members on the right-hand side, with the main sponsor signing on the line so provided, and the Senate members shall sign on the left-hand side.

(2) Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced during the first 36 days of the first regular session, during the first 29 days of the second regular session and during the first 10 days of a special session. Thereafter introduction may be allowed only with the permission of the Rules Committee.

(3) Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in the first regular session during the period following the filing of the certification of election until the first

day of the first regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in the second regular session during the period from November 15 next preceding the second regular session until the first day of the second regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in any special session during the period following the Governor's proclamation until the first day of the special session, such bills being germane to the call.

A bill, resolution or memorial shall be prefiled in the same manner prescribed for introduction. Bills, resolutions and memorials prefiled for introduction pursuant to this rule shall be deemed to have been actually introduced on the first day of each regular or special session, however, the name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the first page of the bill, resolution or memorial at the time of prefiling.

(4) Bills, resolutions and memorials accepted for introduction shall be entered in the Journal by the Chief Clerk.

(5) The original of a bill, resolution or memorial shall be designated by blue backing, endorsed "original" and shall remain in the possession of the Chief Clerk. The chairman of each committee to which a bill, resolution or memorial is referred shall receive one copy endorsed "committee copy". Subsequent copies shall be endorsed and distributed as the Speaker directs.

(6) All bills prepared for introduction which propose to amend existing statutes shall show the new language in capital letters (upper case) and the deletions shall be shown in regular type (lower case) lined through. New language to be added to the statutes shall be shown in capital letters (upper case).

(7) On first reading of bills, memorials or resolutions, the measure shall be referred to the Chief Clerk for printing. Unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker, no less than 250 copies nor more than 3,000 copies of any bill, memorial or resolution shall be duplicated.

Upon request by any member, a bill deemed to contain anything which is not a proper subject of legislation, or which contains language that is insulting or derogatory, shall immediately be

referred to the Committee on Rules. The Rules Committee shall carefully examine the measure and shall immediately report its findings to the House. No bill, resolution or memorial shall be duplicated or referred to committees if the Committee on Rules finds that such measure contains anything that is not a proper subject of legislation or contains language that is insulting or derogatory.

(8) On first reading all bills, resolutions or memorials shall be referred by the Speaker to appropriate committees. Each committee shall carefully consider the measure and report it back to the House with such recommendation as may be deemed proper. All amendments proposed by the Committee shall be separately reported.

When the first committee reports the measure to the House, the Speaker places it on the House Calendar (Inactive Calendar). When the last committee to which the measure was referred reports to the House, it is the property of the Committee on Rules, which considers the measure. The Committee on Rules sets the order of the measures on the Active Calendar for the consideration of the Committee of the Whole no less than one week after it has determined if the measure is constitutional and in proper form, provided that the Committee on Rules may advance a measure to an earlier Active Calendar by a majority vote of those constituting a quorum.

The Speaker may direct that any bill be second read at the time of its consideration by the Committee of the Whole or on any day prior thereto.

When the Committee of the Whole has completed its deliberations it is dissolved and reports to the House. By motion the report of the Committee of the Whole is adopted by the House (or amended) and the Speaker properly assigns the House measures (or amended Senate measures) to be engrossed for Third Reading.

(9) The original and two copies of each engrossed measure shall be stamped on each page thereof with the blind embossed stamp of the House. All engrossed pages not having a full complement of typed lines shall be marked from the end of the typed page to within one inch of the end of such page. The original House engrossed copy shall have a green backing.

The engrossed measure shall not be subject to amendment and shall be placed under the Order of Business, Third Reading of Bills, and the vote shall be on the Final Passage of the measure, which shall be put by the Speaker as a matter of course.

(10) The House shall provide the Senate with 75 copies and the Legislative Council with five copies of each amended engrossed House measure on green paper with a cover page or pages showing the page and line number of each adopted House amendment thereto. For House amendments to Senate measures, the same number of copies shall be provided but shall consist only of those pages containing the adopted House amendments and cover page or pages showing the page and line number of such House amendments. For unamended House measures the same number of green cover pages shall be provided stating that the measure passed as introduced, which will be identical to the original and printed copies.

(11) All bills, resolutions, memorials and engrossed measures shall be line-numbered and such numbering shall begin with the enacting clause. Uniform sized paper, 8½" x 11", shall be used.

(12) Amendments shall have uniform headings and shall read "amendment to" and shall be in the same form as the original bill. The amendment shall refer to page and line number only and when referring to more than one line shall read "lines _____ through _____". If everything after the enacting clause is stricken the amendment shall read "strike everything after the enacting clause". All amendments shall contain the language which states "amend title to conform".

(13) Substitute bills shall bear the number of the original it displaces but the words "substitute bill" shall be prefixed to the number.

RULE 15

Voting; Voting by Electric Roll Call System

VOTING. No member shall be permitted to vote unless present in person to cast his vote.

When a question is put every member who shall be within the hall of the House shall give his vote, aye or nay, unless he is excluded by interest, or is excused by the House.

When the ayes and nays are ordered no member shall leave his seat until the vote is declared. The roll will be called once only, unless a member passed.

In all elections by the House no member shall leave his seat after voting before the result is declared.

A member may change his vote after the roll call has been completed and before announcement of the result, but not thereafter.

Every member shall have the privilege of explaining his vote; such explanation shall not exceed ten minutes, and shall further be permitted to have his written explanation placed on file in the office of the Chief Clerk and the Journal shall so show.

VOTING BY ELECTRIC ROLL CALL SYSTEM. In all cases where a rule of the House of Representatives refers to "roll call", such reference shall be understood to refer also to the "taking" of the vote by an electrical roll call system.

When taking the ayes and nays on any question to be voted upon, the electrical roll call system, so-called, may be used, and when so used shall have the same force and effect as a roll call taken as otherwise provided in these rules.

When the House is ready to vote upon any question requiring a roll call, and the vote is to be taken by the electrical roll call system, the Speaker shall announce: "You have heard the motion" or "You have heard the _____ reading of (designating the matter to be voted upon). Those in favor will vote aye. Those opposed will vote nay. Do not vote until you hear the bell ring. The House will now proceed to vote."

When sufficient time has been allowed the members to vote, the Speaker shall announce: "Have you all voted?" and after a short pause shall say: "The Clerk will now record the vote."

The Chief Clerk shall immediately start the recording equipment, and when completely recorded, shall present the result to the Speaker, who shall announce same to the House. The Chief Clerk shall enter upon the Journal the result in the manner provided by the rules of the House.

No member shall vote for another, nor shall any person not a member cast a vote for a member. In addition to such penalties as may be prescribed by law, any member who shall vote or attempt to vote for another member may be punished in such manner as the House may determine. If a person not a member shall vote or attempt to vote for any member he shall be barred from the floor of the House for the remainder of the session and may be further punished in such manner as the House may deem proper, in addition to such punishment as may be prescribed by law.

RULE 16

Order of Business

The House shall convene at the call of the Speaker each day during the legislative session unless a different time or day is fixed by the Body. The daily Order of Business shall be as follows:

1. Roll Call
2. Prayer by the Chaplain
3. Pledge of Allegiance
4. Approval of the Journal
5. Petitions, Memorials and Remonstrances
6. Reports of Standing Committees
7. Reports of Select Committees
8. Business on the Speaker's Desk
9. Bills and Other Business from the Senate
10. Motions to Discharge Committees

Business shall be taken up and shall be considered only when the class to which it belongs shall be declared to be in order.

At any time after the reading and approval of the Journal any member may authorize a motion to be made that the House go into Committee of the Whole for the consideration of bills raising revenue or the general appropriation bill.

Messages from the Governor, reports and communications from heads of departments, or other communications to the House, and messages from the Senate, may be referred directly to appropriate committees.

When Senate bills are received, which are similar to House bills which have already been favorably reported by the Committee of the Whole, they may be substituted for such House bills and referred, after a First and Second Reading, to the Order of Business held by the similar House Bill.

RULE 17

Committee of the Whole House

When the House shall determine to go into a Committee of the Whole, the Speaker shall leave the Chair after appointing a chairman to preside.

A majority of the members of the House shall constitute a quorum to do business in Committee of the Whole.

When a Committee of the Whole finds itself without a quorum the Chairman shall cause the roll to be called, and thereupon the Committee shall rise and the Chairman shall report the names of the absentees to the House, and such names shall be entered in the Journal. If on such roll call a quorum shall appear, the Committee shall thereupon resume its sitting without further order of the House.

In a Committee of the Whole business shall be transacted in accordance with its priority on the Calendar; unless such priority be determined by the House before going into Committee of the Whole.

In Committee of the Whole the rules of the House shall govern whenever applicable.

No roll call vote shall be taken in Committee of the Whole.

In the Committee of the Whole all questions shall be decided by a majority of those voting.

No seconds are required to motions in Committee of the Whole.

In the Committee of the Whole the bill shall first be read through by the Chief Clerk, unless the Committee shall otherwise order. This shall constitute second reading of the bill unless it has been previously second read. After the proper motion the bill is open to debate and amendment.

When a bill is under debate in the Committee of the Whole, the following recommendations are in order:

1. Do pass
2. Re-committed to a committee for further study
3. Do pass as amended
4. Postpone indefinitely (This motion is not recommended until after the measure has been thoroughly discussed)
5. Do not pass

RULE 18

Sitting as in Committee of the Whole

The House may by majority vote of those voting sit as in Committee of the Whole for consideration of any subject. It may deal with disorder; take roll call vote; adjourn; refer and use previous question.

RULE 19

The Journal

The House shall keep a Journal of its proceedings and at the request of two members the ayes and nays on roll call on any question shall be entered. (Const., Art. IV, Part 2, Sec. 10.)

The Chief Clerk shall keep the Journal of the House, and enter therein the record of each day's proceedings, including every question of order which shall be decided on appeal, with the decision thereon.

Every motion made to the House, and entertained by the Speaker, shall be entered in the Journal with the name of the member making it, unless it be withdrawn the same day.

The Chief Clerk shall enter in the Journal the hour of adjournment of each session of the House.

The protest of any member, not exceeding 200 words, may be entered in the Journal, but the language thereof shall impute no unworthy motive to any other House or Senate member nor transgress the rules of the House relating to language used in debate.

RULE 20

Executive Session

Upon a motion, carried by a majority vote of all members elected to the House, the House may resolve itself into Executive Session for the discussion of any business which may, in the opinion of the House membership, require secrecy. The Speaker may direct the chambers and galleries to be cleared, except such personnel as the Speaker may deem necessary, and during the discussion the doors shall remain closed. While in Executive Session the rules of the House shall apply.

RULE 21

Petitions, Memorials, Etc.

Petitions, memorials or other papers addressed to the House may be presented by the Speaker or by a member and shall be read and considered in the order presented unless the House shall direct otherwise. The subject matter and the name of the person presenting the petition or other paper shall be endorsed thereon.

RULE 22

Priority of Business

All questions relating to the priority of business shall be decided by a majority of those voting without debate.

RULE 23

Amendments of the Senate

Any amendment of the Senate to any House bill shall be subject to one of the following:

1. Concur in Senate amendments by voice vote and Final Passage by roll call vote.
2. Refuse to concur in Senate amendments and appointment of conference committee (simple or free).
3. Speaker may refer the bill with the Senate amendments to a committee which after study shall recommend concurrence or nonconcurrence.

Any amendment of the Senate which includes the addition of the emergency section, shall require a two-thirds vote of the members elected to the House for Final Passage.

RULE 24

Conference Committees

Conference Committees may be either simple or free.

A simple conference committee shall be limited to points of disagreement between the two Houses and shall not include any new matter in its report.

A free conference committee may recommend: striking amendments; compromising; or inserting something entirely new.

A copy of each conference committee report shall be placed on each member's desk a reasonable time before consideration of the report. Such report as adopted and the bill to which it pertains shall be referred for engrossing and the bill, after such preparation, shall be placed on the Order of Business, Third Reading of Bills.

RULE 25

Parliamentary Practice and Precedence

RULE 26

Admission to the Floor

Except by unanimous consent, or unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to the House, no person except members, officers and employees of the House shall have the privilege of, or be admitted to, the floor of the House Chambers at any time; provided, that the Committee on Rules may grant the privilege of the floor, subject to revocation in any instance by order of the House, to ex-members of the House and to members of the Senate.

The main gallery shall at all times except when the House is in Executive Session or the House or Speaker shall order the galleries cleared, be open to the public, subject to the full observance of the rules of the House.

A press gallery shall be maintained, to which shall be admitted only duly accredited representatives of the press holding non-transferable cards issued by the Committee on Rules and revocable at the discretion of said Committee. Press gallery may be located on the floor of the House at the discretion of the Committee on Rules. Any press representative desiring admission to the press gallery shall make application to the Committee on Rules for a pass and shall accompany such application with a statement of the facts of his press connections, and with a request by the newspaper or newsgathering organization with which he is connected for such pass. Passes shall not be issued to more than four representatives of one newspaper or newsgathering

organization, and not more than one such representative at a time shall occupy a seat in the press gallery if such seat is desired by the representative of any other newspaper or newsgathering organization.

RULE 27

Lobbyists

LOBBYISTS. Any person, except a public official or employee appearing in his public capacity, who is employed or retained to influence legislation or any other action of the House on behalf of another, shall register with the Rules Committee of the House as a prerequisite for the conduct of such activity. The registration record maintained by the Rules Committee shall include the name and address of each person registering; the name of each of the organizations or employers he is presently representing, if any, other than himself; and the general or specific subject of legislative interest.

No person whose activities warrant registration under the provisions of this Rule, as determined by the Speaker, shall be allowed to appear before any committee of the House, nor shall any such person be eligible to receive services provided by the Chief Clerk's Office, mail room, Sergeant at Arms, doormen, and telephone operators of the House, until he shall have registered with the Rules Committee.

RULE 28

Amendments

When a motion or proposition is under consideration a motion to amend, and a motion to amend that amendment shall be in order. No amendment in the third degree shall be allowed.

It shall also be in order to offer a further amendment by the way of a substitute amendment to which one amendment may be offered, but which shall not be voted on until the original amendment is perfected.

**JOINT SESSION OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF
REPRESENTATIVES OF THE THIRTY-SECOND

The Joint Session of the First Regular Session of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Arizona was called to order at 11:52 A.M., by Senator Stump of District 6, Maricopa County, President of the Senate.

A quorum of both Houses was present.

At 11:53 A.M., the Joint Senate and House Committee, consisting of Senators Hardt, Morrison, Weeks, Taylor, Pritzlaff, Representatives Goodwin, McConnell, Lindeman, Dewberry and West returned escorting His Excellency, Raul H. Castro, the Governor of Arizona.

The Governor, who was introduced by President Stump, delivered the following message:

BUDGET MESSAGE

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Thirty-second Arizona Legislature:

Our state law requires that I present a budget to you shortly after I have taken office and you have convened. To comply with this requirement, I am presenting this document entitled the "Annual Budget to Continue Current Programs 1975-76" which was prepared by the previous administration.

This budget does not reflect the priorities of my administration. It overlooks some spending, and ignores any serious effort to reduce non-essential spending.

As I said last week, one of my first and major duties is to present a financial plan to guide us through the rest of this fiscal year, and to present you with a responsible and realistic budget for the next fiscal year.

During the past few weeks a large part of my time and that of my staff has been spent on budget problems. We have met with many of the legislative leaders, and all of the heads of the super-departments. I will now give you my analysis and proposals; then, together we can begin working out a proper solution.

First, let us review the present fiscal year, from last July 1 to June 30, 1975. The state revenues were and are as follows, as listed on page A-1 of your budget book:

1. A healthy beginning fund balance of over \$26 million;
2. An estimated state income of \$679 million. It should be noted that over the past few months the original estimate has been revised downward;
3. Estimated revertments, transfers and reimbursements of nearly \$46 million.

This makes a total of \$751 million for this year. In addition, about \$20 million in Federal Revenue Sharing funds was appropriated for various construction projects, and is listed separately.

On the expenditure side:

1. A legislative appropriation of \$737 million;
2. An estimated supplemental appropriation of \$13 million;
3. An ending fund balance, which will be the beginning fund balance for next year's budget, of just over \$1 million at best.

We are in an unhealthy financial position.

First, we may have a severe cash flow problem in April when payments of \$50 million must be made to the school districts. We are watching this closely and studying alternatives to issuing warrants to provide the needed funds.

Second, having little or no cash reserve may cause additional cash flow problems at several times during the next year.

Third, our estimated state revenue for the next fiscal year is \$738 million, an increase of only eight and one-half per cent. In previous years the increase has been from 12 to 17 per cent each year.

Fourth, the estimated revertments, transfers and reimbursements will be only \$14 million, about one-third of this year's level.

Fifth, the beginning fund balance will be about \$1 million.

This makes a total of \$753 million for the next fiscal year, or just a \$2 million increase over this year. Because of inflation, the dollars we will have next year will actually be less than this year.

The budget under consideration proposes expenditures of \$748 million. This is not realistic because even with an estimated \$26 million in Federal Revenue Sharing funds there is absolutely no provision for Medicaid, construction, or adjustments to the state pay plan.

Our financial picture is very serious for at least the next year. The question, then, is what we do to cope with this situation.

We do not have any real measure of control over more than 50 per cent of the entire general fund budget. This portion, about \$370 million, goes to school districts and community colleges based on statutory formulas.

Of the balance, which is the controllable budget, about \$273 million is now spent by the universities and super-departments. I have met with the Board of Regents and the directors of the super-departments to develop the following three-point program to trim costs:

1. A goal of a five per cent cut in state spending based on this year's budget, to be made during the next five months. I have used the word "goal" deliberately, this is difficult and all departments may not achieve it. The managerial skill of the directors will be relied upon, and they have all agreed to give this endeavor their best efforts.

2. A true budget for the next fiscal year, one that comprehends our essential needs and is within our revenue forecasts. I will end the practice of individual departments making exaggerated requests.

3. The practice of individual departments and agencies lobbying during the session for additional funds will be discouraged.

The program to cut spending has started. The preparation of a new budget will require additional time. It will be coordinated with the chairmen of the Senate and House appropriations committees and the staff of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee.

What I'm outlining today is only a start. Much difficult work remains to be done by the legislative and the executive branches. A formal letter will be sent in the next few days to every state department, agency, board and commission setting out the following points:

1. The five per cent goal for cutting spending;
2. Asking for a revised budget which ranks the priorities of existing and new programs;
3. Suggesting the criteria to be used to determine the priority ranking of programs, and the order of spending cuts;
4. The outlines of a reporting system that can be used to effectively monitor the entire program.

Progress reports will be given from time to time.

On your part, may I suggest the following:

1. Closely examine the operations of every agency, with as thorough detail as your time permits;
2. Carefully review the revised budget which I will present to you and suggest changes where required, while continuing to reflect the needs and desires of your constituents;
3. Make every effort to hold the line on taxes. Do not allow any tax increase unless all alternatives have failed.

Today I come before you with the hope that our joint efforts will allow us to begin finding proper solutions to the ever increasing costs of our state government. We cannot continue the policies of the past which allowed our state government to grow faster than the growth rate of our state. We must begin to live within our means.

We shall get through these difficult economic times without undue suffering, provided that we look at this adversity as a challenge and not as an impossible barrier.

Hopefully, as the economic climate improves, we will be able to put into effect the new ideas and the new programs which Arizonans deserve and are entitled to receive.

Thus, I protest in 1975 what I believe I will cheer in 1977.

JO CAUTHORN

I protest the shabby and belittling treatment given the Equal Rights Amendment by this body. To oppose a piece of legislation is one thing; to scornfully manipulate it through a series of tortuous and ultimately face-saving maneuvers is quite another. The House of Representatives lived up to its reputation and chose the latter course.

I cast my vote today for the ERA in behalf of the great women of our state who have not spared themselves in this struggle for their rights and the rights of their sisters who either cannot understand or are unable to articulate our common experience of oppression. I know I speak for them when I say that we will not be intimidated nor deflected until that day when arrogance can no longer be construed as protection nor role-fulfillment as personhood.

If equality is a demand for concrete decisions, then I can assure you the cry for equality will not subside until we achieve the implementation of that most concrete of all decisions--the guarantee of constitutional protection for both sexes.

It will indeed be a bitter irony if the bicentennial celebration of our great republic comes and goes without it.

PROTEST

In accordance with Article 4, Part 2, Section 16, Constitution of Arizona, and House Rule 20, the following protest was entered:

I would like to state for the record, the legislative history regarding one question which arose earlier on Senate Bill 1364. An amendment was prepared to provide an explicit exemption from application of this bill for any self-insurance program which was limited to the self-insurer's own employees and dependents. The amendment was defeated principally because of testimony of the sponsor of the bill that it was unnecessary. Since the hearing, attorneys for the sponsors of the bill and of the amendment have agreed that it is neither the purpose nor the effect of the bill that it apply in any way to such a self-insurer. Based upon this understanding, the amendment was not presented for consideration by the Committee on Health & Welfare, nor the Committee of the Whole. I simply want to reiterate our legislative intent that this bill is not intended to, and does not apply to any self-insurance plan or program of a person, corporation, association, partnership, or trust under which it pays the costs of dentistry for its own employees and their dependents, and such dentistry is not provided by a specialized pre-paid health plan organization.

ARISING OUT OF OR IN CONNECTION WITH ANY FRAUD, THEFT, POSSESSION, RECEIPT, SALE OR TRANSPORTATION OF STOLEN PROPERTY OR OTHER CONTRABAND, OR GAMBLING OR PROSTITUTION OR NARCOTICS, WHICH OCCURS IN MORE THAN ONE COUNTY OR WHICH OCCURS IN ONE COUNTY AND AFFECTS THE RESIDENTS OF ANOTHER COUNTY OR WHICH MAY BE PROSECUTED BY MORE THAN ONE COUNTY ATTORNEY; OR

2. Bonds or other evidences of indebtedness of any state of the United States, or of any of the counties or incorporated cities, towns or duly organized school districts of any state or territory of the United States.

3. Bonds, notes or evidences of indebtedness of any county, municipal or municipal district utility within the United States, which are payable from revenues or earnings specifically pledged for the payment of the principal and interest on such obligations, and for the payment of which a lawful sinking fund or reserve fund has been established and is being maintained, but only if no default in payment or principal or interest on the obligations to be purchased has occurred within five years of the date of investment therein, or, if such obligations were issued less than five years prior to the date of investment, no default in payment of principal or interest has occurred on the obligations to be purchased nor on any other obligations of the issuer within five years of such investment.

4. Bonds, notes or evidences of indebtedness issued by any municipal improvement district in this or any other state to finance local improvements authorized by law, if the principal and interest of such obligations are payable from assessments on real property within such local improvement district. No such investment shall be made unless the face value of all such obligations, and similar obligations outstanding, do not exceed fifty per cent of the market value of the real property and improvements

(b) Fixed interest bearing obligations which are not in default as to principal or interest, other than those described in subdivision (a) above, of such institutions if the net earnings of the issuing, assuming or guaranteeing institution available for its fixed charges for a period of five fiscal years next preceding the date of investment therein have averaged per year not less than one and one-half times its average annual fixed charges applicable to such period and if during either of the last two years of such period such net earnings have been not less than one and one-half times its fixed charges for such year.

Equipment trust obligations or certificates which in the opinion of the investment management are adequately secured, or other instruments so secured and evidencing an interest in transportation equipment, wholly or in part within the United States, which carry the right to receive determined portions of rental,

For the purposes of this paragraph, such computation shall refer to the fiscal years immediately preceding the date of acquisition, and the term 'preferred dividend requirement' shall be deemed to mean cumulative or noncumulative dividends, whether paid or not. The retirement system shall not invest more than four per cent of its assets in the preferred stock of any one issuing company, nor shall the aggregate of its investments under this paragraph exceed twenty per cent of its assets.

Nonassessable, except for taxes or wages, common stocks or shares of any solvent institution, created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any state, district or territory thereof if all the obligations and preferred stock, if any, of such institution are eligible as investments under the provisions of this subsection, and if such institution has earned, during a period of five fiscal years next preceding the date of acquisition, an aggregate sum applicable to dividends on its common shares equal at least to an aggregate sum which would have been sufficient to pay dividends of four per cent per annum on the par value, or in the case of shares having no par value, then upon the value upon which those shares were issued, of all its common shares

10. Interest bearing savings accounts or certificates of deposit in banks doing business in this state whose accounts are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, but only if such deposits in excess of the insured amount are secured by the depository to the same extent and in the same manner as required by the general depository law of the state.

11. Interest bearing savings accounts or certificates of deposit in savings and loan associations doing business in this state, whose accounts are insured by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, but only if such deposits in excess of the insured amount are secured by the depository to the same extent and in the same manner as required by the general depository law of the state.

(e) The aggregate of its investments under the provisions of this paragraph shall not, at cost, exceed forty per cent of its assets.

B. Investment management may invest and reinvest the monies directed to it as follows:

1. Bonds or other evidences of indebtedness of the United States of America or any of its agencies or instrumentalities when such obligations are guaranteed as to principal and interest by the United States of America or by any agency or instrumentality thereof.

2. Bonds or other evidences of indebtedness of any state of the United States, or of any of the counties or incorporated cities, towns or duly organized school districts of any state or territory of the United States.

3. Bonds, notes or evidences of indebtedness of any county, municipal or municipal district utility within the United States, which are payable from revenues or earnings specifically pledged for the payment of the principal and interest on such obligations, and for the payment of which a lawful sinking fund or reserve fund has been established and is being maintained, but only if no default in payment or principal or interest on the obligations to be purchased has occurred within five years of the date of investment therein, or, if such obligations were issued less than five years prior to the date of investment, no default in payment of principal or interest has occurred on the obligations to be purchased nor on any other obligations of the issuer within five years of such investment.

4. Bonds, notes or evidences of indebtedness issued by any municipal improvement district in this or any other state to finance local improvements authorized by law, if the principal and interest of such obligations are payable from assessments on real property within such local improvement district. No such investment shall be made unless the face value of all such obligations, and similar obligations outstanding, do not exceed fifty per cent of the market value of the real property and improvements upon which such bonds or the assessments for the payment of principal and interest thereon are liens inferior only to the liens for general ad valorem property taxes. No such investment shall be made unless no default in payment of principal or interest on the obligations to be purchased has occurred within five years of the date of investment therein, or, if such obligations were issued less than five years prior to the date of investment, no default in payment of principal or interest has occurred on the obligations to be purchased or on any other obligation of the issuer within five years of such investment.

5. (a) Bonds, debentures, notes and other evidences of indebtedness issued, assumed or guaranteed by any solvent institution created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any state, district or territory

(b) Fixed interest bearing obligations which are not in default as to principal or interest, other than those described in subdivision (a) above, of such institutions if the net earnings of the issuing, assuming or guaranteeing institution available for its fixed charges for a period of five fiscal years next preceding the date of investment therein have averaged per year not less than one and one-half times its average annual fixed charges applicable to such period and if during either of the last two years of such period such net earnings have been not less than one and one-half times its fixed charges for such year.

6. Equipment trust obligations or certificates which in the opinion of the investment management are adequately secured, or other instruments so secured and evidencing an interest in transportation equipment, wholly or in part within the United States, which carry the right to receive determined portions of rental, purchase or other fixed obligatory payments to be made for the use or purchase of such transportation equipment.

7. Preferred or guaranteed stock or shares of any solvent institution created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any state, district or territory thereof, if all of the prior obligations and prior preferred stocks, if any, of such institution at the date of acquisition are eligible as investments under this subsection and if the net earnings of such institution available for its fixed charges during either of the last two years shall have been, and during each of the last five years shall have averaged not less than one and one-half times the sum of its average annual fixed charges, if any, its average annual maximum contingent interest, if any, and its average annual preferred dividend

requirements. For the purposes of this paragraph, such computation shall refer to the fiscal years immediately preceding the date of acquisition, and the term 'preferred dividend requirement' shall be deemed to mean cumulative or noncumulative dividends, whether paid or not. The retirement system shall not invest more than four per cent of its assets in the preferred stock of any one issuing company, nor shall the aggregate of its investments under this paragraph exceed twenty per cent of its assets.

8. Nonassessable, except for taxes or wages, common stocks or shares of any solvent institution, created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any state, district or territory thereof if all the obligations and preferred stock, if any, of such institution are eligible as investments under the provisions of this subsection, and if such institution has earned, during a period of five fiscal years next preceding the date of acquisition, an aggregate sum applicable to dividends on its common shares equal at least to an aggregate sum which would have been sufficient to pay dividends of four per cent per annum on the par value, or in the case of shares having no par value, then upon the value upon which those shares were issued, of all its common shares outstanding during such period. The retirement system shall not, however, invest more than four per cent of its assets in the common stock or capital stock of any one issuing company, nor shall the aggregate of its investments under the provisions of this paragraph, at a cost not to exceed sixty per cent of its assets.

9. Term contracts of sale and lease purchase agreements issued, agreed to or entered into by the federal government or any agency thereof or by the state or any department, agency or duly constituted authority of the state or a political subdivision thereof authorized by law to enter into contracts and agreements for the acquisition of lands and improvements thereon for public use, provided that such investments shall be repaid to the system at the prevailing rate of interest for private investments of a similar nature and that each such investment made by the investment management does not exceed ninety per cent of the appraised valuation of the property securing the investment loan.

Interest bearing savings accounts or certificates of deposit in savings and loan associations doing business in this state, whose accounts are insured by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, but only if such deposits in excess of the insured amount are secured by the depository to the same extent and in the same manner as required by the general depository law of the state.

12. Bonds, notes or other evidences of indebtedness which are secured by first mortgages upon improved unencumbered real property located in Arizona, but only upon condition that:

(a) No such mortgage loan acquired on any one property shall, at the time of investment by the investment management, exceed seventy-five per cent of the value of the real property securing the same, except that such loan may equal the amount of any guaranty by the United States of America or by any agency or instrumentality of the United States of America.

(b) Each such mortgage loan shall provide for amortization payments to be made by the borrower on the principal thereof at least quarterly in each year in amounts sufficient to completely amortize the loan within a period of twenty-five years, except that in the case of loans guaranteed or insured by the United States of America or by any agency or instrumentality of the United States of America, the amortization schedule may not exceed that permitted by such guaranteed or insured loan.

(c) The value of the real property securing such mortgage loan shall be as determined by an appraisal made by an accredited member of a nationally recognized Real Estate appraisal organization and no such mortgage loan shall be acquired except after such appraisal, except that in the case of loans guaranteed or insured by the United States of America or by any agency or instrumentality of the United States of America, the value of the real property receiving such loan shall be as determined by an appraiser approved by the guaranteeing or insuring agency.

(d) No mortgage loan shall be originated or serviced by the system but shall be acquired from and serviced by an approved mortgagee or the federal housing administration doing business in Arizona.

(e) The aggregate of its investments under the provisions of this paragraph shall not, at cost, exceed forty per cent of its assets.

13. In mutual funds, insurance company investment funds, commercial paper and banker's acceptance. For the purpose of this paragraph:

(a) 'Banker's acceptance' is a written unconditional order in the form of a draft drawn on a bank for a period not to exceed one hundred eighty days, requiring the bank to pay on demand a specified amount which, when accepted by the bank, becomes the bank's promise to pay.

(b) 'Commercial paper' means negotiable short-term promissory notes issued by a well known corporation borrower for any term up to two hundred seventy days.

(c) 'Mutual fund' means an open end investment company managing a diversified portfolio in accordance with specified investment objectives. Such company offers and has outstanding redeemable securities of which it is the issuer. Seventy-five per cent of the assets of such mutual fund shall be so invested that:

IN NOTES OR OTHER EVIDENCES OF INDEBTEDNESS OR IN LEASES UPON REAL PROPERTY SITUATED IN THE STATE OF ARIZONA TO THE EXTENT SUCH NOTES, EVIDENCES OF INDEBTEDNESS OR LEASES ARE GUARANTEED BY THE SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION OF THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT. THE AGGREGATE OF ITS INVESTMENTS UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THIS PARAGRAPH SHALL NOT, AT COST, EXCEED TEN PER CENT OF ITS ASSETS.

C. The system shall not have at any time any combination of investments in any one institution, agency, corporation or political subdivision aggregating an amount exceeding seven per cent of the assets of the retirement system, nor shall the system have any combination of equity investments in any one industry exceeding fifteen per cent, excepting electric and gas utilities, telephone communications, banking, finance and insurance industries. In such excepted industries, the system shall not have a combination of equity investments exceeding twenty-five per cent in any one, nor collectively more than sixty per cent, of the total equity assets of the retirement system. The latter percentages shall be measured by cost or carrying value in the portfolio. This restriction shall not apply to investments in general obligations of the United States of America.

Sec. 6. Emergency

To preserve the public peace, health and safety it is necessary that this act become immediately operative. It is therefore declared to be an emergency measure, to take effect as provided by law."

(a) Household furnishings used by the recipient and his family in his usual place of residence.

(b) Wearing apparel and necessary personal effects.

(c) A HOME IN WHICH THE RECIPIENT RESIDES and the land contiguous thereto, which has a GROSS market value not in excess of TWENTY-FIVE thousand dollars.

(d) AN AUTOMOBILE WITH A GROSS RETAIL MARKET VALUE OF TWELVE HUNDRED DOLLARS OR LESS, EXCEPT THAT IF SUCH VALUE EXCEEDS TWELVE HUNDRED DOLLARS, THE EXCESS VALUE SHALL BE COUNTED AGAINST THE OTHER PROPERTY OR ASSETS SPECIFIED IN SUBDIVISION (e).

In no event shall the excess cost exceed the basic support level per state supported classroom divided by twenty-six for a common school district or twenty-four for a high school district, whichever is applicable.

C. The superintendent of public instruction shall require each district which provided special education programs in the current year to furnish the superintendent with records detailing for special education programs prior to February 1 of each year. The superintendent of public instruction shall review all requests for special education for each district authorized under subsection A of this section. If the superintendent of public instruction determines that the requests for state monies are consistent with program levels offered by the school

If the superintendent of public instruction determines that the requests for monies are inconsistent with program levels in the current year, he shall reduce the excess cost of such district which reduced excess cost shall be used as the basis to provide state monies for program levels consistent with the program levels offered by the school district in the current year plus an allowance for reasonable growth. Any additional cost resulting from the special education program and not provided for under the provisions of this section shall be met by each school district having students receiving special instruction or by the county in the case of a county special education program.

Sec. 5. Joint legislative special education study committee

A. Beginning on July 1, 1975 and ending on December 31, 1975, there shall be a joint legislative special education study committee which shall consist of the entire memberships of the senate committee on education and the house committee on education.

B. The chairman of the senate committee on education and the chairman of the house of representatives committee on education shall serve as cochairmen of the joint legislative special education study committee.

C. The joint legislative special education study committee shall meet as often as it deems necessary and a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Sec. 6. Duties of joint legislative special education study committee

A. The joint legislative special education study committee shall, on or before December 1, 1975:

1. Ascertain facts and make recommendations to the legislature relating to special education aid provided by the State of Arizona and special education programs provided by the school districts pursuant to title 15, chapter 10, article 2, Arizona Revised Statutes.

2. Determine:

(a) Definitions of handicapping conditions which specifically delineate students eligible for special education services;

(b) How special education pupils are identified and placed in present programs;

(c) The methods of delivering special education services covering at least the following characteristics:

(i) Staffing;

- (ii) Pupil-staff relationship;
- (iii) Pupil identification and placement;
- (iv) Establishment of educational objectives;

- (d) The costs of educating exceptional students and the factors influencing these costs;
- (e) Compare the alternative approaches to state funding of special education among the several states.

3. Make recommendations to the legislature on the areas specified in paragraph 2.

B. The joint legislative special education study committee may:

- 1. Make studies, conduct inquiries and investigations and hold hearings.
- 2. Meet and conduct its business any place within the state during the sessions of the legislature or any recess thereof and during the period when the legislature is not in session.
- 3. Establish subcommittees and assign to such subcommittees any study, inquiry, investigation or hearing with the right to call witnesses, which the joint legislative special education study committee has the authority to undertake.
- 4. Work with the department of education, the several school districts and the auditor general in compiling required information.

C. The joint legislative special education study committee shall have the powers conferred by law upon legislative committees.

D. Members of the joint legislative special education study committee shall be reimbursed by their respective houses in the same manner as is provided by law for a member of the legislature who attends a duly called meeting of a standing committee.

Sec. 7. Authority to conduct hearings

The joint legislative special education study committee shall have the authority to issue subpoenas to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of evidence pursuant to title 41, chapter 7, article 4, Arizona Revised Statutes.

Sec. 8. Rules, regulations void; authorization required

Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, rules and regulations of the state board of education relating to special education as specified in title 15, chapter 10, on the effective date of this act shall from and hereafter be null and void. The state board of education shall not promulgate rules and regulations relating to special education until authorized to do so by the legislature.

Sec. 9. Determination and apportionment of state aid; exception

A. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 15-1212, for the purposes of determination of the number of state supported classrooms, apportionment and determination of state aid as provided in title 15, chapter 16, article 1, Arizona Revised Statutes, the actual average daily membership or adjusted actual average daily membership whichever is applicable for the previous year may be used when such actual average daily membership or adjusted actual average daily membership whichever is applicable is greater than the actual average daily membership or adjusted actual average daily membership whichever is applicable achieved through April 15 for the current year.

B. The provisions of this section shall expire on June 30, 1976.”

In the event the amount of money deposited in the state general fund from the settlement of master file Civil No. 50173, known as the Western Liquid Asphalt Cases, in the United States District Court for the Northern District of California, and specifically cause No. 51092 entitled State of Arizona, et al, plaintiffs, vs. American Petrofina, Inc., et al, defendants, is equal to or exceeds one hundred sixty-two thousand dollars, an additional one hundred sixty-two thousand dollars is appropriated to the governor for distribution as specified in subsection A of this section.

Sec. 3. Expiration date

The provisions of this chapter shall expire on July 1, 1980.

Sec. 4. Emergency

To preserve the public peace, health and safety it is necessary that this act become immediately operative. It is therefore declared to be an emergency measure, to take effect as provided by law."

It is exactly five months to the day, from January 13, 1975, that I walked up this aisle to address you for the first time to outline

your aspirations in what I considered to be in the best interest of the State of Arizona. It was then that we met to try to protect the rights of the people and find solutions to the problems that we face in the State.

We are now concluding the longest legislative session in the history of Arizona. Upon doing so, I feel a great deal has been accomplished. For instance, I refer to the Grand Jury Bill, which indicated to me it was a matter that required a compromise and the understanding of all members of the Legislature, the Attorney General, county attorneys, people in general and members of my staff. The compromise was reached and I think it is a workable one. We do hope that it will solve some of the problems that were my concern when I first talked to you that this was in the best interest of the people of the State of Arizona.

Another good illustration is the Medicaid Bill which, of course, is not a completed bill. Political motives were cast aside and we agreed (and I say "we" because I feel I am part of your team) that further work is needed. This likewise was done with consideration for Arizona and everyone concerned with one objective in mind — that this, too, was in the best interest of the people of the State.

I would like to thank you for five months' hard work. Notable among our achievements, for instance, is the Solar Energy Bill, Senate Bill 1018, that received your applause, and there is no question that it was in the best interest of our State;

House Bill 2417, the necessary revisions for the Motor Vehicle Bill prescribing license taxes for automobiles;

Senate Bill 1149, raising unemployment benefits from \$78 to \$85 per week;

House Bill 2231, the reallocation of monies for utilities in education;

House Bill 2315, the Model Business Corporation Act, really updating it;

Senate Bill 1345, regulations of contractors — very valuable to the State;

House Bill 2312, reorganization of the Real Estate Department — very vital to prevention of real estate abuses;

Senate Bill 1394, Drug Control District which provides the mechanism to attack the rising tide of narcotics flow into our State;

House Bill 2027, Floodplain Management — obviously a most important bill;

Senate Bill 1256, prescribing interest rates on inactive deposits;

Senate Bill 1339, the transition bill — to provide the means to effect a smoother changeover when the people depose me in years to come.

To me these were the things that we accomplished.

In my next remarks, and they are not to be taken in the sense of trying to give you any type of reproachment, I think that this was the substance of the words I gave you at my inauguration. Obviously I did not attain everything I wanted. But this is what makes it good. Many of you have had a great deal of experience, and as Governor of Arizona, my goal has always been to work and cooperate with you, to mediate and counsel with you at all times and to request the possible development of certain legislation. It will not be my stance to inflict my own personal will upon you. I think ninety minds are far stronger than one and this makes a great benefit to government in this State and that certainly keeps a Governor or anyone else from becoming a dictator. I do respect your ninety minds very strongly.

As I said to you in the opening remarks, many of you I did not know personally. I have had the privilege of getting to know many of you on a personal basis and have welcomed you into my office as well as my home. We have not always agreed on all of the bills we have had, but on the other hand, even though your views may be opposed to mine, we have disagreed in a congenial manner.

In the field of mutual respect, we have more experience and I think this next session will find much better teamwork than we

have had this year. This year I am not criticizing. I think this year turned out as well or better than I anticipated.

Before I get to the end of this speech, there have been some things that we have not been able to achieve. Some of these projects require more than one session. Some way to find a manner of development of housing is one area. The method and strategy have not been determined. We have ample time.

The adoption of a statewide land-use planning is one of the matters to be considered in the next session.

Mass transit — we need new laws which will allow local municipalities to establish mass transit systems to meet their needs, but with suitable coordination at the state level.

The review of the weekly unemployment benefits is another item to be considered.

County home rule — to allow local people to enact certain laws at their own level.

Evaluation of our tax structure is something else that must be done.

I do hope that when we meet again in January for the next session we can give long and steady review of the Fair Trade Bill and that it be done with consideration of what is in the best interest of the State of Arizona.

I also hope that at the next session we are able to find some formula or some solution so that when we deal with the capital outlay, we don't use it as a matter with which to negotiate. Therefore, we must work on some methods to expedite our legislative matters a little better.

I will conclude by saying this: When you evaluate the pluses and the minuses of this Legislature, I feel very strongly and just as optimistically as I did before that this has been a productive legislative session. You have worked hard and with dedication. I have not found one member whom I do not consider to be a dedicated American and there is not one person in this Body whom I do not consider to be a good Arizonan. Hopefully, they represent their constituency, while at the same time representing the best interests of the State of Arizona.

May the good Lord bless you — and get in training for January, 1976.

Notice is hereby given that in compliance with the provisions of Section 41-1171, Arizona Revised Statutes, bids will be received at the office of the Legislative Council, Room 324, State Capitol, Phoenix, until 12 o'clock noon, Monday, January 13, 1975, for the printing of bills for the use of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Arizona.

Samples of bills are on file in the office of the Legislative Council where they may be inspected by prospective bidders during any weekday, except Saturday, between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.

All bids will be plainly marked as of the date and hour received. Upon organization of the Legislature the bids will be delivered, unopened, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives in compliance with Section 41-1172, Arizona Revised Statutes.

Within forty-eight hours after the organization of the Legislature is completed, the Speaker, Majority Leader and Minority Leader of the House of Representatives and the President, Majority Leader and Minority Leader of the Senate, as a committee shall meet at which time the bids shall be opened and the contract awarded to the lowest responsible bidder under conditions and requirements prescribed by the committee. The committee reserves the right to reject any or all bids and to consider past performance in determining responsibility. Furthermore, the Legislature may in its own discretion print any bills with its own equipment when so determined.

The bid submitted for bills must be accompanied by a certified check in the sum of five hundred dollars payable to the order of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate. The check of an unsuccessful bidder will be immediately returned. The check of the successful bidder will be returned if, within forty-eight hours after acceptance of the bid, the bidder enters into a contract with the committee prescribed by Section 41-1173, Arizona Revised Statutes, and files a satisfactory surety bond, running to the State of Arizona, in the sum of two thousand dollars, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the contract. If, after acceptance the bidder fails to enter into a contract with the committee, the check shall be deemed to be forfeited to the State of Arizona.

CONTRACT

THIS CONTRACT, made and entered into this 15th day of January, 1975, by and between the Senate and House of Representatives of the Thirty-second Legislature in the State of Arizona as parties of the first part and Maricopa Printers, Inc., an Arizona corporation, party of the second part.

WITNESSETH:

THAT WHEREAS, on the 14th day of January, 1975, the said parties of the first part, acting under and pursuant to authorization duly made by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Arizona, in a meeting of the leadership of each body duly assembled, received and opened certain bids for the printing of the bills for the Senate and House of Representatives.

WHEREAS, on the 14th day of January, 1975, the said party of the second part prepared and submitted to the said parties of the first part, its certified bid for the printing of the bills aforesaid, in conformity with the prices, estimates and specifications laid down in said call, a copy of which is marked exhibit "A" and made a part of this contract for all intents and purposes as fully as if incorporated herein; and

WHEREAS, the said parties of the first part did, on the 14th day of January, 1975, find that the said party of the second part was the best and

lowest responsible bidder for all of the printing contained in the call as follows: for the printing of the bills of the Senate and House of Representatives of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Arizona.

It is understood and agreed that time is of the essence of this contract and that all penalties shall be strictly enforced. Waiver of one or more penalty provisions in one or more instances by parties of the first part shall not constitute a general waiver of penalty provisions, but shall be limited in their application to the specific instances and penalties waived.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED that no more than three blank pages shall be contained in any one bill.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED that said second party shall, at the time of execution of this contract, make and execute to the State of Arizona, a good and sufficient surety bond to be approved by the parties of the first part, in the sum of \$2,000.00 conditioned upon the faithful performance of this contract.

It is understood and agreed that all bills printed for, delivered to, and accepted by the Senate shall be paid for by the Senate, and all bills printed for, delivered to, and accepted by the House of Representatives shall be paid for by the House of Representatives.
