The second Monday in January being the date prescribed by the Constitution of Arizona for the annual meeting of the legislature, the first regular session of the Twenty-fourth Legislature convened this day.

The Senate assembled in its chamber at 12 o'clock noon.

Mr. Dan S. Kitchel, a Senator-elect from Cochise County, being in point of years the eldest Senator, called the Senate to order.

Mr. Robert E. Morrow, a Senator-elect from Mohave County, served as Secretary pro tempore.

Canon George M. Ray, of Trinity Episcopal Cathedral, of Phoenix, offered prayer.

The President pro tempore called the Senate to order at 12:16 p.m.

OATH OF OFFICE

Chief Justice Phelps entered the Senate chamber, escorted by Senators Palmer and Wine, and administered the oath of office to the Senators-elect, as follows:

"You do solemnly swear that you will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution and the laws of the State of Arizona; that you will true faith and allegiance bear to the same, and defend them against all enemies whatsoever; and that you will faithfully and impartially discharge the duties of the office of a member of the Senate of the State of Arizona, according to the best of your ability, so help you, God."

At 12:18 p.m. Chief Justice Phelps left the Senate chamber, escorted by Senators Palmer and Wine.

ELECTION OF PRESIDENT

Senator Prochnow, in the following verbiage, placed in nomination for the office of President of the Senate Mr. Clarence L. Carpenter, a Senator from Gila County:

Mr. Chairman of the Temporary Organization of the Senate of the Twenty-fourth Legislature:

I rise to place in nomination for the high office of President of this distinguished Body the name of a man who has served our State as a Senator in the Legislature during the past ten years and has distinguished himself and brought credit to the Legislature and the State while serving as President of the Senate during the Twenty-second and Twenty-third Legislatures.

It is in order to bring before you just a few of the outstanding qualifications which commend him for this high office. The Senator has been a resident of this great State for 34 years and is considered a real leader, not only within his community, but throughout the State. He has demonstrated a capacity for performing prodigious work ably and in a competent manner.

This nominee has many times during the past decade demonstrated a talent for diplomacy and has been able to bring diverse viewpoints into an atmosphere of mutual understanding. This ability is needed more than ever today—when we are faced with important problems which call for a solution but which at the same time present diverse facets which must be reconciled.

The Senator, who has served our Senate so well, has an attribute which is absolutely necessary in the position of President of the Senate. That attribute is leadership. Leadership involves the important responsibility of selecting the “right man for the right job” and then permitting that man to assume the authority and responsibility which go with that job.

I feel sure that the Senate under his guidance will find a basis of mutual understanding with the House of Representatives and the Executive branch of our government so that the citizens of this State will reap the full benefit of his wisdom.

Therefore, Mr. Chairman, I have the honor, which I consider both a pleasure and a privilege, to place into nomination for President of the Senate the name of our respected Colleague from Gila County, the Honorable Clarence L. Carpenter.

Senators Sullivan and Corbett seconded the nomination, endorsing the sentiments expressed by Senator Prochnow.

Senator Giss moved that nominations for President be closed. The motion was agreed to.

Senator Giss further moved that the Secretary pro tempore be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Senator Clarence L. Carpenter as President of the Senate for the ensuing two years. The motion was agreed to, and Senator Carpenter was elected by acclamation.

Senator Brown placed in nomination for the office of Secretary of the Senate the name of Mrs. Louise C. Brimhall, of Mesa, and highly praised her intellectual capacities and trustworthiness during the many years she has served the Senate in various positions, the past four of which she has been Secretary of the Senate.

Senator Orme seconded the nomination with additional words of commendation for Mrs. Brimhall.

Senator Sullivan moved that nominations be closed and that the Secretary pro tempore be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Mrs. Brimhall as Secretary of the Senate. The motion was agreed to and Mrs. Brimhall was declared the unanimous choice of the Senate.

Senator Giss placed in nomination for the office of Assistant Secretary of the Senate the name of Mrs. Rilla Dean, praising her ability and personable qualities.

Senator Orme seconded the nomination.

Senator Sullivan moved that nominations be closed and that the Secretary pro tempore be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Mrs. Dean as Assistant Secretary of the Senate. The motion was agreed to, and Mrs. Dean was declared the unanimous choice of the Senate.

Senator Morrow placed in nomination for the office of Sergeant at Arms the name of Mr. Harry Drake, of Kingman. The nomination was promptly seconded by Senator Bollinger, who spoke briefly on the loyalty and dependability of Mr. Drake.

Senator Sullivan moved that nominations be closed and that the Secretary pro tempore be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Mr. Drake as Sergeant at Arms of the Senate. The motion was agreed to, and Mr. Drake was declared the unanimous choice of the Senate.

ESCORTING OF PRESIDENT CARPENTER TO THE PRESIDENT'S ROSTRUM

The President pro tempore designated Senator Sullivan, the oldest Senator in point of service; and Senator Blansett, to escort President Carpenter to his chair on the President's rostrum.

EXPRESSION OF APPRECIATION BY THE PRESIDENT

President Carpenter, upon being seated, addressed the Senate briefly and expressed his sincere appreciation for the confidence again reposed in him and the honor bestowed upon him, and concluded his talk as follows:

"I am grateful for the kind words of Senator Prochnow, Senator Sullivan, and Senator Corbett and for what they had to say on my behalf. I am fully aware of the serious problems

that face us this session but with your help and with all of us co-operating together I have no fear that they will not be solved satisfactorily to the State of Arizona.

"The President's office will be open at all times to each member who might wish to have me confer with him on Senate matters and I will be happy to do so, and I assure you that I will call on each and every one of you to advise and assist me.

"Again I wish to thank you from the bottom of my heart and will serve you to the best of my ability."

SEATING OF SECRETARY AND ASSISTANT SECRETARY

The President designated Senators Arnold and Lockhart to escort Mrs. Brimhall and Mrs. Dean to their respective seats at the Secretary's table.

INSTALLATION OF HARRY DRAKE AS SERGEANT AT ARMS
AND HIS EXPRESSION OF THANKS

Mr. Harry Drake, Sergeant at Arms, was escorted by Senator Morrow to the front of the Senate chamber. Mr. Drake expressed his sincere appreciation to all the Senators for their retention of him as Sergeant at Arms for another two years, and also for their financial assistance during the past summer when he was hospitalized on two occasions, and for the many cards and words of encouragement and cheer sent to him during those weeks.

Mr. Drake was given an accolade by the President at which time the President asked full co-operation of all members with the Sergeant at Arms, assuring them that Mr. Drake would continue to do a very good job for them.

NOTIFICATION OF THE HOUSE AND THE GOVERNOR

Senator Giss moved that a committee of five be appointed to notify the House and the Governor that the Senate is organized and ready for the transaction of business, and to act with a like committee from the House to notify the Governor that the First Regular Session of the Twenty-fourth Legislature is organized and ready to receive any communication he may wish to deliver. The motion was agreed to, and the President designated Senators Corbett, Brown, Prochnow, Murphy, and Sullivan as members of this committee.

RECESS

Without objection, at 12:38 p.m., the Senate stood at recess subject to the call of the gavel.

The President called the Senate to order at 1:43 p.m.

committee appointed by the Senate, reported that they had notified the House and the Governor that the Senate was organized and ready for business. The committee also reported that the Governor had advised them that he would be ready to deliver his message at once, in the House chamber.

COMMITTEE FROM THE HOUSE

The Sergeant at Arms, at 1:47 p.m., announced a committee from the House of Representatives consisting of Members Bloomquist, Stevens, Knoles, Sims, and Haugh. The committee informed the Senate that the House was organized and ready for the transaction of business.

RECESS

By unanimous consent, at 1:48 p.m., the Senate stood at recess subject to the call of the gavel following the joint session.

JOINT SESSION

In accordance with the recess taken by the two Houses, the Senate and the House of Representatives assembled in joint session at 1:51 p.m., in the House chamber, the President of the Senate in the chair.

The President called the Senate and the House of Representatives to order.

The Secretary of the Senate called the roll of the Senate. A quorum was present.

The Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives called the roll of the House, and a quorum was shown to be present.

His Excellency, the Governor of Arizona, Paul Fannin, appeared in the House chamber escorted by Senators Corbett, Brown, Prochnow, Murphy, and Sullivan, the committee appointed by the Senate; and Members Bloomquist, Stevens, Knoles, Sims, and Haugh, the committee appointed by the House. The Governor was introduced by the President of the Senate, and a cordial welcome was extended him.

THE GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

The Governor addressed the joint session as follows:

Mister President, Mister Speaker, members of the House of Representatives and the Senate, and fellow Arizonans—

All of us gathered here today are privileged to be living in one of the most dynamic and revolutionary eras in the entire recorded history of mankind. Science and industry within the fleeting period of one generation have fashioned a bewildering succession of modern miracles in almost every facet of our daily lives.

Nowhere in this great country of ours is the process of change so evident as it is in our state. Growth and progress beyond the wildest dreams of our pioneer ancestors have truly propelled Arizona into the national spotlight. It is difficult for many of us to realize, since we are so close to it, but

Arizona is only now beginning to develop its potential. Things have happened in Arizona within the last ten years, and indeed are continuing to happen, which sound fantastic to visitors from other areas.

I am sure most of you are aware of the more striking examples of our remarkable growth, a growth that is transforming both the physical appearance of our land and towns as well as the structure of our economic and social life. Those of us who have been honored by our fellow citizens with the responsibility of government service should recognize what is taking place in Arizona in order to grapple intelligently with the problems of the present—and to lay sound plans for the future.

For this reason I will devote a few moments of my first official message to a brief review of Arizona's recent development and what we may confidently expect in the years just ahead. It is within the framework of these facts that we must approach the many complex tasks which demand legislative action.

What, then, is the State of our State in this year of our Lord, 1959?

I shall not take up your time with a long recital of statistics. But, let us look at just a few of the figures which illustrate most graphically what we mean when we say Arizona is booming.

The most important index, of course, is population. In this regard, Arizona has nearly doubled its numbers in the last 10 years. There are now about 1 million 230 thousand of us, according to the most reliable research sources, and every indication points to a continued flow of new people into Arizona at a rate in excess of 50 thousand a year for the foreseeable future. This means we will have more than 2 million Arizonans by 1975.

What is sustaining these new Arizonans after they arrive?

To understand the answer to this question we must recognize the nature of the fundamental change in our state's economy. No longer are we dependent primarily upon the production of foods and fibers and minerals to support ourselves, although these activities remain as key props in the economic life of our state. In only a few short years, manufacturing has developed from practically nothing in Arizona to the point where it now is our number one dollar producer.

The state's manufacturing output reached an estimated 490 million dollars in 1958.

This was followed in order by 390 million from agriculture and 250 million from tourist expenditures. Impressive as this record is, it is my sincere conviction that we haven't seen anything yet. I doubt whether any of us can foresee what the impact upon our lives will be when Arizona's resources are more completely developed.

There is, however, a significant and sobering note in what otherwise adds up to an amazing record of continued progress and prosperity. I refer to our mining industry, and particu-

arly copper, which remains one of the foundations of our state's economy.

The dollar value of our mineral production declined last year to 271 million 63 thousand dollars, compared to 372 million 641 thousand in 1957. I pledge my co-operation with other western state governors and our delegation in congress to work for feasible means to preserve and promote our mining industry, which is so vital not only to Arizona but also to the security and defense of the nation.

Let us turn now to the job at hand. It is not my intention to include in this message a detailed list of all items worthy of legislative study and action. Instead, I shall confine my initial recommendations to those areas which I believe should have priority. In the weeks ahead, as we both have the chance to study and crystallize our thinking on mutual problems, I shall counsel with you further on specific matters.

TAXATION AND SCHOOL FINANCING

An overwhelming majority of Arizona citizens agree that the twin problems of taxation and public education belong at the top of our work list. I have already cited the fact that Arizona is riding a tide of economic and population gain which may well not ebb in our lifetime. And yet, because of the uneven pattern of concentration, that tide has created a tax situation of grave proportion.

Inequities inherent in that situation have been multiplied progressively in the last decade by increased living costs and a decrease in the purchasing power of the dollar. Nowhere do these inequities hit with harsher impact than upon the home-owning school district taxpayer.

Until the inflationary trend shows some sign of abating, we must face the unpleasant fact that education costs, along with all other costs of government, are going to increase—unless we maintain an uncompromising fight for economy at all levels. And unless positive but reasonable action is taken at this session, taxes on homes and other real property will continue at a disproportionate rate of increase.

Let us look at a few facts taken from the record of the 10-year fiscal period of 1948 to 1958:

Our school population grew from 112,397 to 215,348 pupils and our assessed property valuation more than doubled, from 570 million dollars to 1 billion, 250 million dollars.

Arizona's combined revenue from income, sales and luxury taxes increased from about 25 million dollars to more than 54 million dollars. But there is another side of the coin.

In this same decade, while we enjoyed a 100 per cent-plus increase in our most important revenue assets, our common and high school expenditures increased 280 per cent—from 24 million 760 thousand dollars to more than 94 million dollars.

In short, in 10 years our school population, taxable assets and tax revenue from sources other than property have more

than doubled. But our school costs have quadrupled. This is brutal arithmetic. The principal victim has been the homeowner in the school district. I believe all of us agree this is the person who needs tax relief, even though we may differ on details of our approach.

Past legislatures and governors have worked diligently at this problem. They have been aided greatly, as we are today, by the independent research of educators, taxpayer groups, and by outstanding debate in our free press. With the wealth of study that has gone before, we can and we must bring about an early and actual reduction in the school district taxpayer's burden.

With these facts in mind, and faced with the need to shift some of the school district tax load, I submit the following recommendations for your consideration:

Property ownership is fundamental to our way of life. We must be certain that in financing our children's education we do not destroy the foundation of the very way of life we are educating them to enjoy, nourish and strengthen.

Local school district property taxes last year provided the largest share of the cost of elementary and high school education in Arizona. Addition of that portion of school costs borne by property taxes at the county and state levels makes the total property tax contribution to school expenditures out of balance. Especially in a state where less than 18 per cent of the land is privately owned, we cannot expect real property to continue to absorb such a large share of education costs.

Therefore—if the legislature should enact an increase in the state transaction privilege and use taxes—and if the revenue derived therefrom would replace to the fullest extent possible present and future needed revenues which otherwise would have to come from school district property taxpayers—such legislation would meet with my approval.

I make no brief for any kind of tax, since all taxes are, in varied degree, unfair. However, because of its potential revenue and proven dependability of annual growth, it has been advocated that a sales tax is the most suitable vehicle for our objective. Furthermore, this tax derives revenue in some measure from those who otherwise pay little or nothing toward the support of our public school system.

A second and equally important objective of new school financing legislation should be to provide a more nearly equal educational opportunity for all of Arizona's children regardless of the economic and geographic circumstances of their school district.

Therefore, I recommend companion provisions setting forth the formula of increased school aid and distribution of the new revenue.

I also believe, in order to encourage the most efficient school operation and to insure that any increase in state aid will bring about immediate relief to the property taxpayers, that there should be some form of limitation upon the annual increase of per-student expenditures.

Furthermore—if this session produces a workable formula for allocation of supplemental aid to those districts which lack sufficient assessed valuation to prevent excessive tax rates—and if such a formula raises questions of constitutionality—I recommend that you refer to the electorate a constitutional amendment at an early date. This amendment should be designed to permit the legislature, within strictly defined constitutional limits, to provide supplemental aid to distressed districts.

In my judgment the program I have outlined should be so drafted that it would become simultaneously operative. Independent activation of any part of this program, short of the whole, would defeat our purpose.

One of our difficulties in trying to provide equal basic education and facilities for our children—and at the same time equalize the tax load—is the fact that we lack in an adequate scholastic yardstick to define what we mean by equal basic education.

One reflection of this lack can be seen in the radical variation of from 460 dollars to 198 dollars in per capita operational expenditures in elementary districts of economic size. In many cases this variation exists even among districts having approximately the same number of pupils.

I recommend creation of a joint interim study committee to prepare a constitutional amendment relating to the state board of education for submission to the 1960 legislature. Provision should be made for general public representation on the state board of education.

However constituted, the board should be mandated to set forth in positive language the requirements for graduation from both elementary and high schools. The curriculum also should be tailored to fit more stringent requirements of our institutions of higher learning—in short, “basic educational needs.”

I am persuaded that the parents of Arizona, as they watch their children facing the unknown of the future, believe the educational essentials are instruction in the basic intellectual disciplines which strengthen character and mind, and which prepare youth for a frequently hard world.

Turning now to our universities and colleges, all of us recognize their responsibility for producing our leaders of tomorrow—the leaders in science, education, government, business, labor, arts and religion who will shape the future of our world.

We know that potential leadership in youth is not determined by economic or geographic origin. Thus we must provide exacting higher educational opportunities for those who are able and willing to apply themselves. This year’s enrollments at Arizona’s three institutions of higher learning reportedly total 21 thousand 800, and the projection for 1965 is 30 thousand—to give you one measure of the problem.

I appreciate the magnitude of the task facing you and your appropriations committees in providing the kind of

faculty salaries and physical facilities required to produce the quality of higher education our state and nation must have. New teaching techniques, terminal technical training, extension divisions, space utilization—all of these and other possible approaches must be considered.

In this regard, I am informed that the junior college survey authorized by the last legislative session will be submitted to you shortly. I recommend that you give this survey serious consideration, keeping in mind that any new junior college units should be large enough to be effective and economical to operate.

I also have been informed that your Legislative Council's education committee is currently working on a re-codification of all Arizona school laws for your consideration in the second session. An orderly clarification of school law, in my opinion, should help to produce smoother operation of our schools.

Meeting both the quantity and quality educational needs of our children at all levels, particularly in view of the world power struggle swirling about us, is probably our most urgent challenge. Education in all of its many phases today is so vital that we cannot risk either false economy or poor quality. Likewise, the potential cost is so great that we cannot indulge in inefficiency.

I have expanded on this subject at some length, because I believe the public should realize that the task of its senators and representatives is not an easy one.

Let me remind you, however, that other states with equally pressing and complicated situations have found solutions. I have high hopes that the honor of achieving that goal will be given to the 24th Arizona Legislature.

HIGHWAYS

Over a projected period of three fiscal years there will be allocated more than a quarter of a billion dollars for highway construction in Arizona. This includes estimated federal allocations under the gigantic federal aid highway program, as well as Arizona tax money derived from the state gasoline tax and other highway user revenues.

This program contemplated under the federal highway act represents the largest construction project ever undertaken in our history—both nationally and in Arizona. The expenditure of such extraordinary sums of public money, in my judgment, demands a corresponding amount of constant inspection and legislative, as well as public scrutiny. When such vast sums of money are involved, astute financial management is mandatory.

It is imperative that the citizens of Arizona be kept fully informed on the programming and spending of these funds. We should work together to make sure that our over-all highway program is directed toward the goal of building an adequate road network for all sections of Arizona.

With respect to any proposals for an increase in the state

gasoline tax, I will expect them to be thoroughly studied by the appropriate legislative committees, in order that the extent of the need, if any, can be clearly demonstrated.

HIGHWAY SAFETY

There is a related problem which has mushroomed to appalling proportion in recent years and which cries out for positive corrective action at every level of government. I refer of course to the hideous slaughter of human lives on our highways and streets.

We cannot close our minds to this mounting toll. To do nothing would be a callous disregard of our duty.

I make no pretense of having any definitive answer to the highway safety problem. Frankly, I doubt whether there is any one simple answer. But I am convinced there are some positive steps which can reduce the number of traffic fatalities and injuries. Therefore, I submit the following recommendations:

First, the penalties for those driving violations which are major contributing factors in traffic accidents should be made more severe.

Second, I urge the legislature to provide appropriation authority for the addition of 25 state highway patrolmen each year until this most capable enforcement agency is brought up to recommended strength.

Third, much stiffer penalties should be provided for driving without a license, or with a license that has been either suspended or revoked.

Fourth, I recommend that the program of driver education in our public schools be continued and expanded where needed.

Fifth, I pledge my fullest co-operation with the current work by the subcommittee of the Senate Highways and Bridges Committee on the subject of uniform traffic laws.

And finally, I recommend creation of a traffic safety coordination committee composed of all officials of the state government who have any connection with or responsibility for highways. It would include but not be limited to such officers as the attorney general, members of the highway commission, officers of the highway patrol, and the superintendent of public instruction—a committee to be chaired by the governor.

This committee, working with a citizen's committee I have already appointed, will submit recommendations for additional legislative action in this field. Formation of such a committee is a primary recommendation of such major safety organizations as the Governors' Conference Committee on Traffic, the National Safety Council, and the President's Committee on Traffic Safety.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

Our unprecedented growth is not without a compensating challenge. Obviously, if we are to continue to grow and prosper, ways must be found to provide an increasing number of new jobs for our expanding work force and future opportunity for our children. By far the most promising field for new employment lies in the establishment of new plants and factories compatible with Arizona's unique climate and scenic advantages.

The increasing industrial development in Arizona not only enhances land and building values, but its payrolls also help to spread the tax load over a broader base.

As you know, my life has been spent in the business world, almost all of it here in Arizona. I am dedicated to the proposition that we have an unlimited future for industrial development in our state—if we are equal to the task of providing and maintaining the kind of economic climate in which business and industry can thrive.

In the Arizona Development Board, local chambers of commerce and other citizen groups we have the existing organizations required to do this job. Given the proper kind of leadership and material support, their work will benefit greatly every citizen of our state.

We cannot sit back and assume the rest of the world is fully informed about the human and material resources which make Arizona such an inviting area for new manufacturing enterprises. As governor I conceive it to be my duty to take the lead in this field.

I have repeatedly emphasized my intention to leave no possible approach unexplored in the vital job of communicating the advantages of Arizona to the proper sources. I stand ready to go anywhere, anytime, to lend my service in the pleasant and worthwhile job of selling Arizona.

OIL AND GAS LEGISLATION

I need hardly point out the significance of oil and gas exploration currently being conducted in various portions of Arizona. Actual discovery of oil and gas in the Four Corners area gives us exciting hope for a flourishing petroleum industry. Geologically, there is good reason to expect the existence of oil in other areas of the state as well.

It is important that we adopt wise procedures to integrate this infant industry into our state tax structure. At the same time we should refrain from strangling the industry with restrictive legislation that would hamper development of this great natural resource.

Production of oil and gas already is taxable through income, gross proceeds and personal property taxes. However, it is not yet subject to ad valorem taxation, even though our constitution requires that it should be.

Neither the small independent nor the large oil companies

can foresee what Arizona's oil tax may be in the absence of any established ad valorem tax. Therefore, I recommend that the legislature establish an equitable ad valorem tax on oil and gas production, keeping in mind both the constitutional mandate and the amount of risk and capital involved in developing a new oil territory.

STATE LANDS

We have a valuable asset in the more than 10 million acres of land granted by the federal government to Arizona since statehood. These lands can and should be developed far beyond their present level of wealth production.

Our goal should be to produce the maximum revenue possible from these lands, consistent with sound management practices, for support of our institutions of learning and welfare. This in turn would contribute toward lessening the tax load.

I believe that the land inventory and selection program begun in 1954 should be continued and given the full co-operation of the legislature. Likewise, I believe the legislature should take a careful look at lease renewal procedures now being followed by the state land department, with the objective of determining whether corrective legislation is necessary.

In addition, I commend to your study the suggestion that methods need to be established whereby certain unproductive public lands, both state and federal, could be placed in private ownership. We should seek to use public lands for public purposes, rather than remove any more private property from the tax rolls for such uses.

We should bear in mind that these millions of acres belong to all of us, and not to any particular group. They should always be managed under the guiding principle of producing the greatest wealth for the greatest number of our citizens.

WATER RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

We are now in the seventh year of Arizona's action in the United States Supreme Court to establish its rights to a fair share of Colorado River water and power resources. We can look forward to a recommended decree from the special master later this year, after which the supreme court will make the final decision. The end of this expensive but vital litigation is finally in sight, and no effort should be spared to press the fight through to conclusion.

Meanwhile, we should concentrate on perfecting our plans for development of whatever share of the Colorado River's resources may be awarded to Arizona by the court. Nor should we overlook any promising approach for further development and conservation of water resources other than the Colorado River.

While on the subject of water I want to make another observation. It is my conviction that any attempt by the federal

government to further weaken the authority of states in intrastate stream problems should be resisted vigorously.

GOVERNMENTAL REFORM

I am aware that many legislative study committees have spent much time and effort in recent years on the problem of achieving more efficiency in our state government. Let me emphasize that I do not consider this to be a partisan matter in any sense.

Government has become such a big business that no informed person will seriously dispute the need for constant application of business-like principles in the administration of state departments and agencies. In this connection I recommend serious study of legislation to establish a centralized state purchasing department.

I believe that adoption of a central state purchasing system, whose advantages are so well demonstrated in private business, could easily result in a savings to the taxpayers in excess of one million dollars a year.

Much attention has been devoted, and rightly so, to the problems of developing extra revenues demanded by our growth. At the same time we should always be thinking of ways to spend less instead of more, in areas where this is possible.

STATE INSTITUTIONS AND WELFARE

As elected public servants we must accept responsibility for continued operation of certain long-established functions of state government. These include our state correctional institutions and various public assistance programs.

Recent events have again focused attention on Arizona State Prison facilities. I am aware that some improvements have been made at the prison in recent years, and I recommend that you give careful consideration to the capital outlay requests of this institution.

Much progress has been made at the state hospital, which has been approved conditionally by the American Psychiatric Association. More patients are being cured and returned to useful lives in society. The appropriate legislative committees should give serious study to the continuing personnel and building needs of this institution.

In addition, the Industrial School for Boys at Fort Grant is now faced with serious over-crowding. We must keep pace with the growth of the state by providing the necessary expansion funds for additional housing.

Provision also should be made to help maintain and improve facilities at the School for the Deaf and Blind, as well as the Arizona Children's Colony and the Pioneers' Home.

All of us recognize our responsibility to see that long-established services in the welfare and assistance fields are administered humanely and efficiently. I am sure the legislature will fulfill its obligations in this field.

OTHER SUGGESTIONS

There are many other miscellaneous problems which time does not permit me to cover in detail. However, I want to cite just a few which I believe are worthy of your consideration.

Legislation to permit establishment of special county flood control districts merits serious attention. Likewise, now well may be the time to modernize our 33-year-old savings and loan code.

Arizona's cotton-growing industry, which forms such an important part of our over-all agricultural economy, currently is threatened by an infestation of pink bollworm. I know the legislature will give this problem thorough study.

The long talked about proposal for an ocean port in the vicinity of Yuma deserves investigation by legislative authority to determine whether it is feasible.

In addition, there are many other items which I know will occupy your attention during the regular course of your work.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, I want to emphasize my belief that the fundamental genius of our governmental system lies in the division of functions and powers among the executive, legislative, and judicial branches. Each has plenty of work to do without trying to usurp any prerogatives of the others.

I have promised the people of Arizona that I will devote all of the energy and ability at my command in the performance of my duties as Governor. I intend to keep that promise. And I know that you, as legislators, also stand ready to put forth the best you have for the good of our state and its citizens.

Blessed as we are in this bountiful land, and with the great heritage of our freedom to inspire us, no problem should discourage us. By faithful dedication to duty, and with God's help, we can justify the confidence which the people of Arizona have placed in us.

On the death of Judge Alexander Benjamin Baker

Judge Alexander Benjamin Baker, affectionately known as "Alex", passed away on March 14, 1958, at the age of sixty-eight in Phoenix, Arizona, the city of his birth.

Judge Alexander Baker, born in Phoenix on May 23, 1889, descended from an illustrious line of Arizona pioneers. Before him his father and grandfather were lawyers in the State and Territory of Arizona. In fact, his grandfather and an uncle were pioneer Arizona lawyers while his father, Allen C. Baker, served as Chief Justice of the Arizona Supreme Court during territorial days and as an associate justice during early statehood.

The Honorable Alexander Baker emulated his father and grandfather by choosing the profession of law. He obtained his legal education, after graduating from Phoenix Union High School, at the University of Michigan. In 1910 he began the practice of law in Phoenix.

During World War I he answered the call of duty to his country and, in 1919, participated in the caucus which promoted and organized the American Legion.

Judge Baker also served the State of Arizona ably and competently. At one time he served as an Assistant State Attorney General and during the tenure of another Attorney General, he served as the Chief Deputy Attorney General.

When a vacancy occurred in the Superior Court during 1957, Governor McFarland appointed Alexander Benjamin Baker as the new Superior Court Judge. This appointment met the approval of lawyers and laymen throughout Maricopa County. He served with distinction as a Judge of the Maricopa County Superior Court, and, at the time of his death, his friends were engaged in taking steps to assure his election to this important post.

Judge Baker was a life member of the Arizona Club, Loyal Order of the Moose, State Bar of Arizona, and Maricopa County Bar Association. Therefore

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Arizona:

That the State of Arizona has suffered an irreparable loss as the result of the passing of Judge Alexander Benjamin Baker. The members of the Senate sincerely regret the passing of Judge Alexander Baker and do extend their condolences to his widow, Mrs. Florence Baker, and his daughters, Mrs. Joe C. Haldiman, Jr., Mrs. John Holgate and Mrs. Charles Hill.

Senator Lockhart spoke briefly on the fine qualities and high character of Judge Baker and said Arizona had lost one of its most distinguished citizens.

The report of the Junior College Survey Committee is submitted herewith. Your committee held its organization meeting on March 27, 1958. After correspondence and personal interviews with a number of qualified persons the committee engaged Frank B. Lindsay, of Sacramento, California, as its Director on June 5, 1958.

The entire committee met seven times, often for two day sessions, and small sub-committees held additional meetings. Two members of the Board of Regents, Mr. Elwood Bradford and Mr. William Mathews, met with the full committee on October 21, 1958, and their comments and suggestions were of material assistance. All committee meetings were open meetings and were frequently attended by members of the Legislature and representatives of the press.

The facts in this report, although presented because of their bearing upon the junior college needs, we believe, will be of value to all engaged in planning for education beyond the high school level in Arizona. Much data is presented on a county breakdown basis to enable a realistic appraisal of our needs and resources.

The exploding potential population of Arizona's schools from the lower grades through the institutions of higher learning presents both an immediate and a long range challenge to the Legislature and to the people of Arizona. We hope that this report will be helpful in meeting this challenge and will make a contribution of lasting value to the educational program of Arizona.

studied statistics of the rapid growth in numbers of Arizona's elementary and high school students, of the mounting numbers of young people of college-age both in and out of collegiate institutions, of the unmet needs of business and industry for trained manpower, and of enrollment projections for the State's higher institutions. From the various sources of information at its command, the Committee has summarized its principal findings. The Chapters of this Report contain more detailed treatment about each of the statements which are set forth below:

1. There will be a great increase in numbers of young people who will need facilities and opportunity for continued education beyond high school.

The population of Arizona has grown from 750,000 in 1950 to 1,200,000 in 1958, as estimated by the Valley National Bank in its annual statistical review. According to estimates of the U. S. Bureau of the Census, between 1955 and 1970 the population of Arizona will have increased by 79% to bring the total to 1,900,000 or 2,000,000. (U. S. News and World Report, Nov. 28, 1958, page 78.)

In Arizona the annual increase of elementary school population between 1954-55 and 1957-58 is 8%. The number of high school students increased 32% within the same period.

High School graduates numbered 8,159 in 1958; by 1965 they will number 14,000. Of the 8,159 graduating from high school in 1958, 41% are thought to have entered college.

Only 60% of high school students have been graduating from high school. The remaining 40% likewise needs to become employable through training.

2. There will be great increases in enrollments at four year institutions. The present higher institutions of Arizona report fall enrollments, 1958, to be: University of Arizona, 10,700; Arizona State University, 9,708; and Arizona State College, 1,393. The two Universities at Tucson and Tempe expect to approach each 20,000 students, including upper division and graduate schools, within the decade. The State College will likewise triple in enrollments. Reference to the expected college-age population will quickly make evident the difficulty of the three higher institutions to care for the needs for education beyond high school.

Furthermore, these four-year institutions have not customarily provided the technical-terminal training required for many occupations in business and industry.

The projection of college-age population (18 to 24 years), according to the U. S. Bureau of the Census, Current Population Reports, Series P-25, No. 132, shows for Arizona an increase between 1950 and 1973 of 295%, the highest percentage of growth for any state:

The comparable percentage increase for the United States is estimated at 164%.

The President's Committee on Education Beyond the High School in its Second Report, July, 1957, notes that:

"The needs and demands of individuals and of society in the next 10 to 15 years will require great expansion of the over-all capacity of existing colleges and universities and of other post-high school institutions, with improvements rather than sacrifice of quality. Greater diversity and accessibility of educational opportunities will also be needed. . . .

"Without realizing it we have become a 'society of students.' More than 40 million of us—one-quarter of the nation—are enrolled in formal education programs."

3. There will be a considerable increase in non-agricultural wage and salaried employment in Arizona and, therefore, a need for additional professional, semiprofessional, managerial and official, clerical and skilled workers.

The Arizona State Employment Service in its Study of Manpower Requirements and Training Needs has found that while between 1956 and 1961 employment in mining will have increased only by 7.6% and in agriculture 12.5%, employment in manufacturing will grow by 121%, in construction industries 53.7%, in services 48.3%, and in trade 35.7%.

5. Much the same unevenness of concentration of population will continue into the foreseeable future. In part this is a consequence of the fact that only 15.41% of the area of Arizona is privately owned. The remainder is under federal or State ownership or held in trust for Indians.

When the annual rates of growth of the high school pupil population between 1947-1948 and 1957-1958 are projected to 1965, the following figures emerge:

Maricopa and Pima Counties account for two-thirds of the population of Arizona. Between 1958 and 1965 the population of Maricopa County will grow by 57%; but Phoenix will experience only a 19% growth, Chandler 38%, Mesa 47%, Tempe 60%, Glendale 126%, and Scottsdale 225%.

Gila, Graham and Greenlee Counties together have 4.58% of the population.

The five northern counties—Apache, Coconino, Mohave, Navajo, and Yavapai—have 11.75% of the population.

The concentration of high school population and of high school graduates is likewise unequal:

Thus, in 1965 Maricopa County will still have 51.63% of the high school population; Pima County will have 18.52%; Pinal 5.38%; Yuma 5.22%; and Cochise 4.43%. The percentages for these five counties closely parallel present concentrations.

6. Study of junior college systems of other states has convinced the Junior College Survey Committee that their experience demonstrates that a full-time student enrollment of 320 is the minimum to enable a junior college to maintain transfer and occupational training curricula with range and quality. A formula for prediction of potential junior college enrollment is given in a chapter of this Report; here will be tabulated by counties the potential full-time equivalent student enrollments of counties in 1958 and 1965:

Based upon 1957-1958 high school graduates, the only counties not now served by junior colleges which seem to assure within the next few years a minimum potential enrollment of 320 full-time equivalent students are Cochise, Pima, Pinal, and Yuma. The prospects for other localities will be examined in a chapter of this Report. It is also to be noted that the potential full-time junior college student enrollment in Maricopa County seems shortly to exceed the present capacity of the Phoenix College to accommodate the numbers of students who may be desirous of attending that institution.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendation I

The Legislature shall create a Junior College State Commission, the Majority of the membership to be lay people.

Comment: The Junior College State Commission shall be separate from the present State Board of Education and the Board of Regents for the Universities and State College.

Explanation: Membership on the State Board of Education is ex-officio; members have not the time to enable them to give the consideration required for planning a statewide system of junior colleges intermediate between high school and higher education.

The Board of Regents has no Chancellor to effect a coordinated plan for higher education; each of the existing three institutions must press upon the Board its claims for recognition and budgetary approval. In the years immediately ahead the Board of Regents will have urgent decisions to make with respect to expansions of upper divisions and graduate and professional schools.

A Junior College State Commission could devote itself to the particular concerns of education beyond the high school which are both occupational (terminal and semi-professional) and courses parallel to lower division programs of four year institutions.

Note: It is suggested that a representative of the Board of Regents and of the State Board of Education be members of the Junior College State Commission to further cooperation between the levels of education and agencies concerned with educational problems of the state. It is further suggested that a representative from the State Board of Education, chosen from the Division of Vocational Education, be a member of the Commission.

Recommendation II

The Junior College State Commission shall be authorized and directed to set standards for the establishment and development of all public junior or community colleges, for the administration, operation, and accreditation of junior colleges, and for qualifications of instructional staff, with due reference to vocational competence to instruct in occupational as well as academic subjects.

The Junior College State Commission shall approve the curricula offered by a junior college, in accordance with standards and annually approve the eligibility of a junior college to receive State apportionment or subsidy.

Comment: The administrative and instructional staff of a junior college may require special arrangements for certification in order to insure that experienced and qualified community leaders in businesses, the professions and the arts may teach classes in the fields of their specific competences.

Recommendation III

The Legislature shall declare for all junior colleges hereinafter to be established that the operating district shall be one county or two or more counties.

The minimum tax base of the Junior College District shall be an assessed valuation of sixty millions of dollars (\$60,000,000), and a minimum potential of full-time equivalent students shall be 320.

A full-time equivalent student is student enrollment for fifteen college semester credit units, per semester.

Recommendation IV

The governing board of a district maintaining a junior college or junior colleges shall consist of five members or trustees, regularly elected as prescribed by law, not more than two of whom shall reside in the same city, municipality, or high school district.

Recommendation V

When it is desired to form a county junior college district, not less than five per cent of the qualified electors in the territory included in the proposed district shall petition the county superintendent of schools for establishment of the district. The County Superintendent shall transmit the petition to the Commission which shall conduct a survey of the proposed district to determine that the district, if established, will meet minimum standards of assessed valuation and potential full-time student enrollment. If the Commission approves the petition, the county or counties shall call and conduct an election as prescribed. If the majority of the votes cast favor the formation of the junior college district the district shall deem to be formed.

Note: It is intended that the vote to establish a junior college district, and to bond the district for capital outlay, shall follow the procedure set forth in the Constitution of Arizona, Article 7, Section 13, as amended at election Nov. 4, 1930, effective Dec. 1, 1930: "Questions upon bond issues or special assessments shall be submitted to the vote of real property taxpayers, who shall also in all respects be qualified electors of this State, and of the political subdivisions thereof affected by such question."

Recommendation VI

The Legislature shall authorize and require to be levied in each county not maintaining and operating a junior college a tax for reimbursement for the number of full-time equivalent students resident in the county in attendance at a junior college in the State during the preceding fiscal year. Such reimbursement shall be the cost of instruction of a full-time equivalent student at the junior college attended, less State apportionment or subsidy, plus an amount for capital outlay and debt service as set by the Junior College State Commission.

Recommendation VII

The Legislature shall replace the practice of flat sum appropriations to the presently established junior colleges (Phoenix Junior College and Eastern Arizona Junior College) with support based upon full-time equivalent students, at such a time as greater State support is forthcoming from the recommended formula than is appropriated under the present law.

The number of full-time equivalent students shall be computed by dividing total college credit units by fifteen, per semester. Support shall be based upon regular day enrollment; members of classes for adults shall not be included.

It is suggested that an increased amount, not to exceed twenty per cent, over the regularly authorized apportionment per full-time equivalent students, be allowed for the first three hundred twenty full-time equivalent students.

Comment: It is intended that the State shall support current costs of maintenance and operation of junior colleges to the extent of fifty per cent of net costs, less federal monies received by the junior college.

The Resolution was read in full as follows:

A RESOLUTION

On the death of Rabbi A. L. Krohn

Rabbi A. L. Krohn, beloved spiritual leader and distinguished citizen of the State of Arizona, quietly passed away at the age of sixty-five years on November 23, 1958, in the City of Phoenix.

Rabbi Krohn was born in Plainfield, New Jersey. His first vocation was as a social worker and from that profession he became a Rabbi, thereby becoming the sixth generation of his family to enter the Rabbinate. He devoted many years of distinguished service to his religion and to the community in New York and New Mexico prior to moving to Arizona.

Rabbi Krohn came to Phoenix in 1938. Thereafter his record was exemplified by his devotion to his congregation and to all the people of the State. In the community Rabbi Krohn exerted his individual efforts toward creating a better place to live in such a way that his light will not be extinguished for years to come.

In the field of education the good Rabbi served as President of the Phoenix Elementary School Board. Moreover, he was the founder of the Phoenix Community Council and was honored by being named as an Honorary Life First Vice-president of the Council.

The National Conference of Christians and Jews, an organization devoted to creating and perpetuating good will among all people, paid tribute to Rabbi Krohn's efforts to bring closer the brotherhood of man. He was also awarded an Honorary Doctor of Divinity Degree from Hebrew Union-Jewish Institute of Religion in New York. In 1955 Arizona State University awarded Rabbi Krohn an Honorary Doctor of Literature Degree. In addition thereto, the American Red Cross presented him an award for outstanding service to humanity. The Maricopa County Medical Society also presented Rabbi Krohn a Distinguished Service Award.

Rabbi Krohn's interest and dedication to humanity was expressed in terms of duty and work for and on behalf of the people and his community. He earned the admiration and respect of persons from all walks of life. His service was extended to all regardless of race, creed or color, and his desire to create lasting world peace among nations and good will among men was boundless. For many years Rabbi Krohn served as Chaplain in the Arizona State Senate.

Therefore

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Arizona:

That the members of the Senate do sincerely regret the passing of Rabbi A. L. Krohn and are hereby fully aware of the loss to the community and the State which exists as a result of his death. His sense of humor, devoted interest in community betterment and his keen analysis of problems confronting all of us will be missed by the citizens of this State. The Senate also extends condolences to the surviving members of his family.

Dear Clarence:

It must be obvious to everyone after last year's election that Arizona is now a two-party state. Therefore, I believe the time has come to give serious consideration to whatever steps are necessary to improve and strengthen our political institutions and thereby improve the calibre of the government of our State.

I have spent a good deal of time recently looking into the procedures used in various states to strengthen the political parties and to encourage the nomination of men of the highest calibre for public service. I believe both political parties in Arizona have witnessed instances in recent years where fratricidal bloodletting in primaries left wounds so deep that the

ultimate defeat of the person nominated was inevitable. Indeed, while the direct primary is perhaps the greatest obstacle to party unity in states with a fairly equal political balance, it has been demonstrated in other states that it is possible to modify our primary election procedures in such a way that party cohesion can be maintained while at the same time preserving the fundamental virtues of the direct primary.

Specifically, I want to call to your attention the pre-primary convention systems various states have adopted, and I hope the legislature will give careful consideration to these proposals to ascertain whether Arizona's two-party system might not be strengthened thereby.

I want to explain at the outset that I am not suggesting that the legislature eliminate Arizona's primary election and adopt a nominating convention as a substitute. The plan which I believe should have the widest appeal to Arizonans would provide for a pre-primary party endorsement of candidates (at a convention) and the open support of such candidates by the official party organization during the primary campaign. Such a system would also provide that candidates failing to get party endorsement could also qualify for a place on the ballot.

The pre-primary endorsement system was strongly advocated fifty years ago by Charles Evans Hughes, then Governor of New York, who was motivated by a desire to encourage able men to seek office and believed that such men could be found if the party organization could officially and publicly endorse and support them in the primary. Instead of New York, however, Colorado first adopted a modified Hughes system in 1912.

The Colorado law authorized pre-primary assemblies to endorse candidates for all but municipal offices. Delegates to county assemblies are chosen by party caucuses in the precincts, and delegates to district and state assemblies are chosen by county assemblies. Any person who receives as much as 20% of the assembly vote for an office goes on the primary ballot as having the endorsement of the assembly. (In practice, the assembly rarely endorses more than one candidate, however.) Unendorsed candidates can get on the ballot by submitting petitions.

The newest primary election law in the 49 states, and one which has received favorable comment lately, was adopted in Connecticut in 1955. Called the "primary by challenge", it provides that a party convention choose a candidate for each office who is listed on the ballot as "party-endorsed". Any aspirant who unsuccessfully sought party endorsement at the convention and who received as much as 20% of the convention vote would have the right to "challenge" the convention's nominee by getting on the ballot via filing petitions and a fee. Under this system there is no place for the ordinary petition-type candidate (i.e., no way to by-pass the convention), and an office seeker with less than 20% of the convention vote "on any ballot" is disqualified from the primary election.

A much less desirable system was adopted by Utah in 1947, where the convention is required to select two candidates

for each office from those who have filed nomination papers. These two candidates, and no others, fight it out in the party primary.

Another variation is the Rhode Island law, adopted in 1948, which provides that all candidates file for the primaries, and that appropriate party committees then endorse a candidate for each office. Endorsed candidates are given first place on the ballot and have a star beside their names; any non-endorsed candidates' names follow. Massachusetts adopted a similar law in 1953.

These are the only five states that now have official pre-primary endorsement systems, although California has an unofficial endorsement procedure: by the Republican Assemblies since 1934, and the Democratic Councils since 1953.

It should be noted that four of the five state pre-primary convention laws have been adopted during the past eleven years. This sudden trend in up-dating primary election laws was partly the cause, and in part the result, of a thoughtful study and enthusiastic endorsement of pre-primary designation systems by a committee of distinguished political scientists and public men in 1951.

The effectiveness of these systems is somewhat surprising. In the first test of the Connecticut law (1956), no party-endorsed candidate for state office was challenged, and only 30 of 800 endorsed candidates for local office were challenged. In Rhode Island the same year, endorsed Republican candidates made a clean sweep of offices in eleven of twelve communities, and 27 out of 33 endorsed legislative candidates won in the Democratic primary. Endorsed Republican candidates in Massachusetts are usually unopposed, while Democrats there have met strong (but not winning) opposition from petition candidates.

As I see it, some kind of pre-primary endorsement system holds the prospect of improving our political life in the following ways:

1. By upgrading the importance of precinct committeemen and making them responsible for endorsing **qualified** candidates (directly or through convention delegates). Indeed, such added responsibility would invite and demand participation by the most highly qualified people at the precinct level, and stimulate discrimination by rank and file party voters in selecting such officials.

2. The promise of party endorsement and support during a primary campaign would make it much more likely that our parties could obtain outstanding people as candidates—people who otherwise might not consider spending the energy and money to wage a hard-fought primary campaign single-handed. It is conceivable that with the offer of official organization support, both parties could always induce men of outstanding capacity to enter primary elections.

3. If, as I believe, the door to challenge thru an "open primary" were also left ajar this would provide the people

with a ready means to check the excesses of irresponsible party officials.

4. And finally, I think it is generally accepted that vigorous, responsible political parties are the people's greatest protection against the demagogues or candidates of special interests.

I will be most interested in hearing your reaction to this entire matter and, naturally, hope that we will have an opportunity to discuss it at length sometime soon.

On the death of Honorable Fred L. Ingraham

One of Arizona's most distinguished citizens passed away at the age of ninety on July 26, 1958, in Yuma, Arizona.

The Honorable Fred L. Ingraham, known throughout the State as Judge Ingraham, was born February 13, 1868, in the State of Ohio. He attended public schools in Ohio and Michigan and subsequently graduated from the University of Michigan Law College. Judge Ingraham also devoted considerable time in acquiring proficiency in the literary department at the University of Michigan.

After graduation, Judge Ingraham began his career as an instructor in English at the Ypsilanti Normal College in

Michigan and there he established an excellent reputation as a teacher and exponent of "pure English."

Judge Ingraham decided to move westward because of his health. In 1901 he reached Yuma by wagon train and homesteaded two miles southwest of Gadsden. The Honorable Fred L. Ingraham began the practice of law upon his arrival and at his death had the distinction of being the oldest practicing Attorney in the State of Arizona.

During the next fifty-seven years Judge Ingraham forged his career within this State and in his characteristic manner he achieved a life full of distinction and honor.

In 1910 Judge Ingraham was elected to the Constitutional Convention. During the existence of this term he served on the Style, Revision and Compilation Committee. The function of this Committee was to set up the different sections of the Constitution in proper order and to prevent inconsistent and contradictory provisions. For this position Judge Ingraham was uniquely qualified because of his educational training and teaching experience.

Later Judge Ingraham served as Yuma City Attorney and in 1914 he was selected by the citizens of Yuma County to serve as the County Attorney. In 1918 Honorable Fred L. Ingraham was elected Superior Court Judge and served in that position with distinction until 1930.

Judge Ingraham, despite a busy schedule, continued to serve his fellow citizens without regard to his own personal interests. He assisted in organizing Yuma's first high school district and was Chairman of the Board of Education until 1922. Moreover, he helped to organize the Yuma County Water Users district and then served as Secretary of that association. Judge Ingraham also served on the Yuma Centennial Commission which planned the one hundredth anniversary celebration of the Gadsden Purchase.

Judge Ingraham was a member of the Yuma Elks Lodge for forty-six years and also was a member of the Kiwanis Club of Yuma for many years. He also maintained his membership in the State Bar of Arizona and the American Bar Association.

Therefore

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Arizona:

That the members of the Senate sincerely regret the passing of Judge Fred L. Ingraham from the Arizona scene and note that the Honorable Judge Fred L. Ingraham has left an imprint on this State, and the City of Yuma in particular which will remain forever as a monument to his character, integrity, and selfless interest in community and civic enterprises.

**A PLAN TO PROVIDE DISABILITY PROTECTION
FOR MEMBERS OF THE ARIZONA STATE RE-
TIREMENT SYSTEM**

I would like to discuss a facet of the Arizona State Re-

tirement Law, providing benefits for state employees and teachers, that could well stand legislative improvement.

As we know, the recently improved federal social security law now provides for a disability retirement income to begin at age 50, even if the disability occurred before that age. This desired amendment in the federal law provides the same retirement income for the disabled person at age 50 as the service retirement payments would have been at age 65. Federal law assumption of disability protection at ages above 50 now makes it feasible to amend the state retirement act to provide comparable disability benefits from the time of disability to age 50. Federal social security law will provide the disabled person an income of from \$100 to \$120 per month after age 50. I invite the Senate's concern with the important task of improving the Arizona state retirement system so that, at a minimum cost, it would provide a disabled employee with a comparable benefit prior to age 50.

A previous legislative session amended the state retirement system law to provide for accelerated payments from that system to the disabled employee, such payments ending when the account is exhausted. This period will be different, but may average only four or five years. Unfortunately, some state employees, teachers, and other members of the system, are disabled in the relatively young ages and insufficient savings have been built up in their retirement accounts to accomplish an adequate, or comparable, income before age 50.

We are all increasingly aware that the amount employees may allot from their wages for retirement—including such related items as survivors' protection and disability coverage—is limited from other day-to-day demands on their earnings for necessities such as rent, food, utilities, etc. The ability and willingness of the employer to share in the cost of such protection is also restricted. There is a genuine need for increased prior service credit pension payments. There is an awareness that membership benefits are a minimum recognition of current employment. Thus, it becomes especially important that a revision of the state retirement act to provide greater disability benefits be carefully written so that state law will benefit from, and certainly not duplicate, the federal social security protection. By so doing, cost will be held to a minimum because disability benefits will be provided only for ages where there exists an actual need.

As another example of savings in costs from avoiding needless duplication, I would propose that special disability benefits should not be created in the state retirement law for the employee whose disability resulted from his employment and who, therefore, will draw industrial insurance.

Let me cite a specific example of the plight of one state employee. This employee is 40 years of age and has been employed for 15 years by one state agency. For over five years he has paid 3½% of his wage to the Arizona state retirement system. In the past year his mental and physical condition has deteriorated to the point where he now produces less than the expected normal workload. He is the victim of multiple sclerosis and his condition has been diagnosed progressive.

It has been estimated that present retirement fund balances in this employee's account would provide him a disability retirement benefit of \$50 per month for about four years, after which time his account would be exhausted and there would be no further payment from the state system. For a period of about six years, until he attains age 50 and becomes eligible for federal social security disability retirement benefits, he probably will have to rely on charity. Further, it is evident that even during the four-year period in which he would be receiving the state retirement system disability benefit of \$50 per month his income position is much too precarious. I cannot understand how any man with a wife and two children can be expected to live on \$50 a month. If this example I cite today seems extreme, I can only point out that it is not at all an isolated case.

I strongly recommend that the Senate direct the legislative council and the retirement board of the Arizona state retirement system to promptly accept a definite assignment to prepare legislation resulting from an intensive study of this problem. I further recommend that such proposals receive the careful attention of this legislature at the earliest possible date.

The assignment might be termed our request to determine the most feasible and economical means of providing a disability income of \$100 per month for the member of the system who has completed not less than five years of creditable service and who is found, by a prudent medical board, to be so disabled he cannot perform gainful employment. The proposed law would also provide that such benefit payments will cease when, and if, the employee becomes eligible for a disability benefit under the federal social security law. No benefit would be paid if industrial insurance was being received. We would suggest the study determine and report to the legislature the best means of financing the increased disability benefits without reducing retirement and survivors' income for those members of the system now age 50 and over. The study might find that only employees less than 50 years of age would contribute to the disability benefit fund. Possibly, the study may find that costs will be low and appropriations for the new benefits will be willingly assumed by the employer.

I recommend to the Senate that the study is so important as to justify an appropriation of \$2,000 to help defray the cost of employing an actuary to help the retirement board with this study.

This bill was Senate Bill No. 194 last year, and I at that time expressed my objection to the bill, which was subsequently vetoed by Governor MacFarland.

In light of the many airplane crashes on scheduled airlines which we have been reading about lately, and the wide-spread discussion of the danger of drinking in automobiles, I feel it would be exceedingly dangerous to allow airplanes to sell liquor in the close proximity of the cabin on a scheduled airline, with persons imbibing liquor being allowed to roam about an airplane in flight. There would also be the possibility of creating disturbances, annoying other passengers, and possibly gaining access to the flight officer's cabin and consequent loss of control of the aircraft, resulting in injury to persons and property, not overlooking the general annoyance and inconvenience to non-drinkers, whereby an intoxicated person might be sitting within inches of a non-drinker and also children and elderly people.

Therefore, I vote "no".

Last year this bill, then numbered 178, was opposed by me on third reading on the grounds that I considered it for the benefit of the railroad, and my remarks will be found on page 485 of the Journal of the Senate for the year 1958.

I then pointed out that I was not opposed to competition between the railroad and truckers and felt it would be a healthy thing as long as the shippers were not hurt as a result of the competition. However, in a regulated monopoly such as

truckers and railroads enjoy, it is dangerous to give an advantage for a short haul over a long haul from the standpoint of rates, as may be pointed out in an example. Presume that the railroads, under this bill, are permitted to charge a lower rate for hauls to Casa Grande via Coolidge and Picacho than for hauls to the intermediate points of Picacho and Coolidge in order that the railroad may compete with the truckers hauling from Phoenix to Casa Grande. This rate must be made up by the railroad at some point and, presumably, only by petitioning for increased rates on other parts of their line. This is a detriment to the shipper. An outstanding example would be the railroad hauling to Globe via Bowie, a distance of approximately 347 miles, and receiving a lower rate for such haul in order to compete with the truckers hauling some 88 miles to Globe from Phoenix. This would have to be made up at some point if the railroad is to operate economically, and again at a detriment to the shipper.

It is true that such practices are sometimes approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission on interstate hauls, but it is also true that the Interstate Commerce Commission is provided with funds to hire experts in the field of rate-making, while the Arizona Corporation Commission is not given funds to hire such experts, and it has been admitted by the Corporation Commission openly at a hearing on March 3, 1958, that it has a job to do in rate-making but hasn't the force or the funds to do the job.

I feel this bill is not to the best interest of the general taxpayer and citizen of the state of Arizona who must use the common carriers to ship their goods.

Therefore, I vote "no".

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Senator Richards arose to a point of personal privilege, to pay tribute in the following wording to Abraham Lincoln whose birthday we celebrate today, saying that the two Houses of Congress are meeting today in joint session to honor Abe Lincoln—the first time since the 1860's.

Mr. President, my words this morning might rightfully come from the Senate's Republican whip, the senior Senator from Pima county.

This morning I draw attention of the Senate to the anniversary of the birth of one of our greatest Americans, who, as a leading member of the old Whig party, became President of the United States in our country's most unhappy period in history and who subsequently gained the respect and love of all mankind for his unwavering devotion to the ideals of human liberty and justice. Likewise, he became known as the founder of what some people today call the Republican Party.

It was 150 years ago today that Abraham Lincoln was born in that famous log cabin in Kentucky and most of us know of his difficult boyhood, his thorough training in self-reliance and honesty, his career in the Illinois Legislature, his rather stormy term in the United States Congress and his ascendancy to the high office of the President of the United States, where he served through the sorrowful period of the war between the states.

It is fitting this morning to draw attention to the fact that it was Abraham Lincoln who signed the proclamation creating Arizona Territory in 1863.

There are few loyal citizens of our country who will fail to recognize the part this great President played in the preservation of the Union and in bringing personal liberty to a vast segment of our population.

Although the Republicans use the occasion of his birthday to make speeches and to wave partisan banners, most Americans observe the anniversary of his birth with thanksgiving and even with a spirit of reverence for his service to mankind.

Thank you, Mr. President.

The roll was called and the following Senators answered to their names:

By unanimous consent the reading of the Journal of Friday, February 13, 1959, was dispensed with and the Journal was approved.

PRIVILEGES OF THE FLOOR

Senator Wine called attention of the Senate to the presence in the gallery of Hon. Harry Ackerman, former member of the Senate from Pima county. The privileges of the floor were extended to Mr. Ackerman and he was invited to occupy a seat in the Senate chamber.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Senator Richards arose to a point of personal privilege to address the Senate as follows, recalling that memorable day forty-seven years ago last Saturday, February 14, 1912, the day that Arizona became a state:

Mr. President:

Arizona today is observing the 47th anniversary of its birth as a state, after 49 years as a separate territory.

Saturday was the actual anniversary, but I ask leave this morning to draw attention of the Senate to the events on that February day in 1912 when Arizona became the newest state and for more than half a century was rightfully known as the Baby State.

Now we have become an older sister, or brother, to Alaska in the stars in the flag, but we are still in our youth and are acting with vigor and vision in the development of our possibilities.

Following is the statehood proclamation:

"Now, therefore, I, William Howard Taft, President of the United States of America, do, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of Congress and the joint resolution of Congress, herein named, declare and proclaim the act that the

fundamental conditions imposed by Congress on the state of Arizona to entitle that state to admission, have been ratified and accepted and that the admission of the state into the Union upon an equal footing with the other states is now complete.

"In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done at the City of Washington, this fourteenth day of February, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twelve, and of the United States of America, the one hundredth and thirty sixth."

Moving picture cameras began grinding. The President of the United States took up a pen. For the first time in history, the President was to be photographed by moving picture cameras in the act of signing a proclamation creating a new state.

The pen flashed; scratched its way across the imposing looking paper; stopped. The President turned to Delegate Ralph Cameron of Arizona, handed him the pen with which he had just signed his name, and said, "I welcome Arizona into the Union, and wish her people all prosperity. I hope to see the valleys of the new state teeming with prosperity and afford homes to many thousands of people."

The proclamation had been signed at "10:02½ A.M." At 10:23 A.M. the President sent the following message to Governor Richard E. Sloan:

"I have this morning signed the proclamation declaring Arizona to be a State of the Union. I congratulate the people of this, our newest commonwealth, upon the realization of their long cherished ambition. Best wishes to the retiring and incoming officials."

Word of the signing of the proclamation reached Phoenix by wire at 8:55 A.M. (Mountain Standard Time—10:55 A.M. Eastern Standard Time). The first flash came to the news desk of the Arizona Democrat. Immediately this newspaper telephoned to the "water works, gas plants, laundries, and other establishments equipped with big whistles" so that the glad news could be heralded to the people. Within ten minutes not only had other newspapers received the word but the people of Phoenix were in the midst of a great celebration."

At 11:15 A.M. began a march to the state capitol by Governor Geo. W. P. Hunt, which was described by one writer to be "spectacular in its simplicity." The Governor, his secretary, members of his official family, democratic committeemen, and a large gathering of interested citizens, marched along the sidewalk on the north side of Washington street from the hotel to the capitol. The procession was estimated to contain 200 people.

The fear here today, in the midst of another legislative session, is that we will lose sight of the great purposes of self-

government, and forget that we can defeat our own best interests by failing to protect the very sources of our strength.

If we give way to all the selfish requests of those who would dissipate the resources of our lands, our forests, our fields, and our working population, by too much taxation and too many unneeded public services, we might put shackles on the very sources of our potential greatness.

It is my hope this morning that we give second and third looks at that legislation which provides services we can obtain from private agencies, at that which provides undue appropriations for services now being performed, but that we not ignore the needs of a growing and expanding state, and that we make possible the continued growth of our industries, that we continue to encourage new capital to invest in our enterprises, and that we provide our state government with the tools with which to meet the challenges of its new status as the fastest growing child among the children of Democracy.

Thank you, Mr. President.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Senator Palmer arose to a point of personal privilege and called attention of the Senators, in the following wording, to the various prices of gasoline existing in the state:

When the average man cries out and fumes about something wherein he feels he has been wronged, little is done about it and nobody cares much. We are fortunate as Senators that sometimes when we cry out about something, it centers the public's attention on the matter.

I would like to, if possible, focus the public's attention, and particularly the attention of my fellow Senators in outlying counties, to the gas prices existing in this State. For example, the price of Ethyl gas in Prescott runs about 39-9/10¢ per gallon and in Phoenix areas 29-9/10¢ per gallon. In other words, we pay 10¢ more per gallon in Prescott or about \$2.00 more a tankful than do the people of Phoenix. This does not appear to be the fault of individual dealers.

I feel it is inexcusable for the companies to take advantage of people who, because of geographical location, must from day to day buy their gas in one locality. I think it is time the situation was corrected, and if it is not corrected, I intend to look into the possibilities as to whether or not the sale of gasoline is so afflicted with the public interest so as to be subject to rate regulation by the Corporation Commission or some other proper body. I do not believe in Government regulation of private business unless necessary, but it looks like it may be necessary. I do not think it costs 10¢ per gallon to haul gas to Prescott over the cost in Phoenix.

Man's same desire for freedom which prompted George Washington and his fellow colonists to rise up and throw off the yoke of Great Britain is just as strong today as it was in 1776.

The spirit of personal liberty has swept the entire world since those eventful years on the eastern seaboard of North America, when men were willing to give their lives rather than endure unjust taxation or political slavery.

George Washington was considered among the great men of the world even in his own time. The anniversary of his birth was celebrated by his fellow citizens long before his life ended peacefully at Mt. Vernon.

His greatness has increased with the years, and today we acknowledge him, as men have done in the past, as "first in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen."

In carrying on the traditions of our founding fathers, of which Washington was an outstanding leader, we must be ever on the alert to guard against unjust taxation, the limiting of man's inherent personal liberties, and dissipating our nation's natural and human resources beyond recovery.

Mr. President, I commend to the Senate and the people of Arizona this morning the basic principles espoused by Washington in the infancy of our nation, so that we may ever remain the strong free land that we have been since his time.

Senator Brooke offered the following explanation of his vote on Senate Bill No. 35:

I cannot vote for a bill which imposes an additional \$20,000,000 in taxes, 50% of which comes from the people of my county, when not sufficient regard for the problems of an expanding and almost exploding school population is shown by the Senators from other counties.

Senator Morrow offered the following explanation of his vote on Senate Bill No. 35:

I wish to explain my vote on Senate Bill No. 35 and the attendant bills:

I am voting for Senate Bill 35 and the attendant bills not because I am in entire agreement upon them.

There is no equalization as between districts within counties; cities and towns presently have the authority to enact increased sales taxes should necessity warrant; however, it is the best approach presently under discussion.

I am hopeful of desirable amendments when all bills are considered in conference.

I vote Aye.

Senator Greer offered the following explanation of his vote on Senate Bill No. 35:

I am supporting the two Senate School Bills, 35 and 36, because I believe they are a start in the right direction. However, I have some misgivings about these bills. I do not like

the idea of budget limitations, the poorer districts would not be helped as much as I would like, and not enough of the sales tax money would go for education. However, there is no other measure to aid schools likely to be voted upon in the Senate.

I am therefore supporting the Senate's two bills to get the ball rolling. I sincerely hope that the conference between the Senate and House will arrive at some compromise that will give the majority of the sales tax increase to the schools. Also that the conferees will adopt a theory of equalization that will help the poorer districts more than those which have wealth and a small tax rate to sustain a good school program without excessive taxes. I have several of these poorer districts in my county.

To vote "No" might hinder such a possible compromise; thus, I support the program with these reservations in which I place my trust in the Senate leadership to carry out.

Senator Wine offered the following explanation of his vote on Senate Bill No. 35:

I am opposed to Senate Bill 35 which has been offered as part of a so-called package to assist with the problem of school financing. Upon examination, I find that only a small portion of the additional funds raised would be channeled into school districts. I cannot vote for a bill to increase sales taxes by 50% without adequately solving the problem of providing supplemental aid to needy school districts and thereby reducing the alarming burden of the school district property taxpayer. I vote "No."

Senator Smith (Graham) offered the following explanation of his vote on Senate Bill No. 35:

I am opposed to Senate Bill No. 35 for the following reasons:

1. The common people of the State of Arizona have, for many years paid a 2% sales tax while the corporate interests of the state have paid only 1%.
2. My amendment proposes to put \$1.00 across the board on the sales tax. This would more nearly equalize the present unfair sales tax.
3. It would raise considerable revenue from a source which for many years has had special privilege under the sales tax law.

The most unfair part of the old sales tax bill is the distribution of the tax collected on the basis of assessed valuation, so the richer counties get more on a percentage basis while the poorer counties get less.

Senate Bill No. 35 continues these inequities and dissipates the revenue which should be raised for school tax purposes and distributes it under the formula of the old sales tax.

I therefore vote "NO".

ARTICLE 2.1. MINIMUM ESSENTIALS PROGRAM

15-1221. Definitions.

In this article, unless the context otherwise requires:

1. "Assessed valuation" means the net valuation set by county assessors, the state tax commission, or both, on real estate, improvements and personal property in each school district or county as most recently equalized by the county and state agencies authorized to equalize such assessments, and shown on the latest equalized assessment rolls of each county.

2. "Average daily attendance" means the average daily attendance for the school year unless otherwise designated.

3. "Current average daily attendance" shall mean the sum of last year's average daily attendance and the increase over the previous year's average daily attendance.

4. "Common school" means kindergarten to eighth grades inclusive.

5. "High school" means the ninth to twelfth grades inclusive.

6. "Basic state aid" means the sum of money designated by the state legislature to be allocated through the counties to districts upon the basis of the average daily attendance of the districts, pursuant to article 11, sections 8 and 9, constitution of Arizona, and section 15-1211, Arizona Revised Statutes.

7. "Basic county aid" means the monies set aside from the county general fund by the board of supervisors and other monies accruing to the county school fund, which are added to the amounts appropriated by the legislature pursuant to section 15-1211, and are apportioned on the per capita per annum basis for common and high school education within the county.

8. "Equalization aid" means the state monies that are in addition to the basic state aid and which are to be distributed to the counties and school districts as provided by sections 15-1223, 15-1224, 15-1225 and 15-1226, in order to enable each school district to maintain an acceptable minimum educational program, in the manner specified in this article.

9. "Minimum essentials program" means that sum of money for operational purposes which is required to provide a minimum standard of education for every child in average daily attendance, obtained from sources indicated in subsection B of section 15-1224, and equalization aid.

10. "District qualifying tax rate" means the tax rate of one dollar per one hundred dollars assessed valuation of property in each common school district and one dollar per one hundred dollars assessed valuation in each high school district, except for districts receiving federal funds. In such districts the qualifying tax rate will equal one dollar minus the district tax rate necessary to produce such federal funds. This levy must be made by the county board of supervisors for current operational expenses of each such district as a condition for the district being eligible for participation in the county school equalization fund monies. The yield from the district qualifying tax rate, along with the other revenues listed in subsection B of section 15-1225, will guarantee each district the minimum essentials program so that every child in attendance will be guaranteed a minimum standard of education. In elementary districts that are not in a high school district, the county board of supervisors must levy an additional one dollar levy in each such district in order for the district to qualify for equalization aid to pay tuition for high school pupils. In addition to the elementary school district, and high school district qualifying tax rates which totals two dollars per one hundred dollars

assessed valuation each elementary and high school district must also levy taxes for desired capital outlay, debt service, special building fund, and special fund for improvement of adjacent ways.

11. "Operational expenses" means the administrative, instructional, operational, maintenance, auxiliary, fixed charges, and contingencies incurred in the operation of a school district, and exclusive of all capital outlay items, special levies, and bond service items.

12. "State school equalization fund" means the monies appropriated by the state legislature under the terms of this article to provide equalization aid to county school equalization funds and thence to common and high school districts of the counties.

13. "County school equalization funds" means the monies paid by the state treasurer from the state school equalization fund to the county school equalization funds for equalization purposes in the common and high school districts.

14. "School district needs" means the amount of financial aid that each district needs in order to guarantee every pupil in average daily attendance a minimum essentials program for the current school year.

15-1222. STATE LEVY FOR STATE SCHOOL EQUALIZATION FUND

In addition to the appropriations provided by article 11, sections 8 and 9, constitution of Arizona, and section 15-1211, Arizona Revised Statutes, the legislature shall appropriate for the common and high schools a sum of money equal to and sufficient to meet the state's portion of the equalization needs of the several counties for the school year, and shall equal the equalization needs of the previous year plus an additional five per cent of such amount. To calculate the previous year's needs, the current average daily attendance in common and high schools as shown by the records of the superintendent of public instruction will be used in making the computation. The assessed valuation of individual school districts and counties for the previous year and receipts listed in section 15-1225, subsection B, for the previous fiscal year will be used in making the computation.

15-1223. APPORTIONMENT OF STATE SCHOOL EQUALIZATION FUND

A. Funds in the state school equalization fund shall be apportioned to the county school equalization funds of the several qualifying counties and be based on the total actual needs of state equalization monies in all of the counties, as defined by this article, not later than the second Monday in July, October, January, and April of each year. The July apportionment shall be based on the county needs as determined by the application of the assessed valuations of the previous year. The other apportionments will be adjusted in such manner that total actual needs based on the current year's assessed

valuation will be operative. In no event will any county receive more than the actual needs for equalization purposes and any balance remaining in the state school equalization fund at the end of the fiscal year will revert to the state general fund. In the event that state equalization funds are insufficient to meet the needs of all the counties such funds shall be apportioned to the counties in proportion to the total equalization needs of each county.

B. The superintendent of public instruction shall furnish the treasurer and the school superintendent of each county an abstract of each of the apportionments in subsection A of this section, and shall certify the apportionment to the state auditor, who shall draw his warrant in favor of the county treasurer of each county for the amount apportioned thereto. Upon receipt of such warrant the county treasurer shall immediately notify the county superintendent that the amount thereof, together with any other monies standing to the credit of the county school equalization fund, is subject to apportionment as prescribed by law.

15-1224. COUNTY APPORTIONMENT OF EQUALIZATION AID TO COMMON SCHOOL DISTRICTS

A. In addition to the amounts of school district monies accruing to common school districts and specified in subsection B of this section, the county school superintendent shall compute and apportion the money in the county school equalization fund in accordance with the following:

1. For each district with an average daily attendance of not more than twenty-six point zero during the previous school year, or with a larger attendance but only one teacher, an amount of equalization aid for operational expenses sufficient to provide said district with a total of five thousand dollars, subject to the employment of at least one full-time regularly certified teacher.

2. For each two-teacher school district with an average daily attendance of more than twenty-six point zero during the previous school year, an amount of equalization aid for operational expenses sufficient to provide such district with a total of nine thousand dollars, subject to the employment of at least two full-time regularly certificated teachers.

3. Each common school district that employed three or more teachers during the previous school year shall, for purposes of this article, be allotted by the county school superintendent equalization aid for operational expenses as required, sufficient to provide as a minimum essentials program the product of not less than three hundred dollars, multiplied by the current average daily attendance. Said equalization aid shall be allotted subsequent to the computation of the items specified in subsection B of this section.

B. In computing the amounts of county equalization aid that each common and high school district shall receive the following revenues shall be credited to the minimum essentials program of each district and shall be deducted from the school district's need:

1. The unexpended portion of the previous year's minimum essentials program.

2. Basic state aid and basic county aid that the school district will actually receive by operation of sections 15-1211, 15-1235 and 15-1241.

3. Federal monies received during the previous year that were specified for Indian education aid and emergency operational aid that are in proportion to the ratio of the qualifying tax rate to the actual school tax rate levied by each district during the previous school year; provided, that any federal funds to be allocated to the school districts by any law passed by the United States congress after the adoption of this act shall not be so deducted.

4. The calculated district tax yield from the levy of the qualifying district tax rate on the current year's assessed valuation.

5. The previous year's tuition payments from districts of residence if such districts did not claim state and county funds for the pupils involved.

6. The previous year's tuition from the special county school reserve fund.

7. The previous year's tuition from nonresident tuition pupils who are residents of Arizona.

C. The following revenue and nonrevenue items that were received during the previous fiscal year or that will be received during the current fiscal year will not be credited to the minimum essentials program and will not be deducted in computing equalization aid for common and high school districts:

1. Special aid for home bound children or tuition for same.
2. Claims collected from insurance companies for losses.
3. Tax yields for capital outlay.
4. Special district levy for improvements of adjacent ways.
5. Special district levy for ten cent building fund.
6. Special levy for interest and redemption of bonded indebtedness.
7. Tuition from nonresident alien pupils, out-of-state pupils, and tuition from other districts that claimed state and county funds for the pupils involved.
8. Tuition from night school pupils.
9. Rental from school facilities.
10. School lunch program funds.
11. Student activity funds.

12. Tax yields for tuition payment of district pupils who attend other schools.

13. Monies from sale of capital outlay items.

14. Federal and state monies received for vocational education.

15. Federal monies received by the district for the care and living expenses of Indian pupils.

16. Any overdraft necessitated by lack of sufficient funds to meet the minimum essentials program of the previous year.

15-1225. COUNTY APPORTIONMENT OF EQUALIZATION AID TO HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICTS

A. Each high school district, and each common school district not in a high school district that pays tuition for high school pupils residing in such districts, shall for the purposes of this article be allotted by the county school superintendent equalization aid as required, sufficient to provide as a minimum essentials program the product of not less than five hundred dollars, multiplied by the current average daily attendance. Said equalization aid shall be allotted subsequent to the computation of the items listed in subsection B of section 15-1224, except that elementary districts not in a high school district must levy the high school districts qualifying tax rate for tuition payment for high school pupils in addition to the elementary district's qualifying tax rate for the operational costs of the elementary district before being eligible for equalization aid to pay tuition for high school pupils.

B. Any allotments herein specified for high school districts shall be contingent upon levying in high school districts, and common school districts not in any high school district but which pay tuition for high school pupils, for current operating expenses only, the qualifying district tax rate for high school pupils as prescribed by law. The revenues listed in subsection B of section 15-1224, shall be deducted by the county school superintendent from the minimum essentials program of each district before equalization aid specified herein shall be allocated.

15-1226. APPORTIONMENT OF COUNTY EQUALIZATION AID TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS

A. Funds in the county school equalization fund shall be apportioned to the districts of the county on the basis of need and shall be apportioned on or before the third Monday in July, October, January and April. The July apportionment shall be based on the school districts' needs as determined by the application of the assessed valuations of the previous year. However, the other apportionments will be adjusted in such manner that total actual needs based on the current year's assessed valuation will be operative. If a school district receives a greater apportionment in July than it is entitled to receive for the entire fiscal year such overage must be returned by the school district and will be credited to the county

school equalization fund. In no event will any school district receive more equalization aid than it is entitled to receive under this article.

B. The county school superintendent shall provide each school district with a statement of the apportionments made in accordance with subsection A of this section on a form prescribed by the superintendent of public instruction.

15-1227. ANNEXED, CONSOLIDATED, AND UNIFIED DISTRICTS SHALL RETAIN FUNDS ALLOTTED PURSUANT TO THIS ARTICLE; DISCRETION OF STATE BOARD AS TO DIVIDED DISTRICTS

A. All districts combined by annexation, consolidation, or by formation of union school districts shall each retain their rights to such basic state aid, and full equalization aid of such kinds as are set forth in this article for the three fiscal years subsequent to the completion of such annexation, consolidation or formation of union school districts, provided, however, such funds shall be transferable by the county superintendent of schools to any new district so formed after allocation to the county school equalization fund.

B. Whenever any school district or portion of such district shall elect to divide or separate into one or more districts and such separation or division may result in the allotment of additional monies to the same geographical area under this article, or in any way involves the allotment of more state funds as a result thereof, the state board of education shall review annually upon request said division and may allocate, or refuse to allocate, such excess equalization aid for the ensuing year under this article to said district as said board may deem said division desirable in the public need and interest.

Sec. 2. CONDITIONAL EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ACT

This act and the minimum essentials and equalization educational program provided herein, shall be conditioned and effective only upon amendment of the constitution of the state of Arizona, section 8, article 11, so as to authorize the legislature to prescribe the manner in which state funds for schools are apportioned to the counties of the state."

Senator Greer offered the following explanation of his vote on Senate Bill No. 36:

I am supporting the two Senate School Bills 35 and 36, because I believe they are a start in the right direction. However, I have some misgivings about these bills. I do not like the idea of budget limitations, the poorer districts would not be helped as much as I would like, and not enough of the sales tax money would go for education. However, there is no other measure to aid schools likely to be voted upon in the Senate.

I am therefore supporting the two Senate bills to get the ball rolling. I sincerely hope that the conference between the Senate and House will arrive at some compromise that will give the majority of the sales tax increase to the schools. Also that the conferees will adopt a theory of equalization that will help the poorer districts more than those which have wealth and a small tax rate to sustain a good school program without excessive taxes. I have several of these poorer districts in my county.

To vote "No" might hinder such a possible compromise; thus, I support the program with these reservations in which I place my trust in the Senate leadership to carry out.

Senator Morrow offered the following explanation of his vote on Senate Bill No. 36:

I wish to explain my vote on Senate Bill No. 36 and the attendant bills:

I am voting for Senate Bill No. 36 and the attendant bills not because I am in entire agreement upon them.

There is no equalization as between districts within counties; cities and towns presently have the authority to enact increased sales taxes should necessity warrant; however, it is the best approach presently under discussion.

I am hopeful of desirable amendments when all bills are considered in conference.

I vote Aye.

Senator Smith (Graham) offered the following explanation of his vote on Senate Bill No. 36:

I am opposed to Senate Bill No. 36 for the following reasons:

Senate Bill No. 36 is discriminatory against the best interests of the majority of the people of the State of Arizona.

2. It is a continuation of a system developed many years ago by the Arizona Legislature to give special privilege to a select few of the corporations of the State.

3. It develops further the unfair practice of the Legislature of the State of Arizona to rule by appeasement. In other words, if the people of the State of Arizona want tax equalization, such as would be afforded under Senate Bill No. 76, (the minimum essentials bill) they must stand helplessly by and watch their progressive legislation die in an antiquated ice box committee system. A committee system maintained purposely by the Senate of the State of Arizona to kill much progressive legislation without debate or public hearing, whenever it is in conflict with the wishes of the leadership of the Senate.

The people of Arizona are told by implication, "If you desire to come up to Munich, your appeasement is waiting. We will have peace for our time."

I am firmly convinced that if the people of Arizona want reasonable tax relief or school tax equalization, they have three alternatives:

1. They can change the personnel of the Arizona Legislature on election day at the polls.

2. They can carry their school legislation to the people by initiative petition, or

3. They can leave their school system and their confiscation tax rates in the poor house where they are today.

I vote "No".

Senator Wine offered the following explanation of his vote on Senate Bill No. 36:

I am opposed to continuing the present system of distribution of state funds to school districts. An amendment has been offered which would set up a system of equalization providing greater assistance to needy districts. I supported this amendment and it failed. I refuse to vote for a bill which will merely continue the existing inequities.

I am further opposed to any budget limitation at this time and will vote "No" on such a measure.

President Carpenter announced that, without objection, Rule XXIII, paragraph 3, of the Senate Rules, would be waived, and the above remarks of protest against Senate Bills Nos. 35 and 36 which exceed two hundred words, would be entered in the Journal.

ARTICLE 2.1. FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR COMMON AND HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICTS

15-1221. **Definitions**

In this article, unless the context otherwise requires:

1. 'Assessed valuation' means the net valuation set by county assessors, the state tax commission, or both, on real estate, improvements and personal property in each school district or county as most recently equalized by the county and state agencies authorized to equalize such assessments, and shown on the latest equalized assessment rolls of each county.

2. 'Average daily attendance' means the average daily attendance as prescribed in section 15-1212.

3. 'Basic cost of education' means that sum of money required to provide a minimum standard of education for each child in average daily attendance.

4. 'Common school' means the first to eighth grades inclusive.

5. 'County aid' means the monies set aside from the county general fund by the board of supervisors, which, when added to the amounts appropriated by the legislature as provided in section 15-1211, shall equal one hundred eighty dollars per capita per annum for common and high school education within the county.

6. 'County school equalization funds' means the monies paid by the state treasurer from the state school equalization fund to the county school equalization funds for equalization purposes in the common and high school districts.

7. 'District qualifying tax rate' means the tax rate of one dollar thirty cents per one hundred dollars assessed valuation of property in each common school district and one dollar thirty cents per one hundred dollars assessed valuation in each high school district, which levy must be made by the county board of supervisors for current operational expenses of each such district as a condition the district must meet before becoming eligible for participation in the county school equalization fund monies. In elementary districts that are not in a high school district, the county board of supervisors must levy an additional one dollar thirty cents levy in each such district only if the district wishes to qualify for equalization aid to pay tuition for high school pupils.

8. 'Equalization aid' means the state monies over and above state and county aid distributed to the counties and school districts as provided by sections 15-1223 to 15-1226, inclusive, in order to permit each school district to maintain an educational program pursuant to the provisions of this article.

9. 'High school' means the ninth to twelfth grades inclusive.

10. 'Operational expenses' means the administrative, instructional, operational, maintenance, auxiliary, fixed charges, and contingencies incurred in the operation of a school district, exclusive of all capital outlay items, special levies, and bond service items.

11. 'School district needs' means the amount of financial aid that each school district needs in order to afford each pupil in average daily attendance a basic cost of education for the current school year.

12. 'State aid' means the sum of money designated by the legislature to be allocated through the counties to districts upon the basis of the average daily attendance of the districts pursuant to article 11, sections 8 and 9, constitution of Arizona, and section 15-1211.

13. 'State school equalization fund' means the monies appropriated by the legislature for the purpose of providing equalization aid to the county school equalization funds.

15-1222. State levy for state school equalization fund

In addition to the appropriations provided by Article 11, sections 8 and 9, constitution of Arizona, and section 15-1211, the legislature shall appropriate for common and high schools a sum of money equal to the state's portion of the equalization needs of the several counties for the current school year. The average daily attendance in common and high schools as shown by the records of the superintendent of public instruction shall be used in making the computation.

15-1223. Apportionment of state school equalization fund

A. Funds in the state school equalization fund shall be apportioned to the county school equalization funds of the qualifying counties, and shall be based on the total actual needs for state equalization monies in all of the counties, as provided by the provisions of this article, not later than the second Monday in July, October, January, and April of each year. In no event shall any county receive more than the actual needs for equalization purposes and any balance remaining in the state school equalization fund at the end of the fiscal year shall revert to the state general fund. If the state equalization funds are insufficient to meet the needs of all the counties such funds shall be apportioned to the counties in proportion to the total equalization needs of each county.

B. The superintendent of public instruction shall furnish the treasurer and the school superintendent of each county an abstract of each of the apportionments in Subsection A, and shall certify the apportionment to the state auditor, who shall draw his warrant in favor of the county treasurer of each county for the amount apportioned thereto. Upon receipt of such warrant the county treasurer shall immediately notify the county superintendent that the amount thereof, together with any other monies standing to the credit of the county school equalization fund, is subject to apportionment as prescribed by law.

15-1224. County apportionment of equalization aid to common school districts

A. To the amounts of school district monies specified in subsection B, the county school superintendent shall compute and apportion the money in the county school equalization fund as follows:

1. Each common school district that employed three or more teachers during the previous school year shall be allotted by the county school superintendent equalization aid for operational expenses as required, sufficient to provide a basic cost of education of not less than three hundred dollars, multiplied by the sum of the average daily attendance of the district. The equalization aid shall be allotted subsequent to the computation of the items provided in subsection B.

B. In computing the amounts of county equalization aid that each common and high school district shall receive, only the following revenues shall be credited to the basic cost of education of each district and shall be deducted from the school district's need:

1. State and county aid that the school district will actually receive by operation of sections 15-1211, 15-1235 and 15-1241.

2. Federal monies received during the previous year that were specified for Indian education aid and emergency operational aid that are in proportion to the ratio of the qualifying tax rate to the actual school tax rate levied by each district during the previous school year.

3. The calculated district tax yield from the levy of the district qualifying tax rate on the current year's assessed valuation.

4. The previous year's tuition payments from other districts.

5. The previous year's tuition from the special county school reserve fund.

6. The previous year's tuition from nonresident tuition pupils who are residents of Arizona.

7. The unexpended portion of the previous year's basic cost of education.

15-1225. County apportionment of equalization aid to high school districts.

Each high school district, and each common school district not in a high school district that pays tuition for high school pupils residing in such districts, shall be allotted by the county school superintendent equalization aid for operational expenses as required sufficient to provide a basic cost of education of not less than five hundred dollars, multiplied by the sum of the average daily attendance of the district. The equalization aid shall be allotted subsequent to the computation of the items provided in section 15-1224, subsection B, except that elementary districts not in a high school district must

levy the high school district qualifying tax rate for tuition payment for high school pupils in addition to the elementary district's qualifying tax rate for the operational costs of the elementary district before being eligible for equalization aid, only if the elementary district wishes to qualify for equalization aid to pay for high school pupils.

15-1226. Apportionments of county equalization aid to school districts

A. Funds in the county school equalization fund shall be apportioned to the districts of the county on the basis of need, as determined by the provisions of this article, and shall be apportioned on or before the third Monday in July, October, January, and April. In no event shall any school district receive more equalization aid than it is entitled to receive as provided by the provisions of this article and any overage shall be returned by the school district and credited to the county school equalization fund.

B. The county school superintendent shall provide each school district with a statement of the apportionments made as provided in subsection A, on a form prescribed by the superintendent of public instruction.

15-1227. Limitation of expenditures; requirement of election

A. That part of a proposed budget designated for operational expenses for any fiscal year which is in excess of six per cent of the total operational expenses per pupil per annum receiving state aid for the preceding fiscal year for any common or high school district shall not be adopted by the board of trustees unless approved by a majority of the qualified electors in the district voting in an election called for that purpose, provided that this limitation shall not apply where the total operational expenses per pupil per annum for the preceding fiscal year amounts to less than three hundred dollars for common schools and less than five hundred dollars for high schools.

B. A proposed budget which exceeds the limitations provided in subsection A shall be submitted to the qualified electors for approval or disapproval. The board of trustees shall call the election prior to the first day of July to determine whether or not the proposed budget which exceeds the budget limitations shall be adopted or rejected. If a majority of the votes cast in the district favor the adoption of the budget, the board of trustees shall forthwith adopt such budget. If a majority of the votes cast reject such budget, a new budget within the budget limitations shall be prepared and adopted by the board of trustees.

15-1228. Notice of election; form of ballot

A. An election upon the question of the budget shall be called by posting notices in three public places in the district, signed by the board calling for the election, for not less than twenty days before the election, and by publishing the notice in a newspaper published in the county not less than once a week for three successive weeks. The notice shall set forth:

This is not the first promise we have had that more than law enforcement would be done in our area, but it is the last promise I will accept and allow to go unfulfilled. The state game and fish department is going to have to treat all areas equitably and fairly. They are going to have to adjust the program from Utopian thinking to good down to earth work and economy. I feel confident that the legislature is now fully cognizant of the commission's behavior and its actions and unless their promises are fully carried out I intend to join with others to exercise more control over their operations.

With this statement and the belief that I have the support of my colleagues I vote Aye.

I particularly object to paying for the increased number of patrolmen from funds that might be available for funds for increased highway construction which, in itself, is a safety factor in providing a safe road about which the vehicles may be operated. As I pointed out before, if the increase in accidents were in the cities and counties and not the major highways, why are we expending \$250,000.00 for state highway safety?

I feel that we can accomplish the end more economically by strengthening our laws relating to traffic violations and driving without a license.

Therefore, I vote No.

Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Senate:

Upon your desks you will find a cartoon and a booklet of poems. You possibly wonder just what is the significance of these instruments and what they intend to convey to this body. I will explain that they do have a significance — there is a gimmick involved.

First, I will attempt to tell about the woman who asked me to distribute these papers, Mrs. Edna Landon of Tombstone.

Mrs. Landon and her late husband came to Tombstone in the middle forties from, I think, Illinois, and like Caesar of old who said, "I came, I saw, I conquered", Mrs. Landon can also claim the same. She has taken old Tombstone to her heart

and there is no project for the preservation or advancement of Tombstone that she is not doing her share in, and more.

Mrs. Landon is endowed with health, brains, education and financial independence, but her love for old Tombstone is unbounded and she is devoting time, money, and ability to preserve in old Tombstone, some of the history, legend and flavor of the Old West. She is a remarkable woman and as an adopted daughter of our State, has made a most prominent place and with her unquenchable spirit and determination, Tombstone has a champion of remarkable ability.

Mrs. Landon has fought a good fight — the old historic landmarks are being preserved, and it now appears that the consummation of her dream will be fulfilled.

You will find the little booklet of her poems will tell a good deal of the past history of Tombstone:

“Tombstone, known as the last frontier and the most historic town of the southwest, was founded by Ed Schieffelin in September of 1877, six months after the founding of Fort Huachuca. By 1881 it was the largest city between El Paso and San Francisco, with a population between twelve and fifteen thousand. On January 31, 1881, Pima County was split and the eastern half was named Cochise County, with Tombstone as the county seat.

In the late 80's the mines of Tombstone, which had produced nearly fifty million dollars in ore, were flooded at the 500 foot level, and gradually mining ceased. In 1929, as a result of increased population in Bisbee and Douglas, the county seat was moved to Bisbee, and Tombstone almost became a ghost town.

Before the last war the National Park Board was considering taking it over as a national monument, but the war came on and their plans were dropped. Since then, as a result of Father Aull's opening a clinic there, Tombstone was brought back to life, and that, plus the reactivation of Fort Huachuca, has resulted in a 52% increase in the 1957 census over the 1950 census.

In December, 1949, the Tombstone Restoration Commission was founded to preserve and restore its historic landmarks. In 1955 work began on the restoration of the historic courthouse which today is Arizona's oldest standing territorial courthouse. The estimate for restoring it was \$75,000. Since then between sixty and sixty-five thousand dollars has been put into it. In October, 1957, the Restoration Commission moved their museum to the first floor of this building and during the first year took in admissions of over \$6,000. Approximately \$10,000 is all that is needed now to complete the second floor as most of the materials have been pledged—only cash is needed to pay for the labor. In April, 1958, I recommended to the State Parks Board that they take over the building as a state monument. Subsequently, they have unanimously approved it subject to the 1959-60 budget, and it is included in their recommendation for appropriations.

2. THE TRIBAL COMMISSION CONSISTING ONLY OF INDIAN MEMBERS SHALL BE APPOINTED BY MUTUAL CONSENT OF THE TRIBAL COUNCILS AND THERE SHALL BE NO LIMITATION AS TO THE NUMBER PERMITTED TO SERVE ON THE TRIBAL COMMISSION NOR ON THE LENGTH OF THE TERM.

B. Members of the ADVISORY commission shall receive FIFTEEN dollars for each day of attendance upon meetings AND shall be reimbursed for necessary travel and other expenses incurred in attending meetings, as provided by law for state officers.

C. MEMBERS OF THE TRIBAL COMMISSION SHALL BE REIMBURSED BY THE TRIBAL COUNCILS IN ANY MANNER PROVIDED BY SUCH COUNCILS.

D. The ADVISORY commission shall elect a chairman and a secretary, who shall be appointed members of the commission, and adopt rules and regulations for the conduct of meetings. A record shall be kept of all proceedings and transactions.

E. THE TRIBAL COMMISSION MAY ADOPT ANY FORM OF ORGANIZATION PRESCRIBED BY THE TRIBAL COUNCILS.

F. The ADVISORY commission shall meet at least twice each year at such times and places as it determines, and may hold meetings upon the call of the chairman. A majority of the membership of the commission APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Members of SUCH COMMISSION who fail to attend three consecutive meetings shall be deemed to have resigned from the COMMISSION, but the COMMISSION may for good cause grant leaves of absence to its members.

Sec. 2. Sec. 41-542, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:

41-542. Powers and duties

A. The COMMISSIONS APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR AND THE TRIBAL COUNCILS AS PRESCRIBED IN THIS ARTICLE shall consider and study conditions among Indians residing within the state. The studies shall be made to accumulate, compile and assemble information on any phase of Indian affairs, INCLUDING ANY JURISDICTIONAL PROBLEMS. Any files and related papers which were a part of the commission of Indian affairs and any sums remaining unexpended in the account of the Arizona commission of Indian affairs as provided by chapter 102, section 1, subdivision 32, Laws of 1958, second regular session, shall be transferred to the advisory commission of Indian affairs on the effective date of this act."

INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS

2. THE TRIBAL COMMISSION CONSISTING ONLY OF INDIAN MEMBERS SHALL BE APPOINTED BY MUTUAL CONSENT OF THE TRIBAL COUNCILS AND THERE SHALL BE NO LIMITATION AS TO THE NUMBER PERMITTED TO SERVE ON THE TRIBAL COMMISSION NOR ON THE LENGTH OF THE TERM.

B. Members of the ADVISORY commission shall receive FIFTEEN dollars for each day of attendance upon meetings. AND shall be reimbursed for necessary travel and other expenses incurred in attending meetings, as provided by law for state officers.

C. MEMBERS OF THE TRIBAL COMMISSION SHALL BE REIMBURSED BY THE TRIBAL COUNCILS IN ANY MANNER PROVIDED BY SUCH COUNCILS.

D. The ADVISORY commission shall elect a chairman and a secretary, who shall be appointive members of the commission, and adopt rules and regulations for the conduct of meetings. A record shall be kept of all proceedings and transactions.

E. THE TRIBAL COMMISSION MAY ADOPT ANY FORM OF ORGANIZATION PRESCRIBED BY THE TRIBAL COUNCILS.

F. The ADVISORY commission shall meet at least twice each year at such times and places as it determines, and may hold meetings upon the call of the chairman. A majority of the membership of the commission APPOINTED BY THE GOV-

ERNOR shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Members OF SUCH COMMISSION who fail to attend three consecutive meetings shall be deemed to have resigned from the COMMISSION, but the COMMISSION may for good cause grant leaves of absence to its members.

G. THE ADVISORY COMMISSION AND THE TRIBAL COMMISSION MAY MEET JOINTLY AT SUCH TIMES AND PLACES AS MAY BE DETERMINED BY THE JOINT ACTION OF THE CHAIRMAN OF BOTH COMMISSIONS TO CONSIDER ALL PHASES OF INDIAN AFFAIRS, INCLUDING JURISDICTIONAL PROBLEMS.

Sec. 2. Sec. 41-542, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:

41-542. **Powers and duties**

A. The COMMISSIONS APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR AND THE TRIBAL COUNCILS AS PRESCRIBED IN THIS ARTICLE shall consider and study conditions among Indians residing within the state. The studies shall be made to accumulate, compile and assemble information on any phase of Indian affairs, INCLUDING ANY JURISDICTIONAL PROBLEMS. For such purpose the ADVISORY commission may hold hearings and make investigations, and members of the commission may confer with the officials of the Indian bureau of the federal government AND OTHER STATE AND FEDERAL AGENCIES, in order to secure cooperation between the federal and state governments in the promotion of the welfare of the Indian people.

B. The ADVISORY commission APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR shall make a written annual report, giving an account of its proceedings, transactions, findings and recommendations to the governor and the legislature, and shall from time to time submit such other reports as the governor may request.

Sec. 3. **Transfer of files and related papers and funds**

Any files and related papers which were a part of the commission of Indian affairs and any sums remaining unexpended in the account of the Arizona commission of Indian affairs as provided by chapter 102, section 1, subdivision 32, Laws of 1958, second regular session, shall be transferred to the advisory commission of Indian affairs on the effective date of this act."

D. The condition of the surety bond, or the deposit of securities or a safekeeping receipt in lieu thereof, shall be that the bank will promptly pay to the parties entitled thereto public monies in its custody, upon lawful demand therefor, and will, when required by law, pay such monies to the treasurer making the deposit."

For the reasons I have heretofore expressed, and because I believe this is a bill designed to punish the Arizona school board association for being willing to stand up and be counted on those things in which they believe, even though their action may displease some Senators who are of a different frame of mind, I vote No on this bill.

I trust this body will not pass a bill, the purpose of which is so apparent to so many people.

Senator Palmer offered the following explanation of his vote on Senate Bill No. 272:

Mr. President, I oppose this bill as I did last year. School board members, who comprise the Arizona school board association, are some of the finest people and civic leaders in our great state who take a great deal of their valuable time for purposes of education and operating our schools. Many of them do so at a great personal loss. This bill would take the financing away from their association and in the event they wish to continue their operation, they would have to advance from their own pockets additional expenses to maintain this association.

I feel this bill is motivated for the reason that these good people have recommended legislation to the Senate, which is the very purpose for which the association was created by statute. Yet, we tolerate without equivocation the lobbying tactics of the utilities, railroads and mines, and apparently heed the recommendations of these special interests to the greatest extent possible. Forty-nine states and Hawaii have associations such as this.

In passing, I would like to point out that statements have been made as to some \$25,000.00 expended yearly by this organization. Last year they received dues of \$12,784.60 and their expenditures from this amount plus monies on hand was \$13,536.67. I do not feel this is a fantastic expenditure for the good work this organization has done including working with the Legislative Council and work toward recodification of the educational laws with Dr. Claude Brown of the university, and many other good works under their responsibility as set out in the Code.

I feel this bill is a slap in the face to the finest citizens and taxpayers who volunteer freely of their time to advance the interests of our children and education in the state of Arizona, particularly as this Legislature to date has left unanswered the great problems pertaining to education.

Therefore, I vote "No".

Senator Palmer requested permission that his explanation be in-

Your free conference committee in the matter of disagreement on House amendments to Senate Bill No. 36, recommends as follows:

A majority of your committee recommends that the House recede from its amendments to Senate Bill No. 36, and that the bill be amended as follows:

Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert in lieu thereof:

“Section 1. Sec. 15-1211, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:

15-1211. **State levy for common and high school education; minimum requirements; continuing appropriation; disbursements**

A. The legislature shall appropriate for common school and high school education one hundred seventy dollars per capita per annum, computed according to average daily attendance in common and high schools as shown by the records of the superintendent of public instruction. The amount so computed and appropriated shall constitute the aggregate sum to be raised by state taxation for the support of common and high school education. The legislature may designate the source of the revenue and prescribe the method of apportionment.

B. If the legislature fails to make the appropriation prescribed by subsection A the state board of equalization, when determining the annual tax levy for state purposes, shall include an amount sufficient to meet the minimum requirements of subsection A, and subsection A shall be deemed to constitute a continuing annual appropriation of the amount as determined by the minimum requirements therein prescribed.

C. All monies appropriated pursuant to subsections A and B, and in addition thereto all income derived from the permanent fund for the benefit of common and high school education, and receipts for such purpose from any other source, shall be placed in the state school fund to the credit of the state board of education and disbursed as provided by law.

D. Not more than twenty-five per cent of state monies apportioned to common and high schools shall be used for other than administrative and instructional costs, as defined by the state board of education.

Sec. 2. Sec. 15-1212, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:

15-1212. Apportionment of funds

A. After making the necessary allowance for payment from the state school fund of amounts authorized for the state board in the general appropriation bill, the board shall allocate the balance remaining in the state school fund for common school and high school education, in the proportion respectively that average daily attendance in common schools and high schools multiplied by one hundred seventy bears to the sum of the product so obtained. The amounts so allocated shall be apportioned to the several counties on the basis of average daily attendance in the common and high schools in each county. No allowance shall be made for attendance at schools conducted at night, for attendance of non-resident alien children, nor for wards of the United States for which tuition is paid, but attendance of a student in a school of a county adjoining the county of his residence, whether within or without the state, under a certificate of educational convenience as provided by section 15-304, shall be deemed to be attendance in the school of the county or district of his residence.

B. Apportionments of the state school fund shall be made on the second Monday in July, October, January and April and, as nearly as possible, shall equal one-fourth of the amount to be apportioned during the fiscal year. The superintendent of public instruction shall furnish the treasurer and the school superintendent of each county an abstract of the apportionment, and shall certify the apportionment to the state auditor, who shall draw his warrant in favor of the county treasurer of each county for the amount apportioned thereto. Upon receipt of the warrant the county treasurer shall notify the county superintendent that the amount thereof together with any other monies standing to the credit of the county school fund, is subject to apportionment as prescribed by law.

C. As used in this section:

1. 'Common school' means the first to eighth grades inclusive.

2. 'High school' means the ninth to twelfth grades inclusive.

3. 'Daily attendance' means:

(a) For common schools, days in which a pupil:

(i) Of the first, second or third grades attends a minimum of two hundred forty minutes.

(ii) Of the fourth, fifth or sixth grades attends a minimum of three hundred minutes.

(iii) Of the seventh or eighth grades attends a minimum of three hundred sixty minutes, including in each case recreational periods, and in which a pupil regardless of grade is actually present during one or both of the two sessions into

which the school day is divided, but attendance at one session only shall be counted as one-half day's attendance.

(b) For high schools, days in which a pupil is enrolled in and carrying four subjects or the equivalent thereof that count toward graduation as defined by the state board of education, in a recognized high school, but attendance of a pupil carrying less than the load prescribed shall be prorated.

4. 'Average daily attendance' means the sum of the average daily attendance for the previous school year plus the increased average daily attendance of such year over the average daily attendance of the year prior to the previous school year, provided, that if the average daily attendance for the year preceding the previous year equals or is greater than the previous year, the average daily attendance for the previous year shall be used.

D. The provisions of subsection C, paragraph 4, shall apply to title 15, chapter 12, articles 1 to 3, inclusive, and any reference to 'average daily attendance for the preceding year,' or 'for the previous year,' shall be determined as provided in paragraph 4.

E. Any determination of average daily attendance shall be based on the records of the superintendent of public instruction.

ARTICLE 2.1. FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR COMMON AND HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICTS

15-1222. County levy for county school equalization fund.

In addition to the appropriations provided by article 11, sections 8 and 9, Constitution of Arizona, and sections 15-1211 and 15-1235, the board of supervisors of each county at the beginning of each fiscal year shall provide and set aside from the county general fund an amount not to exceed twenty dollars per capita per annum computed according to average daily attendance in common and high schools in the county, for the purpose of providing the funds required under sections 15-1223 and 15-1224. The amount set aside pursuant to this section shall constitute the county school equalization fund. Any balance remaining in this fund at the close of the fiscal year shall revert to the county general fund.

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The President announced that at this time consideration would be given to the conference committee report on Senate Bill No. 36, appropriation and allocation for common and high school education, which report was read in full on March 18, 1959, at which time action on the report was deferred until today. The report subsequently was reread in full as follows:

The amount set aside pursuant to this section shall constitute the county school equalization fund. Any balance remaining in this fund at the close of the fiscal year shall revert to the county general fund.

15-1223. Computation of equalization aid to common school districts.

A. To the amounts of school district monies specified in subsection B, the county school superintendent shall compute and apportion the money in the county school equalization fund as follows:

Each common school district that employed three or more teachers during the previous school year shall be allotted by the county school superintendent equalization aid for operational expenses if required, sufficient to provide a basic cost of education of two hundred seventy-five dollars, multiplied by the average daily attendance of the district. The equalization aid shall be allotted subsequent to the computation of the items provided in subsection B.

B. In computing the amounts of county equalization aid that each common and high school district shall receive the following revenues shall be credited to the basic cost of education of each district:

1. State and county aid computed at one hundred eighty dollars times the average daily attendance.
2. Federal monies received during the previous year that were specified for Indian education aid and emergency operational aid that are in proportion to the ratio of the qualifying tax rate to the actual school tax rate, excluding debt service, of the district during the previous school year.
3. The calculated district tax yield from the levy of the district qualifying tax rate on the previous year's assessed valuation.

15-1224. Computation of equalization aid to high school districts.

Each high school district, and each common school district not in a high school district that pays tuition for high school pupils residing in such districts, shall be allotted by the county school superintendent equalization aid for operational expenses as required sufficient to provide a basic cost of education of not less than four hundred twenty-five dollars, multiplied by the average daily attendance of the district. The equalization aid shall be allotted subsequent to the computation of the items provided in section 15-1223, subsection B, except that elementary districts not in a high school district must levy the high school district qualifying tax rate for tuition payment for high school pupils in order to qualify for equalization aid to pay for high school pupils.

15-1225. Apportionment of county equalization aid to school districts.

A. Funds in the county school equalization fund shall be apportioned to the districts of the county on the basis of need, as determined by the provisions of this article, and shall be apportioned on or before the second Monday in July, October, January and April. In no event shall any school district receive more equalization aid than it is entitled to receive as provided by this article and any overage shall be returned by the school district and credited to the county school equalization fund. If the county school equalization funds are insufficient to meet the needs of all the districts, such funds shall be apportioned to the districts in proportion to the equalization needs of each district.

B. The county school superintendent shall provide each school district with a statement of the apportionments made as provided in subsection A, on a form prescribed by the superintendent of public instruction.

Sec. 4. Section 15-1201, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:

15-1201. School district budget; form

Not later than July 3 each year the governing board of each common or high school district shall prepare and furnish to the county school superintendent and the state superintendent of public instruction a proposed budget for the current fiscal year which shall contain the information and be in form as follows:

For this reason and the other meritorious provisions of the bill, I vote Aye.

Senator Palmer offered the following explanation of his vote on House Bill No. 159:

Mr. President:

I object to the passing of this bill for the following reasons:

1. Counties, municipalities and the state can now hope to make the railroads pay the costs of signaling devices in its entirety. With the passage of this bill, they can only hope to make the railroads pay one-half such costs. Thus, we are strapping the state, cities and counties.

2. We are taking from state highway funds monies that might be used for matching federal funds for the construction of highways, and funds from the state in ratio of ninety-four federal dollars to six state dollars, which amounts to a tremendous handicap to our matching program, particularly when these signaling devices may cost \$8,000.00 — \$10,000.00 or \$20,000.00 or more to install.

3. This comes at a time when our highway program is expanding, and cities and towns are expanding, making it necessary for more crossings and incidentally more signaling devices.

4. This bill does not tend to save any human lives, as has been argued by some, for the reason that it makes for further litigation in determining what are hazardous crossings, and this may always be a legal problem by which the railroads can delay and cause further loss of lives.

5. The railroads have always considered the 10% budget limitation a "sacred cow", which should be preserved at all costs, yet we find in this bill that monies to be paid to railroads by cities or counties are exempt from this very limitation; so we see that budget limitation is only for the public in general and not the railroads.

6. This bill is, in my opinion, a violation of the Constitution, and provides for giving public funds to private corporations without justification.

7. The railroads have been highly subsidized by the government and were given millions of dollars worth of public lands to construct their railroads in the hope of causing the west to expand and cities to grow, and now we find the railroads want more money from the taxpayers in addition to the consideration originally given them.

8. These signals may protect the public, but they also protect the railroad from damage actions and the taxpayers are paying the railroads to protect themselves in addition to any incidental safety feature.

9. The railroads pay little, if any, sales taxes and at a time when we are attempting to conserve the taxpayers'

funds for highways, schools and other badly needed public purposes, we are going to take funds of the taxpayers and give them to private corporations.

10. This bill does not contain provisions to protect cities and counties from lawsuits resulting from death or injury at railroad crossings.

11. The bill does not protect the cities and counties from the cost of future maintenance or replacement of signaling devices, and these features should be carefully outlined in this bill; and by failing to do so, we are throwing the door open to more delay by litigation and loss of life.

12. The bill does not call for the letting of contract by bid so as to insure economy in the cost of installation, which will further add to the costs to be incurred by the taxpayer.

In summary, this is nothing but a relief bill for railroads at a time when they are making more money to the extent of millions of dollars more than they did last year, and it is another manifestation of the subjectivity of this legislature to the pressures of wealthy private interest groups, which is particularly obnoxious when we need more legislation for the benefit of the public in general.

Therefore, I vote "No".

In accordance with the recess taken by the two Houses, the Senate and the House of Representatives assembled in joint session at 2:30 p.m. in the House chamber, the President of the Senate in the chair.

The President called the joint session of the Legislature to order.

Roll call of the Senate and the House of Representatives showed that each House had a quorum present.

His Excellency, the Governor of Arizona, Paul J. Fannin, appeared in the House chamber escorted by Senators Corbett, Blansett, and Udine, and members Haugh, Barkley, and Klauer, and was introduced by the President.

The Governor addressed the joint session as follows:

Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, and Members of the Twenty-fourth Legislature:

As were the men and women who served in Arizona Legislatures during the past decade or more, the members of this Legislature, when it convened last January, were hopeful that sincere differences of approach might be reconciled and that to this session might fall the honor of being the first to turn the scale against a progressively heavier and more unfair property tax weight upon school district home-owning taxpayers.

This session, in its last days as the school program impasse became evident, was faced with two choices.

It could repeat past history, confess defeat, and do nothing. In which case, school property taxes would continue to increase in proportion to the increasing costs of the schools.

Or this session could, in the overall interest, forget certain differences of opinion and through compromise do something to stem the tide of increased school district taxation and at the same time, provide funds to meet increasing education costs.

Those were the alternatives: Something — or — Nothing.

To its everlasting credit, the Legislature refused defeat and chose to act.

The school tax compromise will, I am assured, open an avenue down which, for the first time, long-sought goals in school finance may begin to be achieved.

Many aspects of this school legislation are not what a great number of us desire, but it is a step toward a solution.

True, a substantial sum will be available from the state level for the purpose of meeting growing school costs and of holding the line in each of the state's school districts.

The long-sought dual objectives of state aid on a current basis and a formula for school district expenditure limitation have been achieved.

It is equally true that substantial revenue will be created to meet the pressing needs of the state's universities and colleges, which cost would otherwise fall upon the property taxpayers at all levels.

On the other hand, the compromise allowance for special and additional aid to particularly distressed school districts is deplorably small, and the county area chosen debatable.

We have yet to know precisely how the compromise will work in action. Future legislatures can strengthen where weakness and inequity develop.

Indeed, you should not forget, nor shall I, that **you** are the Legislature until January, 1961. Yours could be the job of strengthening this formula.

Nonetheless, a new and fresh pattern of public school finance and revenue has been set. There is, I believe, every reason for satisfaction and pride on your part in the realization that it is this Legislature, the Twenty-fourth, that has had the fortitude to enact what we all hope will be a lasting foundation upon which equity in school taxation may be erected.

Indeed, your satisfaction should be greater because of the unselfish and determined efforts you made in reaching a final area of common agreement despite honest barriers which I know, at times, seemed unsurmountable.

It is these barriers that bring us to the realization that enactment of the school revenue compromise and adjournment of this session in no way holds in abeyance related and equally pressing problems of our system of public education.

On the contrary — in the light of what has transpired in this session — if we are to have the fullest school tax protection to homeowners, we must, in the months ahead, strive to agree upon methods of securing statewide standardization in property tax assessment. We must be able to rely upon uniform standards for computing the assessed property values in each of the state's school districts, if we are ultimately to apply to distressed districts an equitable formula for supplemental aid.

We must revise our constitutional law relating to the state Board of Education so as to provide representation for the taxpaying public. The public is spending millions for schools. Our people should get the fullest possible value for that vast tax outlay. Only by backing our teachers so that they may demand the very best that is in our children, through the basic intellectual disciplines will we get that value.

Therefore, any new state board of education should move into the area of minimum basic educational requirements.

I mention these needs because it is their undeniable existence

which were among the principal barriers to wider school tax legislation at this session. The worth of what you have accomplished cannot be fully realized until they are met.

This session's compromise cannot be finally perfected until equity in assessment standards is secured and our school system cannot operate in fullest economy until we know the answer to the question: "Just what in the way of basic education is our tax dollar primarily supposed to purchase?"

In these fields all of us should solicit advice and instruction from the people of Arizona before the next regular session of the Legislature.

Speaking for myself, as Governor, study in these connections shall be the immediate order of the day.

Placing a new tax of any kind upon our people is a tremendous responsibility.

We must be vigilant so that we shall not fall into the trap of taxing more—just to spend more. To this end we must begin study with the thought of demanding hard and realistic economies wherever proper in the light of the needs of State Government, as well as of our entire educational system.

Most authorities agree that the State Tax Commission will, next August, be required to set one of the highest, if not the highest, state tax rate in Arizona's history.

You are to be commended for the positive legislative steps you have taken to reduce the hideous slaughter of human lives on our highways and streets.

Although you did not provide the hope for additional highway patrolment, or for the traffic safety coordination committee, several of you have told me of your extensive plans to continue the study of possible additional traffic safety legislation to strengthen our highway safety program.

Also, the state-wide citizens traffic safety committee started early this year, will be actively working to aid activities of our law enforcement agencies.

I would like to express to you my admiration for the great amount of work done by you in all the other fields of legislation. You as individual members, your committees and your employees, have diligently worked long hours preparing and studying the legislation before you.

And, now in closing, may I thank you for the many courtesies this Legislature has shown the Governor's Office, and may I wish each of you Godspeed, and good luck.

A rising vote of thanks was accorded the Governor.
