

**PREAMBLE**

We, the students of the Arizona State Teachers College at Flagstaff, in order to assume the privileges and responsibilities of self-government, promote scholarship, develop the spirit of democracy, and promote loyalty to the ideals of the College, do hereby adopt and establish this Constitution.

**ARTICLE I**

**Name and Colors**

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Associated Students Organization of the Arizona State Teachers College at Flagstaff.

Section 2. The colors of the organization shall be royal blue and gold.

**ARTICLE II**

**Membership**

Section 1. Regular Members—Members in full standing shall be regular students or special students carrying at least twelve units of college work and paying all Associated Student Organization dues and assessments.

Section 2. Associate Members—other members shall be regular or special students carrying less than twelve units of college work and paying all Associated Student Organization dues and assessments. They shall have the right to vote in all matters brought before the Associated Students, but shall not be eligible to any office, managership, or membership in a standing committee of the Associated Students.

### ARTICLE III

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be a President, Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Yell Leader, a Social Manager, the members of the Student Council, and the Editors-in-Chief of the Associated Student publications.

Section 2. All officers shall hold office for one college year or until their successors are duly elected and installed.

Section 3. (a) The President, the Treasurer, and the Vice-President shall be required to have at the time of their election at least seventy-five quarter hours of college credit.

(b) Other officers of this organization, with the exception of the freshman representatives to the Student Council, shall be required to have at the time of their election at least thirty-two quarter hours of college credit.

(c) A vacancy occurring in the office of Vice-President, or of Secretary, or Treasurer, or Yell Leader, or of Editors-in-chief of Associated Student publications shall be filled by an appointment of the Student Council.

Section 4. The Student Council shall consist of the President of the Associated

Student Organization and two members from each college class.

Section 5. All officers shall take on Inauguration Day the following oath of office:

"I do solemnly affirm that I will faithfully execute the office of \_\_\_\_\_ of the Associated Student Organization and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect, and defend its constitution."

#### ARTICLE IV

##### Election

Section 1. Officers, with the exception of the class representatives to the Student Council, shall be nominated during the second week of April. The Student Body Officers—President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Social Manager, Yell Leader, and Editors-in-Chief of the Associated Student Publications—shall be nominated by a nomination petition containing the names of not less than ten per cent of the eligible voters of the Associated Students. A student shall accept nomination for only one office. In the event a member receives the nomination for two or more offices, the nominee shall have the right to select the office for which he will be a candidate. All petitions must be filed with the Student Council not later than Monday of the second week in April.

Section 2. A primary election shall be held during the third week in April. Any candidate receiving a majority of the total votes cast in the primary election shall be declared elected. In the event that a candidate has not received a majority of the total votes cast in the primary election, then the two candidates receiving the highest number of total votes cast shall be the nominees in the general

election. The general election shall be held during the fourth week in April. There shall be an interval of at least five days between the primary and the general election.

Section 3. Nominations for editor of the Pine shall be completed during the second week in March. Preliminary election shall be held during the third week, final election shall be held during the fourth week. The newly elected editor and the newly-appointed business manager of the Pine shall assume the duties of the Pine the first of May.

Section 4. Each class shall annually elect representatives to the Student Council.

Section 5. Freshman representatives to the Student Council shall be nominated and elected the second week of the fall quarter.

Section 6. All elections shall be conducted under the Australian ballot system.

Section 7. All officers shall be installed on Inauguration Day, which shall be some day between the general election and the end of the spring quarter, the date to be set by the Student Council.

Section 8. The Student Council shall conduct all student body elections and act as judge of their validity.

## ARTICLE V

### Duties of Officers

Section 1. President—It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Association, to call special meetings of the Association, to act as chairman of the Student Council, to appoint all committees subject to the approval of the Student Council, except as hereinafter otherwise provided.

Section 2. Vice-President—It shall be

the duty of the Vice-President to perform all the duties of the President when because of his absence from College, illness, or other cause, the President is unable to perform the duties of his office. He shall be chairman of the freshman class until its officers are elected. In case of a vacancy in the office of the President, the Vice-President shall become President.

Section 3. Secretary—It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the minutes of all meetings of the Associated Student Organization, to be clerk of the Student Council, to attend to all correspondence, and to file all records with the registrar at the end of the college year.

Section 4. Treasurer—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep an account of the funds and expenditures of the Associated Students.

Section 5. Other Officers—The Yell Leader, the Social Manager, and other officers shall perform such duties as usually pertain to such offices.

## ARTICLE VI

### Meetings

Section 1. Regular Meetings—Regular meetings of the Associated Students shall be held once each month during the regular school year.

Section 2. Special Meetings—Special meetings of the Associated Students may be called by the President at his discretion, upon the written request of the majority of the Student Council, or upon the written request of fifty members of the organization, provided the object is stated.

## ARTICLE VII

### Student Council

Section 1. Except as herein otherwise provided, all legislative power of the

Associated Student Organization shall be vested in the Student Council. The President shall vote only in case of a tie vote.

Section 2. Any member having two consecutive unexcused absences from the Student Council meetings shall be subject to expulsion from the Student Council. Excuses must be written and filed with the Secretary previous to the time of the meeting. The President shall pass upon excuses, but no member may be expelled without a majority vote of the Student Council. In case of a vacancy, the President of the Associated Students shall notify the group represented and said group shall fill the vacancy within seven days.

Section 3. A representative may be recalled by his class upon the initiative petition of fifteen per cent of the class and the final vote of the majority of the class.

Section 4. Regular meetings of the Student Council shall be held twice each calendar month. Special meetings may be held upon a two-day notice posted by the President.

Section 5. The Student Council shall make its own rules of procedure.

Section 6. There shall be no proxy voting in the Student Council. Six members shall constitute a quorum.

Section 7. The Student Council shall represent the Associated Student Organization in all matters delegated to it by the President of the College.

Section 8. Business Managers of the student publications shall be appointed by the Student Council.

Section 9. Any act of the Student Council may be modified or rejected by the Associated Student Organization. The procedure shall be as follows: A meeting may

be called upon petition of at least fifty members of the Student Organization for the express purpose of modifying or rejecting an act of the Student Council. Seven days thereafter a special election shall be held to vote upon the suggested modification or rejection, the same becoming valid if supported by the majority of the total votes cast.

Section 10. The Student Council shall require a written report from the Treasurer, the Social Manager, the Athletic Manager, the Editors-in-Chief and the Business Managers of the college publications, and any other Student Body office as the Council shall see fit at the first regular meeting of each quarter.

Section 11. Any officer of the Associated Students shall be subject to removal from office by a two-thirds majority vote of the Student Council.

Section 12. The Graduate Student organization shall be entitled to one representative on the Student Council and shall officially represent without vote until the Graduate Student organization shall reach a membership of 25, at which time they shall be granted one voting representative; when their enrollment reaches 30, they shall be granted two voting representatives which shall be the maximum representation allowed.

## ARTICLE VIII

### Supreme Council

Section 1. The Supreme Council shall consist of the President of the College, the Dean of the College, the Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, two faculty members to be elected by the Student Council, the President of the Associated Students, and the Presidents of each college class. The

Secretary of the President of the College shall act as Secretary for the Supreme Council.

Section 2. The Supreme Council shall pass on amendments to the Constitution and amendments to the Faculty Authorization. It shall act as an advisory board and as a board of appeals.

## ARTICLE IX

### Committees

Section 1. Traditions Committee—The Traditions Committee shall be composed of the members of the junior and senior classes selected annually by the Student Council in office the year preceding the term of the Traditions Committee. The President of the Junior Class shall be chairman of this Committee. It shall be the duty of this committee to see that all traditions are carried out. The committee shall consist of eight members, four men and four women. The President of the Junior Class shall count as one of the men or women.

Section 2. Publications Board—There shall be a Publications Board consisting of the editors and business managers of the Pine and La Cuesta, and two students and one faculty member appointed by the Student Council. The Publications Board shall have the power to nominate not more than two candidates for each editor's office, but the Student Body may add to the list of candidates through petition if it so desires. The Publications Board shall also recommend to the Student Council during the month of May qualified students for appointment to the editorship of the "Handbook." The Board shall be responsible for publications' policies.

Section 3. Social Calendar Committee—

There shall be a Social Calendar Committee composed of the presidents of all recognized campus organizations. This committee shall be called together during the first week of each quarter by the Student Body Social Manager to schedule the social events for the quarter.

Section 4. Student Union Committee—There shall be a Student Union Committee composed of three students whose duty it shall be to direct a program for the construction of a Student Union building, and who shall automatically become the student directors of the Student Union upon completion.

## ARTICLE X

### Recall

Section 1. Any officer of the Associated Students, with the exception of members of the Student Council, may be recalled and removed from office, for mismanagement of or misuse of office, by means of a recall petition which shall be signed by fifteen per cent of the enrolled members and then presented to the Student Council for approval. If approved, it shall be presented to the Associated Student Body and becomes effective by a majority of the votes cast.

## ARTICLE XI

### Campus Organizations

Section 1. The Student Council shall have the power to recognize, or to deny recognition, to campus organizations on the following basis:

1. Each organization must hold a pre-scheduled meeting at least once a month. No organization shall be recognized more than once a week on the social calendar.

2. The president of each organization shall submit a registration slip to the Student Council before the last day of September each year. Said registration slip shall contain the following data:

a. The names of all officers and the names and classification of all members.

b. The time and place of regular meetings.

c. The purpose and aims of the organization.

d. The qualifications for membership.

3. The presidents shall make any changes on this registration slip during the first week of each new quarter.

4. Each organization shall sponsor at least one contribution or function open to the entire student body, each year. This may be in the form of entertainment or an educational or social function.

5. Any two organizations may combine in sponsoring a contribution for the year.

Section 2. Organizations failing to comply with the above requirements shall be disqualified by the Student Council. Disqualification shall consist of "No recognition of said organization in any school publication, on the social calendar, or in the use of school orchestras, auditorium, bus, trucks, or other school facilities."

Section 3. This Amendment shall not pertain to organizations receiving college credit; or to organizations affiliated with a national fraternity by paying dues, holding a charter, or being listed on the roster of their national headquarters.

**ARTICLE XII****Amendments and Miscellaneous**

Section 1. Any Article or Section of this constitution may be amended by a majority of the votes cast at the election called to consider the amendments, provided that the proposed amendment shall have been presented at a meeting at least ten days prior to the time at which it is to be voted upon, accompanied by the recommendation of the Student Council, or a petition signed by at least twenty per cent of the Associated Student Organization. The amendment shall be posted publicly at least ten days before election.

Section 2. Anything in the conduct of meetings not covered by the rules of the Associated Student Organization shall be subject to Roberts' Rules of Order.

Section 3. Upon adoption of the Constitution all provisions shall go into effect immediately, with the exception of the part of Article IV, Section 1, concerning the election of the Editors-in-Chief of Associated Student publications. This provision shall go into effect the college year of 1935-36.

## **PART THREE**

### **Regulations and Freshman Code**

#### **GENERAL REGULATIONS**

1. A student who occupies a room in one of the halls on the campus is responsible for any of the breakage or damage to his room.

2. Any general breakage or damage in hallways, reception rooms, etc., will be charged to all the students living in the building concerned unless the one responsible for the damage is made known.

3. Smoking is not permitted in classroom buildings, gymnasium, or library.

4. Possession or use of intoxicating beverages on the campus of the college shall be deemed cause for immediate dismissal from college.

5. Dormitory regulations are posted in each room in each dormitory.

#### **DINING HALL REGULATIONS**

1. **MEAL HOURS.** A. Week Days—Breakfast 7:00 a. m., lunch 12:15 p. m., dinner 6:00 p. m. B. Sundays—Breakfast 8:00 a. m., lunch 1:00 p. m., dinner 5:30 p. m.

2. **THE DINING HALL BUZZER.** The buzzer will ring five minutes before each meal.

3. **THE DINING HALL CHIMES.** After all students have entered the dining hall, the chimes will be sounded twice. The first is a signal for prayer and the second is a signal to be seated. The third

time the chimes are sounded, students may leave the hall if they wish. Chimes sounded during a meal are a signal for an announcement.

4. **WEARING APPAREL.** Men students will wear ties to each meal. Women are not permitted to wear slacks to the dining hall except by permission. Men students will wear coats or sweaters to the Sunday noon meal.

5. **TABLE CONDUCT.** Freshmen are not to sit at the head or the foot of a table. Orders to the waiter are to be given through the head of the table only. Food is not to be passed from one table to another.

6. **PLACES.** Soon after the beginning of each quarter, each student will draw a table number. If that table is set up, he is expected to sit there.

### LIBRARY

The College is fortunate in having a beautiful and modern library, the principal asset of an institution of learning. The student should respect its use by caring for the building and its equipment; especial care should be given to the books and magazines.

1. The first and most important rule of any library is absolute **SILENCE**. Worthwhile studying can be accomplished only through the least possible amount of distraction. Respect the efforts of other people to study.

2. **Library Hours:** Monday through Thursday, 7:50 a. m. until noon, 1:00 p. m. until 5:30 p. m., 7:00 p. m. until 9:30 p. m. Friday, Not open after 5:30 p. m. Saturday, 9:00 a. m. until noon, 1:00 p. m. until 5:00 p. m.

3. Books from the stack rooms are is-

sued for two weeks and renewable for two additional weeks. Reserve books, all magazines (bound and unbound), and newspapers are issued for two hours only but can be renewed from hour to hour unless in demand. (Books from stack room include pamphlets and pictures).

4. Overdue fines are two cents per day for two week material; for reserve material, 25 cents for the first hour and 10 cents each succeeding hour.

5. Books in reference room may be used at any time in the library but are never to be taken from the library. Bound magazines are to remain in the library.

6. Current periodicals and newspapers may be taken out if properly charged at the desk.

7. The Arizona collection is growing rapidly. Since these books are so valuable most of them are treated as reserve books, and are subject to the same fines. Others may be checked out for seven days. Inquire at the desk for further information.

8. Permission to browse in the stacks may be obtained at the desk.

9. Reserve books may be checked out overnight after 8:30 p. m. Such books are to be returned by 8:00 a. m. the following morning.

10. The library maintains a rental shelf, where students may check out the newest books at the rate of three cents per day.

#### **STUDENT HEALTH RULES**

1. **Office Hours.** The following hours will hold until further notice.

Office hours week days: 7:45 to 8:45 a. m.; 4:30 to 5:30 p. m.

Sundays and legal holidays: 9:15 to 9:45 a. m.

#### **Infirmiry Building Office**

In event of serious illness or of accident

at times other than office hours Miss Sweeney, Student Health Director, may be reached by telephoning 148, the Student Health Office.

**2. Excuses Due to Illness.** Excuses for illness may be secured only through W. H. Harless, Student Counsellor, or Miss Minnie Lintz, Dean of Women, and then only when the student has reported to the Student Health Director at the time of the illness.

Such excuses will be granted only after two successive days of absence from class due to illness.

All off campus students should notify the Student Health Director during the first day of illness.

**4. Medical Examinations.** All students must take medical examinations when scheduled.

**5. Health Service.** The Health Service makes provision for minor injuries and minor illnesses. Students who are ill or who are injured should report to the Health Director the first day of such illness or as soon after injury as is possible.

A student may be allowed six consecutive calls from a physician without cost to the student, if and only when ordered by the Student Health Director.

The student will be required to pay the actual cost of medicines, X-rays, surgery, special nurse, hospitalization off the campus, physician's calls in excess of six authorized consecutive calls, and all dental work. The Student Health Department will not care for chronic illnesses.

**6. Infirmary.** The Student Health Director shall be the judge in determining when students are to be confined to the infirmary.

Hospitalization, authorized by the Stu-

dent Health Director, will be provided on the campus for a period of seven days. Hospitalization for more than seven consecutive days will be charged for at the rate of \$1.50 per day.

Visiting hours shall be from 4:00 to 5:00 p. m. only. No visiting will be permitted when contagious diseases are confined to the infirmary.

## Campus and Residence Hall Regulations

### MEN

The dormitory is your home and you are expected to respect it as such.

Men residents are responsible for the care of the room, for the furniture, and for the supplies assigned to them. Damaged or destroyed property will be charged against the occupants of the room.

Lounge, telephone room, laundry, and certain other parts of the dormitory are considered to be community property. If it is not possible to fix personal responsibility in case of damage, a charge will be pro-rated to all the residents of the dormitory.

Telephone service in the hall is a privilege which requires men residents to assume the responsibility of answering it promptly when it rings.

Men must obtain the permission of the head resident before making any changes in the arrangement of furniture, fixtures or lights.

Pictures, pennants, etc., may not be fastened to the wall, but must be suspended from the moulding.

cutting table and a mirror. Students are expected to furnish their own needles and bobbins, which may be purchased at the desk in the North Lounge. This room may not be used on Sunday.

**Radios.** Radios should be turned as low as possible at all times in order that other students may not be disturbed.

**Electric Appliances.** The use of electric appliances other than radios, hair dryers, or curling irons in the rooms is prohibited.

**Library.** A dormitory library, for the use of all women students, is located off the lounge in Morton Hall. Magazines and books for recreational reading may be read or checked out during library hours.

**Laundries.** The laundries are open on all days except Sunday. All laundry should be clearly marked with indelible ink. All pressing and ironing should be done in the laundries where ample provisions are made for the convenience of all residents. Note regulation above as to electrical appliances in room.

**Telephone.** All local phone calls shall be limited to five minutes. All long distance calls must be placed over the "pay-station" on the first floor of Campbell Hall, unless the call is reversed for fees. Only long distance calls and local calls of importance may be received during study hours.

**Hours.** Study hours shall be observed from 7:30 p. m. to 10:30 p. m. from Monday to Thursday, inclusive.

Late hours, even for serious study, should not become habitual. Students who find it necessary to study later than 10:30 p. m. should do so very quietly in order that neighbors may not be disturbed.

**Calls and Social Engagements.** Callers may be received in the North Lounge from

10:00 a. m. until 15 minutes before the noon meal; after the noon meal until 15 minutes before the evening meal.

Senior and Junior women may receive callers in the lounge until 10:30 p. m., providing they have a grade average of "3" or better for the previous quarter. Those who fail to make an average of "3" may use the lounge only until 9:30 p. m.

The lounge may be used by Sophomore and Freshman women with a grade average of "3" or better, for the previous quarter, until 9:30 p. m. Those failing to make an average of "3" may use the lounge only until 7:30 p. m.

The 7:30 p. m. regulation shall apply to **all first quarter freshmen.**

The above calling hours are effective from Monday to Thursday, inclusive.

Sophomores and Freshmen are required to be in the dormitory by 9:30 p. m. and are required to sign out and in. Freshmen may give up a week-end night if they desire to take a 10:30 p. m. night during the week. Sophomores are permitted to take one 10:30 p. m. night during the week but it may not be used for calling purposes. (It may be used for a picture show or other off-campus engagement).

**Closing Hours.** Closing time is defined as 10:30 p. m. from Monday to Thursday, inclusive; 11:30 p. m. on Friday and Saturday; 11:00 p. m. on Sunday. On college dance nights, closing time shall be 12:30 a. m.

The granting of 1:00 a. m. nights shall be left to the discretion of the Dean of Women.

All extra open nights shall extend to 10:30 p. m. only.

**Penalties.** Women students who return to the dormitory after closing hours are

subject to the following penalties:

Minutes Late      Campus

1 to 9—Friday night.

10 to 19—Friday and Saturday nights.

20 to 29—Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights.

30 and over—Discretion of A.W.S. Council.

No exceptions will be made to the foregoing. All campuses are strict dormitory campuses, beginning at 6:30 p. m. and ending at 7:00 a. m. the following morning for each campus.

**Chaperones.** Faculty members shall be considered official chaperones. All chaperones shall be invited at least two days in advance of any social engagement. The names of the chaperones shall be reported to the Dean of Women at least twenty-four hours prior to the time of the social event.

Transportation should be provided for all chaperones for "off-campus" affairs.

**General.** Women are not permitted to call at men's living quarters without special permission from the Student Counselor.

Students are requested not to linger at the dormitory entrances with their escorts.

The lounges in Campbell and Morton Halls are for the exclusive use of the women of the college. All men callers are received in the North Lounge.

### FRESHMAN CODE

1. Freshmen must carry this book and be familiar with its contents at all times.

2. At the first of the year it is customary for the Vice-President of the Student Body to meet the freshman class and explain the traditions and customs of the College and act as temporary chairman of the class until the officers are elected.

3. **Beanies.** Freshmen shall wear their

"beanies" until released from this duty by the Traditions Committee. Hours for wearing the "beanie" are from seven o'clock in the morning until six o'clock in the evening except on Sundays and holidays.

4. First quarter freshmen shall not wear cords.

5. All freshmen must know the College songs and yells, be at all pep rallies, games, and student body meetings.

6. Freshmen are prohibited from "queening" on the campus between the hours of 7:00 a. m. and 6:00 p. m. except on Sundays and holidays. "Queening" is defined as any overt act or attempt on the part of either men or women to communicate with the opposite sex except for strictly business reasons. "Strictly business" may be defined by the Traditions Committee.

7. Junior women will supervise the enforcement of traditions for freshmen women.

8. Freshmen are not permitted to lounge on the lawns.

9. Freshmen men are responsible for the gathering of material for the Homecoming bonfire. This work will be supervised by upperclassmen.

10. Only the Traditions Committee shall have authority to enforce the Freshman Code.

### GENERAL TRADITIONS

1. The traditions of the College insist that no emblem of any sort except those awarded at the college be worn. This does not include inconspicuous rings and pins.

2. Only the walks may be used in crossing the campus. The beauty of the cam-

3. Only Seniors shall have the privilege of wearing a mustache. Seniors also have the exclusive right to the benches around the fountain.

### FRESHMAN AWARDS

A freshman who wins his numerals in any one of the major sports of this institution will be awarded an honor jersey with his class numerals attached thereon.

Only one such set of numerals and honor jerseys will be awarded to any one individual.

The freshman jersey with numerals is the only freshman athletic award paid for by the Associated Student Budget.

### VARSITY AWARDS

The first year varsity award is the heavy coat style sweater, including name plate and seven inch full block "A" chenille letter.

The second year varsity award is the light coat style sweater, including name plate and seven inch "A" chenille letter.

The third year varsity award is an athletic blanket of the size 62 inches by 72

inches, which shall include a name plate and a 12 inch felt letter "A" sewed in the center.

No person shall be entitled to a blanket award unless he has successfully earned three major letters in varsity competition in the same sport.

### MINOR AWARDS

An award will be given in all minor sports where intercollegiate competition takes place. The minor sports award is a five inch block "A."

### AWARD CERTIFICATES

The Athletic Board will present the Award Certificate to all individuals awarded the "varsity letter" in each major sport. The actual chenille varsity "A" is given to eligible candidates only upon their award sweaters. These certificates are presented at the Awards Day assembly, the last assembly before the end of school in the spring.
