



DIVISION OF MILITARY AFFAIRS

MISSION

The Arizona Division of Military Affairs plans and provides for the defense, safety, and welfare of the people of the State of Arizona. The division also stays ready and able to provide equipment and trained troops ready for action in case of war or disasters, whether natural or man-made.

ORGANIZATION

The Division of Military Affairs is composed of the Arizona Army National Guard and the Arizona Air National Guard under the direction of Brigadier General Robert B. Pettycrew.

PERSONNEL

There are three categories of personnel: full-time employees of the State, full-time employees of the Federal Government (including military active duty personnel), and drill-status members of the Arizona National Guard who normally participate in military training one weekend a month and 15 additional days each year.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The Administrative Services Office, directed by LTC Daniel R. Angulo, provides State administrative support to the Division of Military Affairs. It manages and coordinates all activities involving State agencies to include personnel, budgeting, purchasing and contracting, accounting and finance, and support services.

The primary elements of the Administrative Services Office is personnel and budget, financial management, purchasing and contracting, and support services.

-Personnel and Budget Administration-

The State Personnel Management Staff is responsible for the administration of the State Employee Personnel Program including recruitment and placement, classification, salary, leave, employee performance, employee relations, out and in-service training, and personnel records maintenance.

There were 259 permanent State positions authorized during the year, of which 254 were filled by June 30, 1984. Additionally, ten temporary positions were authorized and filled as of that date.

The Administrative Services Officer is also responsible for publishing orders and managing payroll on all State active duty personnel.

The Administrative Services Officer researches and prepares the agency budget request and defense before legislative hearing. For fiscal year 1984 \$2,686,500.00 was requested in State appropriated funds to support operations. The legislature appropriated \$2,344,600.00 in general funds and an additional \$997,560.00 for land, buildings and improvements.

-Financial Management-

The Office of the Comptroller is responsible for the administration and

accounting of all National Guard funds, State and Federal, which are on deposit with the State of Arizona. Four employees are assigned to this office. During FY 84 State appropriated \$4,131,698.00. Federal funds supporting State administered service contract agreements totaled \$5,809,708.00, and National Guard support of State emergencies accounted for an additional \$692,882.00.

The State appropriation to the Division of Military Affairs for FY 84 operating budget was \$2,344,600.00. Of this total \$2,297,255.00, or 98% was expended and \$47,345.00 reverted to the general fund. Table 1 depicts the detailed breakout of operating program expenditures. \$997,560 was appropriated in FY 84 for land, buildings and improvements. Balance from incompletd projects carried forward to this fiscal year totaled an additional \$789,538.00, which made \$1,787,098.00 available for LB&I projects. Of this, \$576,630.00 was expended in FY 84, and the remainder will be carried forward into the new fiscal year.

The Office of the Comptroller also administers the accounting for eight service contract agreements between the National Guard Bureau and the State of Arizona.

The Division of Military Affairs also accounted for \$692,882.00 in reimbursable funds expended in support of emergencies within the state.

-Purchasing and Contracting-

The Division of Military Affairs entered into either design or supervision of construction contracts (or both) with 17 different architect/engineering (A&E) firms on 35 projects totaling \$432,410.00 in A & E fees. Additionally, 22 construction contracts were awarded or finalized with 18 different construction contractors totaling \$3,763,270.00.

By direction of the Adjutant General, this office assumed responsibility for all purchasing and contracting functions of the Department of Emergency and Military Affairs on 1 February 1984. During the period 1 July 1983 through 30 June 1984 this office processed over 1500 purchase orders, exceeding \$970,000.00 for the Division of Military Affairs. From 1 February 1984 through 30 June 1984, 135 purchase orders were processed for the Division of Emergency Services equating to over \$87,000.00.

In addition to normal purchasing and contracting responsibilities, this office administered eight service contract agreements to provide operations, maintenance, and security for both Army and Air National Guard facilities as well as Navajo Army Depot located at Bellemont, AZ. The total amount of these agreements was \$6,299,374.00 of which the Federal government provided \$5,811,603.00 and the State of Arizona provided \$487,771.00.

-Support Services-

The Support Services office provides a variety of essential support functions to Federal and State offices within the agency. Communications, mail distribution, reproduction, records storage, graphic arts and photography services are performed by six full-time employees.

The Records Holding Area (RHA) currently retains 70,000 military and civilian inactive personnel files. These and other records are retained

pending final disposition. The office also has microfilming capability.

Graphic art services and photographic requests are also provided. 50 requests were answered this fiscal year, including identification card and full length photographs.

Support Services responded to 1,680 requests for offset and photocopy reproduction orders. In addition, the office manages telecommunications assets for all State supported facilities.





ARIZONA ARMY NATIONAL GUARD

MISSION

The Arizona Army National Guard, under the command of Brigadier General Curtis Jennings, with COL Jim Carpenter as his Chief of Staff, has two responsibilities: one to the State of Arizona and the other to the Federal Government.

STATE MISSION:

The Army National Guard provides units organized, equipped and trained to function effectively in the protection of life and property and the preservation of peace, order and the public's safety.

FEDERAL MISSION:

To provide trained units and qualified individuals available for active duty in time of war or national emergency, in support of the U.S. Army's war plans, and at such other times as the national security may require augmentation of the active regular forces.

The Army National Guard comes under the jurisdiction of the Federal Government when called or ordered to active duty for accomplishment of a Federal Mission.

The Arizona Army National Guard is comprised of 33 units located throughout the State. The Guard is functionally organized into four elements for Command and Control:

- State Area Command (STARC)
- 153rd Field Artillery Brigade
- Navajo Army Depot
- Support Brigade Troop Command (Provisional)

ARIZONA STATE AREA COMMAND (STARC)

The mission of the STARC is to Command, Control and Supervise Army National Guard Units allotted to the State so as to provide trained and equipped units capable of immediate expansion to war strength and available for service in time of war or national emergency.

Major Functions:

- a. Command and Control.
- b. Operation of the Combined Support Maintenance Shop.
- c. Operation of the Unit Training Equipment Site at Florence, AZ.
- d. Operation of the Army Aviation Support Facility at Papago Army Airfield in Phoenix, AZ.
- e. Operation of the Arizona Military Academy.
- f. Operation of three local training sites throughout the State.
 - (1) Navajo Barracks, Navajo Army Depot, Bellemont, AZ. This site consists of 60 acres licensed to the Army National Guard.
 - (2) Florence Military Reservation. This training site consists of approximately 5,500 acres set aside by Presidential Proclamation for National Guard use and a joint use area approximately 19,00 acres of State land.
 - (3) Fort Huachuca. The Arizona Army National Guard has a license from

Ft. Huachuca giving us use of a portion of the old hospital area which was to have been demolished. This area, consisting of 19 buildings, gives the Arizona Army National Guard the capabilities of providing administrative space, quarters, classrooms, and mess capability for a battalion-sized unit to perform training on Ft. Huachuca itself.

ARMY NATIONAL GUARD STRENGTH


The strength of the Arizona Army National Guard stood at 4,596 at the end of the fiscal year. Authorized strength is 5,207. At the present time we stand at 88.3% of authorized strength.

Officer strength at the end of the fiscal year was 359. Of this total 30 are women serving in the National Guard throughout the state.

Warrant Officers Strength is 168 total of which 3 are women.

Enlisted personnel strength is 4,069 total. Of this total 297 are women.

Over the past fiscal year we have lost (discharged) 1,200 guard members. During this same period we have gained (enlisted) 1,167 guard members for a total loss of 33 individuals.



TRAINING AND EDUCATION

The Deputy Chief of Staff for Plans, Operations, Training and Security, COL Peter D. Tosi Jr., is responsible for Plans, Operations, Training and Security for the Arizona Army National Guard. The Arizona Military Academy Officers Candidate School, under the direction of COL Tosi, graduated 14 candidates during August of 1983. During the school year, 228 Non-Commissioned Officers from training programs, which included the Basic, Advanced, Senior and First Sergeant courses were also graduated. The Non-Prior Service program (NPS) has trained 270 new enlistees. Both officer and enlisted courses are designed to develop or refine leadership skills.

The schools program for fiscal year 1984 is \$1.2 million. This money will be distributed as follows:

Three and one-half million dollars had been programmed for annual training in 1984. This money will cover the pay and allowances for 515 officers and 3,400 enlisted personnel for their two-week training period.

Significant training accomplishments over the twelve month period included: (1) the successful completion of a nuclear training evaluation (ARTEP) and validation inspection by the 1st Battalion, 180th Field Artillery; the first in the Sixth Army to do so, (2) the execution of field exercise "Desert Force", a 1,500 man battlefield training exercise, (3) the deployment of seven cells (3 to 4 people) for overseas training in Korea and Germany, and (4) the attainment of 96% personnel attendance for annual training.

MILITARY SUPPORT

During the period 1 Jul 83 thru 30 Jun 84 the National Guard of Arizona provided the following military support to the State of Arizona.



In addition the Arizona National Guard has entered into a memorandum of understanding with the Department of Public Safety to assist in State drug enforcement operations.



UNITED STATES PROPERTY AND FISCAL OFFICE

MISSION

The United States Property and Fiscal Office, directed by COL Paul L. Moseley, is the Federal agency responsible for obtaining and providing funds, supplies, equipment and services for National Guard purposes.

ORGANIZATION

Five staff divisions comprise the USP&FO, they are:

- a. Data Processing Installation.
- b. Analysis and Internal Review.
- c. Comptroller.
- d. Purchasing and Contracting.
- e. Logistics.

The administrative division performs administrative support to the USP&FO operations by maintaining a centralized filing system and reference library, reproducing and disseminating publications and providing stenographic services.

DATA PROCESSING INSTALLATION

The Data Processing Installation provides support to all activities of the Army National Guard. The installation operates a Burroughs 1955 mini-computer to process supply, personnel, fiscal accounting and reporting data utilizing standard military and locally designed programs.

The telecommunications Center operated under the Data Processing Installation Chief provides AUTODIN (Automatic Digital Network) services to all Arizona National Guard organizations, the U.S. Army Reserve and backup support to Williams Air Force Base and the 161st Air Refueling Group.

ANALYSIS AND INTERNAL REVIEW BRANCH

This branch conducts annual audits, internal review and special examinations to assure that federal funds and equipment are properly safeguarded and accounted for. During the course of the fiscal year, fifty-eight (58) examinations and reviews were conducted by on-site units to all Arizona National Guard units and activities.

COMPTROLLER DIVISION

Financial resource management for the Arizona National Guard is administered by the USP&FO for Arizona through the Army National Guard Comptroller and two Assistant United States Property and Fiscal Officers for the Air National Guard units.

The Army Guard office is located at 5636 East McDowell Road, Phoenix, Arizona and 1500 East Valencia Road, Tucson, Arizona.

Both Army and Air National Guard offices provide fiscal accounting, pay and travel related support and financial reporting of the Arizona National Guard.

Total Federal Funds used by the Army Guard for FY84 are \$37,491,600 and

total Federal funds used by the Air Guard is \$37,850,100.

PURCHASING AND CONTRACTING BRANCH

Contracting and procurement services are provided by this branch to all activities of the Arizona National Guard by formal advertisement or by negotiation in accordance with Federal Acquisition Regulation. During State FY 84, local procurement in support of Arizona National Guard units and activities totaled \$1,893,103. Additionally the office reviewed and established major construction contracts for projects valued at \$20,109,732.

LOGISTICS DIVISION

This Division is organized into stock control and supply and traffic branches which provide logistical support and guidance to units/activities of the Arizona Army National Guard.

During the fiscal year, a total of \$4,526,818 was spent to procure supplies and equipment for the Arizona Army National Guard. It maintained an inventory valued at \$2,719,616.

The traffic branch during the fiscal year arranged transportation for 3,414 personnel. In the movement of these personnel, 1,314 government transportation requests were prepared at a cost of \$450,122. Much of this revenue went to Arizona based airlines, commuter airlines and bus companies. A total of \$111,249 was expended to move military freight. All revenue expended for support of annual training was given to local Arizona companies. During this period, documents were processed for the receipt of 2,948 tons of cargo. A total of 1,117 government meal tickets were prepared during this period and a total of \$70,927 was expended to feed 13,424 personnel.

The total dollar value of equipment assets of the Arizona National Guard is \$116,265,552.00.



MAINTENANCE

The Director of Maintenance, LTC James L. McMeekin, is responsible for the maintenance of all Federal Military Ground Surface Equipment issued to the Arizona Army National Guard. Maintenance is performed by unit military maintenance personnel during Inactive Duty Training (IDT) and Annual Training (AT). As of June 30, 1984 there were 102 Federally funded, full-time maintenance personnel.

In anticipation of the receipt of several new types of equipment beginning in fiscal year 1985, maintenance personnel are receiving New Equipment Training (NET) from various sources. New types of equipment scheduled to be received are the Commercial Utility Cargo Vehicle, 5-ton Cargo Truck and Wreckers, Engineer Construction Equipment, such as road graders, tractor-scrappers, and front end loaders. To keep up with modernization of our vehicles, our mechanics are beginning to receive computerized engine test equipment.

As of June 30, 1984, the Arizona Army National Guard had 15,654 items of maintenance significant surface equipment on hand.

SUPPORT PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT OFFICE

The Support Personnel Management Office, under the supervision of LTC Austin S. Graton, provides centralized civilian personnel administration for all assigned Federal Technicians (both Army and Air) and administers the Active Duty Guard/Reserve program.

The personnel office consists of five functional entities: (1) The Personnel Management Section, (2) The Employee Services Section, (3) The Military Duty Management/Services Section, (4) The Equal Employment Opportunity Section, and, (5) The Labor Relations Section.

The department's Federal Technician and Active Duty Guard/Reserve assignment strength for the Army and Air National Guard at the beginning and end of the year were:

During the fiscal year a total of 284 incentive awards were submitted to this office. Of this total, 252 were approved for a total of \$237,976.00 being awarded.

153rd FIELD ARTILLERY BRIGADE

The 153rd Field Artillery Brigade, commanded by COL. Ben Anderson, consists of the following units:

- a. Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 153rd Field Artillery Brigade, Glendale, AZ.
- b. 1st Battalion, 180th Field Artillery, Mesa, Chandler, Tempe and Casa Grande, AZ.
- c. 2nd Battalion, 180th Field Artillery, Tucson, AZ.
- d. Aviation Troop Command (Provisional), Phoenix, AZ.

MISSION


Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 153rd Field Artillery Brigade is designated to provide tactical control and administrative supervision of from three to six attached field artillery units. This unit has been given the additional mission, by STARC, to provide command and control to assigned Aviation units.

Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 153rd Field Artillery Brigade concentrated the majority of time and effort this year in developing and conducting an ARTEP in accordance with Appendix C to FORSCOM regulation 350-2 for the 2nd BN, 180th Field Artillery. It is thought this is the first time a reserve component Headquarters has accomplished this task. The ARTEP was taken in June at Ft. Huachuca, AZ during annual training. The successful accomplishment involved cooperation with many active and Army Reserve Component agencies from FORSCOM 6th Army and I Corps to the 91st Military Training Command and the Individual Ready Reserve. In addition to the ARTEP the Brigade participated in three major training exercises with its CAPSTONE Headquarters, I Corps Artillery. These exercises serve to enhance the Brigades ability to perform its wartime mission.

The 1st Battalion, 180th Field Artillery, commanded by LTC Joe Hanford, had a very successful training year which culminated with an ARTEP externally evaluated by the Battalion's affiliation partner, 3rd Bn, 18th Field Artillery from Ft. Sill, Oklahoma. The successful passage of this test demonstrated the unit hasn't lost any of its combat skills which were so aptly demonstrated during Advance Training in 1983 when the unit passed the FORSCOM directed nuclear ARTEP.

The 2nd Battalion, 180th Field Artillery, under the command of LTC Anthony Diaz, has had but one purpose throughout the entire year and that has been to successfully train to pass the ARTEP in accordance with Appendix C to FORSCOM regulation 350-2. Not only was the unit fully successful in this regard, it ended up with an overall 96% "Go Rate" for the 55 missions fired. Without question the fifty-one hour test was difficult, but, the end results served notice that the 2nd Battalion of the 180th Field Artillery is ready to go to war should the need arise.

The Aviation Troop Command, under the command of LTC Glen Clark, has had a busy year coordinating the affairs of its three subordinate units and developing plans to support the Western Army Aviation Training Site by fiscal year 1986. The valuable assistance provided by this Headquarters is indicative of the need for an authorized TO&E Headquarters and one additional Aviation Company.



B Company, 40th Aviation Bn, which has a CAPSTONE alignment with the 40th Aviation Battalion at Camp Roberts, CA., spent its Advance Training involved in a major field exercise at Camp Roberts with the entire 40th Infantry Division. During this exercise they demonstrated their ability to perform all missions expected of a Utility Helicopter Company. Missions were performed around the clock and included troop lift, aerial resupply, command and control, communications relay and organic maintenance. With the recent loan of night vision goggles the company will expand its training next year to include performance of all the above tasks under conditions of darkness.

D Company, 149th Aviation Bn has the primary mission of deploying Infantry Armor and Mechanized forces by aerial combat power using fire and manuevers. The units ability to accomplish this mission is becoming more viable daily as it trades antiquated UH-1M model gunships for the AH-1S Cobra. To date six AH-1S's have been delivered. The transition training for unit aviators, crew chiefs, mechanics and armament repairmen is now 35% complete with 15 transitions having been completed this year. Annual training found the unit in a year round training status.

The unit also conducted a joint Aviation Training Exercise with the 21st Tactical Air Command at Gila Bend which proved to be extremely beneficial for both commands. A limited number of TOW Missiles as well as 2.75 mm rockets reduces the number of pilots who qualify annually with these systems. Last year only 17% of the assigned aviators qualified with the TOW and 70% with rockets.

The 416th Air Traffic Control Platoon was organized in 1981. Most of this year has been spent acquiring authorized equipment and job qualifying assigned personnel. Currently 80% of the assigned strength is MOS qualified. This is an improvement of 65% over last year. The recent training partnership with Ft. Hood, TX. should enhance the platoons ability to train and become combat ready. Plans for next year are basically an expansion of the training accomplished to date.

This year has been extremely busy in terms of answering the call for State support. Although statistics currently don't provide the complete story, they are indicators of how the Brigade personnel have supported the Office of the Governor and the State populas as a whole.

Personnel from the 153rd Field Artillery Brigade served the community unselfishly throughout the fiscal year. Members of the Brigade were involved in the Golden Knights, local Parades, and training with ROTC units throughout the State just to mention a few.

NAVAJO ARMY DEPOT

The Navajo Army Depot, under the command of COL John Johnson, consists of the following units:

- a. Navajo Depot, Bellemont, AZ.
- b. Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 157th Ordnance Battalion, (Ammunition), Bellemont, AZ.
- c. 1057th Ordnance Company (Ammunition), Kingman, Lake Havasu City, Bullhead City and Fredonia, AZ.
- d. 1058th Ordnance Company (Ammunition), Prescott, Cottonwood, Wickenburg, and Payson, AZ.
- e. 1059th Ordnance Company (Ammunition), Winslow, Page, Show Low, and Springerville, AZ.
- f. 1060th Ordnance Detachment (Ammunition), Flagstaff, AZ.

Navajo Army Depot is located 12 miles west of Flagstaff, and consists of approximately 28,000 acres. The primary mission of the depot is to receive, store, inspect, renovate, demilitarize, and ship conventional ammunition. There are also GSA strategic reserve materials, such as raw rubber and mercury stored there. The depot performs its mission on a day-by-day basis, exactly like those operated by the active Army. In addition, the depot offers hands-on training to the ammunition handlers who are members of the 157th Ordnance Battalion, Commanded by MAJ William A. Cherry, and other units of the Arizona Army National Guard.

Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 157th Ordnance Battalion (Ammunition) is organized to provide command and technical supervision over conventional, special ammunition (nuclear) and guided missile support companies and other attached units. This unit also provides staff planning and technical supervision for up to six ammunition companies.

1057th, 1058th and the 1059th Ordnance Companies (Ammunition) are organized identically and are authorized 274 members each. The companies can establish and operate an ammunition supply facility for receipt, storage, and issue of conventional ammunition, components, and containers.

1060th Ordnance Detachment (Ammunition) is a much-reduced version of the ammunition companies listed above. This is a one-of-a-kind unit left in the Army inventory and is being considered for deactivation at the present time.

923th Medical Detachment provides dispensary service for up to 1,000 troops not otherwise provided unit level medical service.

SUPPORT BRIGADE TROOP COMMAND (Provisional)

Support Brigade Troop Command (Provisional) is commanded by COL Jay Brashear and provides Company/Detachment size units to various posts, camps and stations for mission support, unit Military Occupation Specialty (MOS) Training and Army Training and Evaluation Program (ARTEP) support.

The Support Brigade Troop Command (Provisional) consists of the following units:

- a. Support Brigade Headquarters, Phoenix, AZ.
- b. 158th Supply and Service Battalion, Phoenix, Tucson and Nogales, AZ.
- c. Engineer Troop Command (Provisional), Phoenix and Safford, AZ.
- d. 258th Rear Area Operations Center, Phoenix, Glendale, Sunnyslope and Yuma, AZ.
- e. 1120th Quartermaster Battalion (Petroleum), Phoenix, Coolidge, Florence, Claypool, Douglas, Bisbee and Sierra Vista, AZ.

Over the past year units within the Brigade took part in some 58 separate missions to assist the community. Some of the highlights were: Phoenix Attacks Trash, Scottsdale Clean Sweep, Veteran's Day Parade, Phoenix 10-K Run, Fiesta Bowl Parade, Health Fair 84, support to the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, support to the Phoenix Cinco De Mayo, Walk America, and Operation Identification (child fingerprinting).

Elements of the Brigade were sent to provide assistance to residents along the Colorado River that was currently in flood stage, Prescott to assist flood victims, assist victims of floods in the Eastern and Southern portions of the State and the engineers provided support in repairing the I-10 Gila River Bridge which collapsed during floods.

On three separate occasions during the year personnel were called to State duty to assist the Department of Public Safety with the miners strike in the Clifton/Morenci area and to provide personnel and equipment support to the Forest Service to assist in transporting fire fighting crews.

During this fiscal year elements of the Brigade have participated in training throughout the State of Arizona, California, in Germany, and Korea with respect to their military mission.

MISSION

Support Brigade Headquarters (Provisional). The Support Brigade Headquarters is a 28-member provisional unit organized to provide command and control to the largest segment of the Army National Guard of Arizona. The Brigade is composed of Combat Support and Combat Service Support units located in 14 communities in central and southern Arizona. Upon mobilization, the unit will be used to flesh-out the Arizona STARC.

-158th Supply and Service Battalion-

The Battalion is composed of the following:

- a. Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 158th Supply and Service Battalion, Phoenix, AZ.
- b. 158th Finance Section, Phoenix, AZ.
- c. 167th Supply and Service Company, Phoenix and Goodyear, AZ.
- d. 2220th Transportation Company, Tucson and Nogales, AZ.
- e. 3666th Maintenance Company, Phoenix and Tucson, AZ.

Headquarters and Headquarters Company has the mission of command and control of assigned or attached, direct and/or general support supply and service units. It is capable of providing command and control, staff planning, and technical supervision for from two to six companies.

158th Finance Section is a 55-member unit consisting of various finance teams capable of providing normal pay functions to non-divisional personnel.

167th Supply and Service Company operates a direct support supply and service facility to non-divisional troops. It provides rations, fuel, clothing and limited major-item replacement. It can provide field showers.

2220th Transportation Company provides transportation for movement of cargo and personnel. Fully operational, the unit has the capability to haul 360 short tons of cargo or 1,300 passengers in one lift.

3666th Light Maintenance Company provides direct support maintenance and repair parts supply for mechanical, armament, communications, and construction equipment to non-divisional units in the corps area. It also furnishes most personnel operating the Combined Support Maintenance Shop in Phoenix.



-Engineer Troop Command (Provisional)-

This Provisional Battalion, commanded by LTC Henry W. Worthington, consists of the following five units:

- a. Battalion Headquarters (Provisional), Phoenix, AZ.
- b. 258th Engineer Company (Light Equipment), Phoenix and Safford, AZ.
- c. 259th Engineer Company (Construction Support), Phoenix, AZ.
- d. 108th Army Band (attached for command and control), Phoenix, AZ.
- e. 123rd Public Affairs Detachment (attached for command and control), Phoenix, AZ.

MISSION

The Engineer Troop Command Battalion Headquarters (Provisional) provides command and control and technical support to the other elements of the Battalion. Upon mobilization, personnel from this unit would flesh-out the Arizona STARC.

258th Engineer Company (Light Equipment) provides manned engineer construction equipment to support engineer combat operations. The unit is equipped to perform horizontal (earth moving) functions.

259th Engineer Company (Construction Support) is equipped to provide rock crushing, bituminous mixing, paving, well drilling, and other construction support equipment for major horizontal projects such as highways, storage facilities and airfields.

108th Army Band provides band support for ceremonies and is the good will ambassador for us with community appearances throughout the State.

123rd Public Affairs Detachment provides public affairs support to units of the Army National Guard of Arizona through publication of newspapers for members of the Army National Guard of Arizona; enhances public awareness of Army National Guard programs through local media; provides public affairs support during emergency operations.

-258th Rear Area Operations Center-

This Battalion sized unit consists of:

- a. 258th Rear Area Operations Center, Phoenix, AZ.
- b. 852nd Military Police Company, Yuma and Bellemont, AZ.
- c. 855th Military Police Company, Sunnyslope, AZ.
- e. 860th Military Police Detachment (Confinement), Phoenix, AZ.
- f. 996th Medical Company (Armored Cavalry Regiment), Glendale, AZ.

MISSION

The 258th Rear Area Operations Center, commanded by LTC Larry H. Gingrich, provides rear area protection contingency planning, training, and control for operations and command of designated rear area protection forces. Although not properly staffed, this unit additionally provides command and control of assigned companies.

852nd and 855th Military Police Companies both have the same federal

mission, to provide military police support for an assigned area or command headquarters. Future trends appear to be evolving toward use of military police units more as "Rear Area Infantry" and less in support of post, camp and station functions as in the past.

860th Military Police Detachment (Confinement) provides personnel to guard and supervise military prisoners. The unit depends on training at the Military Disciplinary Barracks, Ft. Leavenworth for real-world training.

924th Medical Detachment (Dispensary) is a 10 member unit which provides dispensary service for up to 1,000 troops not otherwise provided with unit level medical services.

996th Medical Company (Armored Cavalry Regiment) provided division level medical support to a cavalry regiment, medical staff advice and assistance, and unit level medical support to units operating in the regimental area.

-1120th Quartermaster Battalion (Petroleum)-

This Battalion, commanded by LTC Alberto Rodriguez, consists of the following units:

- a. Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Phoenix, AZ.
- b. 222nd Transportation Company (Medium Truck), Phoenix, AZ.
- c. 2221st Petroleum Supply Company, Coolidge, Florence, Claypool, AZ.
- d. 2222nd Transportation Company (Medium Truck), Douglas, Sierra Vista, and Bisbee, AZ.

MISSION

Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 1120th Quartermaster Battalion (Petroleum) provides command, administration, technical and operations supervision for assigned or attached petroleum supply companies and transportation medium truck companies (petroleum).

222nd and 2222nd Transportation Companies provide assistance for the movement of petroleum products in assigned 5,000 gallon semi-trailers. Each unit has the capability, when fully operational, of hauling 300,000 gallons of fuel in a single lift.

2221st Petroleum Supply Company has the mission to establish and operate one or more temporary petroleum storage facilities for wholesale transfer operations to Division Support Command and Direct Support Petroleum Supply Platoons of the Supply and Service Companies. Using collapsible 10,000 and 50,000 gallon storage tanks, this unit can store 1,040,000 gallons of fuel. It can lay approximately 13.5 miles of fuel hose line in one day and concurrently retrieve up to 3.7 miles.

WESTERN ARMY AVIATION TRAINING SITE (W.A.A.T.S.)

The National Guard Bureau has selected Arizona as the location for the W.A.A.T.S. to serve the western United States. The Department of Military Affairs will direct the operation of the Armory and the Army Aviation Support Facility to be co-located with the W.A.A.T.S.

PURPOSE

To train National Guard helicopter pilots in aerial gunnery and tactics.

LOCATION

Vicinity of Pinal Air Park, Pinal County, Arizona.

FACILITIES TO DATE

Total size of the area is 160.92 acres that will house a 100 person armory with Battalion Headquarters, i.e. three Companies and 1 Detachment using approximately 32,788 square feet. There will be an Army Aviation Support Facility (AASF) consisting of 40,880 square feet, Flight & Weapons Simulator (F&WS) consisting of 15,617 square feet, and an Aircrew Dormitory, Flight Surgeon, Dining Facility and Administration Offices of approximately 37,379 square feet.

Aircraft which will be used for training purposes will be the following:

- AH-1S Cobra (Attack Helicopter).....21 each
- OH-58 Kiowa (Observation Helicopter).....12 each
- OH-6 Cayuse (Observation Helicopter).....6 each
- UH-1H Iriquois (Utility Helicopter).....5 each
- UH-60 Blackhawk (Utility Helicopter).....1 each

Description and use of the facilities is as follows:

- a. Armory - provides training area for personnel and security of the units equipment and materials.
- b. AASF - provides flight instruction, aviation and maintenance support for additional aircraft assigned.
- c. F&WS - provides cockpit motion devices, computer facilities, laser equipment and terrain boards for simulation of the attack helicopters operating in a battlefield environment.
- d. Administration - provides equipment organic to aviation units for training pilots and crew chiefs in aircraft operations and tactical deployment in a high threat environment.
- e. Aircraft - provides equipment organic to aviation units for training pilots and crew chiefs in aircraft operations and tactical deployment in a high threat environment.
- f. Training Areas - all aviators will be experienced pilots. Flight training will be conducted in the local flying area. Tactics and aerial gunnery training will be conducted at the Gila Bend, Ft. Huachuca or Yuma Proving Ground in Arizona.


The training site is scheduled to achieve full operational status in 1987.

Economic impact to the State of Arizona will be a construction cost of approximately \$12.0 million and a recurring annual income of approximately \$7.6 million.





-ARMY NATIONAL GUARD OF ARIZONA TROOP ORGANIZATION AND LOCATION-








ARIZONA AIR NATIONAL GUARD

MISSION

The Federal mission of the Arizona Air National Guard is to provide trained units and qualified personnel for Federal military service in time of war or national emergency. The Arizona Air National Guard also supports its State mission which calls for the provision of personnel and equipment in the event of a State emergency.

ORGANIZATION

The Arizona Air National Guard, commanded by COL John Almquist, consists of the Arizona Air National Guard Headquarters at Papago Park Military Reservation, the 161st Air Refueling Group at Sky Harbor Airport, Phoenix, AZ., the 162nd Tactical Fighter Group at Tucson International Airport, Tucson, AZ., and the 107th Tactical Control Squadron at Papago Park Military Reservation, Phoenix, AZ.



The assigned strength of the Arizona Air National Guard as of September 30, 1984 was 271 Officers and 1,964 Enlisted personnel for a total of 2,235 members. This is 99% of the positions authorized for officers and 97.5% of the authorized enlisted personnel positions.

107th TACTICAL CONTROL SQUADRON

MISSION

The 107th Tactical Control Squadron is commanded by LTC James N. Hagenson and is tasked with the responsibility to provide the Air Force a combat ready Control and Reporting Post. The unit is also ready to respond to any State emergencies should the Governor of Arizona so declare.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The Five-Phase Operation Readiness Inspection conducted by Tactical Air Command Inspecting General Team in March of 1984 resulted in an overall rating of "EXCELLENT". This constituted the only excellent rating awarded to Active Air Force or Air National Guard like units by this team during the entire year. This reflects the expertise and dedication of the members of the 107th TCS.

TRAINING

The 107th TCS has conducted numerous mini-deployments to create and reinforce skills necessary for unit world-wide readiness. Two Officers and 33 Enlisted men completed 17 air service schools during the year.

DEPLOYMENTS

The Squadron has been called upon to support various Air National Guard and Air Force fighter units throughout the State and Nation in support of Operational Readiness Inspections and Operational Ready Evaluation activities. The 107th TCS provides augmentees for overseas deployments to Italy and Denmark in support of NATO Joint Service Exercises.

SUPPORT OF GOVERNMENT AND COMMUNITY AFFAIRS

During the year, the unit's men and women have been called upon to assist in flood control and fire duty during times of emergency throughout the State.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS

The 107th TCS has assisted the needy families in the unit and community with "OPERATION HAPPINESS" conducted every year during the Christmas season. Money, food, clothing and toys are donated by unit members for distribution. Cinco de Mayo festivities are supported by the unit in supplying needed equipment and manpower. Blood Service Drives are enthusiastically supported by members of both the 107th and the 111th by donating blood on a regular basis or during times of emergency.

To promote better community relations, an "OPEN HOUSE" was held during which employers and community members were able to learn about the Air National Guard. In addition, family members are made to feel a part of the Arizona National Guard.

161st AIR REFUELING GROUP

The 161st Air Refueling Group, commanded by COL David Manning, is made up of a Headquarters and eight subordinate units as listed below:

- a. 197th Air Refueling Squadron.
- b. 161st Consolidated Aircraft Maintenance Squadron.
- c. 161st Combat Squadron.
- d. 161st Resources Management Squadron.
- e. 161st Civil Engineering Squadron.
- f. 161st Security Police Flight.
- g. 161st USAF Clinic.
- h. 161st Communications Flight.

MISSION

The peacetime mission of the 161st Air Refueling Group is to recruit and train personnel, procure and maintain support equipment, maintain a base facility for ready reserve forces capable of augmenting the Strategic Air Command in support of world wide air refueling. The 197th Air Refueling Squadron provides qualified KC-135 aircrews to execute air refueling missions under varied weather conditions, day or night, in any geographic area.

In addition to day-to-day local air refueling missions and one aircraft on 24-hour alert duty, the unit participated in many missions and deployment to increase readiness for combat.

- a. Deployment to Turkey for operations support of NATO forces during exercise "CORONET CROWN."
- b. Set the record for maximum fuel offload from a KC-135 by transferring 160,000 pounds of JP-4 jet fuel to a B-1 bomber while flying out of Edwards Air Force Base, CA. The previous record was 120,000 pounds.
- c. Three aircraft to Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii with the 162nd Tactical Fighter Group, Tucson Air Guard, in support of "SENTRY Tigre."
- e. Four aircraft and one hundred fifty (150) personnel deployed to Anderson Air Force Base, Guam to augment the Pacific Tanker Task Force of the Active Air Force Strategic Air Command.
- f. Multiple deployments to Howard Air Force Base, Panama, Canal Zone, supporting the A-7 fighter aircraft commitment to Central America.
- g. Three aircraft and one hundred (100) personnel to Elemendorf Air Force Base, Alaska to support the Alaskan Tanker Task Force.

Members of the 161st Security Police Flight were called to State Active Duty on three occasions during the fiscal year:

- a. Flood control during flooding at Parker, AZ.
- b. To assist State and Local authorities in maintaining peace at Morenci, AZ during copper mine strikes (twice).

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Members of the 161st ARG led by the 161st Consolidated Aircraft Maintenance Squadron have successfully participated in four Special Olympic programs. Annually some 30 members help manage several individual events held by the Special Olympics Committee of Arizona.



The 161st ARG has supported the Summer Youth Employment Program annually for the last five years, by providing meaningful jobs for economically disadvantaged youths from the Phoenix area. Working with local community based organizations, the 161st ARG has helped over two-hundred fifty (250) youths through our participation in this worthwhile program.

Additionally, individual members bring recognition to the 161st ARG through their participation in Camp Fire Girls, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Little Leagues, Soccer Leagues and church related activities.

The unit has also supported and participated in Veterans' Day and Memorial Day parades. The Annual Mexican Independence Day parade and festivities and the annual Fiesta Bowl parade and festivities.

111th TACTICAL CONTROL FLIGHT (Air Support Radar Team)

The 111th Tactical Control Flight (ASRT) is the smallest strength Air National Guard unit in the State of Arizona. The 111th TCF is currently working with the Army National Guard to develop precision guidance techniques in support of Army insertions and air-drops using helicopters.

MISSION

This unit provides all weather day and night guidance of aircraft for precision tactical bombing of surface targets, as well as providing guidance for air-drops, rescue operations, and scoring of simulated missions

Members of the 111th TCF volunteered for State active duty in support of relief assistance for Greenlee County flood victims. Our members were also present in support of Arizona Forest Service efforts to contain fires in Kingman, AZ. Our equipment is constantly in demand for support of local charitable organizations as well as for participating in local parades and other unit open house activities.

Annual Field Training was held in garrison with emphasis on becoming operational-ready. Live dedicated sorties were supplied by both the Army and Air Force units from Arizona. Several members have participated in Joint Chiefs of Staff Exercises.

162nd TACTICAL FIGHTER GROUP

The 162nd Tactical Fighter Group, commanded by COL John Hartnett, is the only A-7 Combat Crew Training unit in the Air National Guard.

MISSION


The group has a vital role in meeting the Tactical Air Commands reserve fighter commitments throughout the United States and an essential role as a Reserve Combat Ready Unit that can be deployed instantly for world wide assignment as a "Back-Up" force for combat ready units.

The 152nd TFS is the resident squadron and consists of A-7 and A-7K jet fighter aircraft. In addition, to fulfill their training mission


other Guard units annually send their pilots and ground crews to Tucson as part of "Operation Snowbird" for advanced training. The aircraft and equipment are accommodated at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, while the Air Guard quarters and supports the other units personnel. Each unit stays two weeks per year.

In addition to training student pilots, the mission of being a "Back-Up" Combat -Ready Unit, requires that the 162nd TFG participate in joint exercises with other Guard units and services to develop and maintain expertise in tactics, deployment, and weapons employment.

To support the dual mission, the 162nd TFG employs over 400 full-time technicians and slightly over 700 part-time Guard personnel, thus making a total force of over 1,100 people who work in Resource Management, Supply, Civil Engineering, Aircraft Maintenance, Security, and Communications.

DIVISION OF EMERGENCY SERVICES

The Division of Emergency Services, directed by Mr. Richard A. Colson, has the mission to minimize loss of life, reduce property damage, restore essential public services and expedite the recovery and rehabilitation of affected individuals in the event of a natural disaster or mass casualty situation.

As a result of emergency situations which were beyond the capability and resources of the local government to handle, three new Gubernatorial proclamations were declared.

a. Copper Strike:

As the result of unlawful acts and violence at various Arizona copper-mining communities and the inability of the local law enforcement agencies to handle that violence a need exists for the use of the Arizona National Guard and Department of Public Safety. On August 10, 1983, a Gubernatorial proclamation was issued allowing for the mobilization of the National Guard and the commitment of a large force of DPS officers to restore law and order, and to protect lives and property of the citizens of Arizona.

b. Prescott/Yavapai Flood:

As a result of heavy rain, lightning, windstorms and flooding, extensive damage occurred in the Prescott area. The emergency conditions severely strained the capabilities of the local government to effectively respond to the emergency. On September 23, 1983, a Gubernatorial proclamation was issued allowing for commitment of State resources in the response and recovery phase of the emergency.

c. Statewide Flood:

Beginning on September 29, 1983, heavy rainfall over a widely scattered area caused severe statewide flooding. In the wake of the State's worst flood, twelve counties were included in the Gubernatorial and Presidential declaration. Over 10,000 Arizonans were temporarily left homeless and over 800 homes were destroyed. An estimated 27 million dollars in damages reflects the personal suffering which was endured due to loss of homes and personal property. Fifty-two million dollars of public works projects, ninety-seven million dollars of agricultural property and crop loss and thirty-one million dollars of damage in the highway system emphasizes why local and State resources were unable to effectively cope with the emergency.

There were four meetings of the Emergency Council during fiscal year 1984. During these meetings the council allocated \$417,480 for the Arizona Department of Health Services, \$200,000 for expenses incurred on mobilization of the National Guard and Emergency Services, \$262,000 in support of the Gubernatorial declaration, \$500,000 for response of emergency expenses and recovery efforts for Statewide Flooding, \$200,000 of State's share in the cost of ground wells in the Yuma area and the pumping and diking activities of the Topock area in Mohave County, reverted \$100,000 from the Colorado River Emergency to the General Fund and allocated \$100,00 from the General Fund to the fire contingency and State Land Department fund and allocated \$175,000 to support the cost incurred by DPS and the National Guard.

EMERGENCY COUNCIL PROJECTS DURING THE FISCAL YEAR:

- a. EPS Superfund Relocation Project is designed to relocate 53 families

out of the asbestos contaminated Mountain View subdivision. All residents, land and some personal property will be acquired by the State for disposal. The project is nearing completion at this time.

b. Hazard Mitigation - The Clifton Flood Impact Task Force was established in December of 1983 to assist the Town of Clifton in its efforts to restore and rebuild.

c. The flood relocation programs consisted of the completion of a HUD CBDG grant that relocated residents out of the flood plain in the Town of Duncan in Greenlee County, Little Hollywood in Graham County, and the unincorporated area Hound Dog Acres in Maricopa County. Additionally, relocation of the community of Allenville in Maricopa County to a newly-built subdivision renamed Hopeville, was a COE/State sponsored project. The Verde Lakes Estates Project in Yavapai County was a State/Federal Emergency Management Agency sponsored relocation program.


In fiscal year 1984 ADES concentrated on completing HUD relocation payments for eligible participants, clearing HUD and COE audit findings, finalizing and recording the Duncan and Hopeville subdivisions plate maps, removing improvements from flood plain lands in Duncan and completing the acquisition of properties in HUD with available funds.

d. Hazardous Materials Contingency - The Division of Emergency Services is the lead agency to identify legislative changes and resources to cope with hazardous materials incidents. Goals include minimizing the number of incidents/accidents in which the control of hazardous materials is compromised and ADES supports adequate planning and preparedness to effect emergency response and recovery operations for incidents or accidents which are not prevented. Twenty-three claims were processed in response to hazardous materials incidents in fiscal year 1984.

e. Wildland Fire Contingency - This is a year-round contingency proclamation which enables the Division of Emergency Services to pay State Land Department responses to requests for assistance for the suppression of wildland fires on State land. Two hundred and nine fire claims were submitted for reimbursement cost during fiscal year 1984.

Three hundred and forty-six Search and Rescue missions identifiers were issued to County Sheriffs for actual field operations during fiscal year 1984. Seventy-one claims were submitted for reimbursement. Volunteers assisting the respective counties contributed approximately 11,111 man hours to Search and Rescue operations

To date \$823,334.32 of the \$6,330,000.00 of fiscal year 1984 allocations have been expended.

TRI-CITY (Tempe, Mesa, Chandler) - Congressional District #1, State Legislative District #21. Construct an 800-Person Armory, 32,000 sq. ft., \$2.7 Million.

LAKE HAVASU CITY - Congressional District #3, State Legislative District #1: Construct a 60-Person Armory, 17,000 sq.ft., \$1.9 Million.

COTTONWOOD - Congressional District #3, State Legislative District #1: Construct a 60-Person Armory, 17,500 sq. ft., \$2.4 Million.

PAYSON - Congressional District #4, State Legislative District #4: Construct a 60-Person Armory, 17,500 sq. ft., \$2.4 Million.

PEORIA - Congressional District #3, State Legislative District #15: Construct a 60-Person Armory, 17,500 sq. ft., \$2.4 Million.

To meet our future facilities needs, the Arizona National Guard has ongoing programs for land acquisition and facility construction. The acquisition of needed facilities will allow the National Guard of Arizona to meet the challenges of the 1990's.

STATUS OF LAND ACQUISITION

BULLHEAD CITY - Congressional District #3, State Legislative District #1: An application was forwarded to the Bureau of Land Management in April 1984 for lease/purchase of 10 acres of land, on the corner of Highway 95 and Marina Boulevard in Bullhead City, Arizona. We expect to have the application approved by 1 December 1984.

COTTONWOOD - Congressional District #3, State Legislative District #1: The Division of Military Affairs has identified three 20+ acre parcels of State land that could meet the criteria set forth for acquisition of land for an armory facility. The Division of Military Affairs is presently surveying each potential site for accessible roads and utility availability for each site. We expect to complete the site survey by 1 July 1984.

FREDONIA - Congressional District #3, State Legislative District #3: Application for a 25-year lease, with option to purchase 7.5 acres is at the Bureau of Land Management office and in the final stages of being approved. We expect an executed lease by 30 July 1984.

GOODYEAR (Perryville) - Congressional District #3, State Legislative District #15: A five-year lease was consummated, effective 1 January 1984, with the Department of Corrections for 18.34 acres of land for construction of a permanent facility. This state land is located at Thomas Road and Citrus Lane in Goodyear, Arizona.

PHOENIX - Congressional District #1, State Legislative District #23: Sky Harbor International Airport.

The City of Phoenix has approached the 161st Air Refueling Group regarding relocation of the south runway to be 400 feet south of its present location. This action would allow maximum utilization of the terminal facilities in place and on future expansion plans. The proposed runway encroachment would require relocation of all flightline facilities of the 161st Air Refueling Group. Specifically included would be the aircraft parking apron, the hydrant refueling system, hanger two, the nose dock, the newly completed alert facility and the aerospace systems shop. The only land available for such a relocation is west of the existing base. Projected replacement cost for facilities and acre-for-acre land is \$10.3 million at 1984 values.

Airport expansion is contingent upon upstream flood control measures and present plans are looking beyond the year 2000 before serious consideration is undertaken.

LAKE HAVASU CITY - Congressional District #3, State Legislative District #1: An application for lease, with option to purchase 40 acres of Bureau of Land Management land off Highway 97 and bordering the City limits of Lake Havasu City was forwarded in April 1983. We anticipate receiving the executed lease by 30 June 1984.

PAGE - Congressional District #3, State Legislative District #3: The City of Page has initiated and forwarded to the State of Arizona a deed for 5.07 acres of Page Airport Industrial-zoned land for a permanent facility. We anticipate that the deed will be recorded by 1 August 1984.

PAYSON - Congressional District #4, State Legislative District #2: Previously, the State Land Department made a tentative offer for a land exchange and was accepted by the Forest Service. Presently, the State Land Department is making a formal offer to exchange, value for value, State land for 30 acres of Forest Service land at the Payson Municipal Airport. The formal offer should be completed by 30 June 1984.

PEORIA - Congressional District #3, State Legislative District #15: The Division of Military Affairs has met with the City of Peoria exploring feasibility to station a National Guard unit within their city limits. The City was informed that in order for a unit to be located in their city, the State of Arizona needed 20 acres of land on which to build a permanent facility. Presently, the Division of Military Affairs is writing a formal request proposing that the City of Peoria identify land that would be titled to the State of Arizona for the stationing and construction of a permanent facility in Peoria.

SHOWLOW - Congressional District #4, State Legislative District #4: The City of Show Low will provide 20 acres at Show Low Airport when land acquisition process with Forest Service has been executed. Anticipate change will occur by 1 September 1984.

TUCSON - Congressional District #5, State Legislative District #9: The State Land Department is negotiating with GSA for the exchange of State land within the boundaries of Davis Monthan for 20 acres of excess AF land, at the intersection of Nicaragua and Calo Street, adjacent to the new Naval Reserve Center.

TUCSON - Tucson International Airport, Congressional District #5, State Legislative District #10: The Tucson City Council has approved the transfer of ownership of the land presently occupied by the 162nd Tactical Fighter Group and additional adjoining acreage which is required for future mission considerations. This will provide the space needed to meet near-term expansion requirements. The actual transfer of title is contingent upon the execution of deed to the Federal Government (U.S.A.F.).
