

The new position gives Berger full authority to act in matters of policy concerning the Institute, particularly in the absence of the president.

Brazil, the Infinite County, by Dr. William L. Schurz, was published on August 30th by E. F. Dutton & Company (300 4th Avenue, New York 10, New York). The book was reviewed in length by A. A. Berle, Jr., former United States Ambassador to Brazil, in the October 14th issue of the Saturday Review.

In Dr. Tessen's absence, Frank Jackle, professor of modern languages, will serve as acting director of the department of languages.

Mrs. Edythe Tessen was also granted a Fulbright fellowship at Ecuador's Central University during the same period. Mrs. Tessen, a graduate speech therapist, will lecture at the university in English as a foreign language.

## SAWTOOTH MANOR DESTROYED

A midsummer Sunday evening thunderstorm was responsible for the total destruction of AIFT's famed SAWTOOTH MANOR and its contents.

Sparks from a lightning-struck transformer ignited the building, which housed the apartments of President Sauer, Dr. and Mrs. "Paco" Gaona, Connie Fleek and Lora Jeanne Wheeler.

Also destroyed in the fire were two cars belonging to Lora Jeanne Wheeler and Connie Fleek, a valuable record collection belonging to President Sauer and a "priceless" art collection owned by the Gaonas.

Plans are underway for the construction of a fire-proof building to house eight faculty apartments.

## In Memoriam

MRS. AMANDA HENDERSON, who will be fondly remembered by our more than 3,000 Thunderbirds, passed away on August 30th, following an illness of several months.

Mrs. Henderson had been AIFT housekeeper since the Institute first opened its doors in 1946. She was born in Winkleman, Arizona, and was the grandniece of Amanda Porter, one of the first white women to come to Arizona.

HOWARD R. ELDREDGE, who attended the Institute in the Spring of 1951, died on August 25th, at his home in South Carver, Massachusetts.

Howard served for a short time as resident master in French at Gerard College in Philadelphia, and was later appointed head of the modern language department at Lawrence Academy in Groton, Mass. He is survived by his wife, who resides in South Carver, Massachusetts.

JASON C. WEE, a graduate of the June 1952 Class, passed away on June 19th in Korea, following a cerebral hemorrhage.

Jason was a native of Hawaii and his body was returned to his homeland for burial.

RICHARD R. MILLER, February 1952, of Fort Wayne, Indiana, was fatally injured on September 4th.

Richard was participating in a regional tournament of the American Contract Bridge League at the Roosevelt Hotel in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and fell down a 30-foot stairwell to the basement, suffering a skull fracture and died enroute to the hospital.

Richard was employed by the Addressograph-Multi-graph Corporation for a time after graduation, and then entered the teaching profession. He had just completed his first year at Fort Wayne North Side High School. He was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Miller of 926 West Oakdale Drive, Fort Wayne, Indiana.
